Klamath's answer to the service boys' need for recreational and spiritual guidance was given Friday night, when Mayor John Houston met with and appointed the following committee: Rev. L. K. Johnson, chairman; Lester Offield, treasurer; Elenora Weatherford, secretary; Mrs. H. Boyd, Paul Landry, Fred Southwell, Verne Owens, Clarence Humble, Samuel P. Miller and Norman Bowyer, members. The committee will raise \$2000, Klamath county's contribution to the U.S.O.

Fortified by the wealth of experience gained through their activities in the last war, the six great welfare agencies of the nation have joined their efforts through a single coordinating body — United Service Organizations for National Defense, Inc. These agencies are: The Young Men's Christian Association, The National Catholic Community Service, The Salvation Army, The Young Women's Christian Association, The Jewish Welfare board and The National Travelers aid association.

U.S.O. plans to expand the activities of the six agencies by setting up units adjacent to camps, naval stations, and defense industries throughout the United States and its overseas bases, so that the influence and comfort of the American home community may be brought to those who have been separated from their homes in the service of their country.

Rev. Johnson has asked all citizens, interested in assisting the service men, to meet with Mayor Houston and the committee at a great mass meeting to be held at the Willard hotel, Wednesday, June 18, at 8 p. m.

CHURCHES PLANNING ANNUAL CONCLAVE

The 90th annual state convention of the Churches of Christ in Oregon will be held in Turner, Ore., on the camp grounds, from June 24 to 29. Dr. Victor P. Morris, dean of the school of business administration at the University of Oregon, was chosen to serve as the guest speaker of the convention, and will give the principal address each evening. His messages on these occasions will develop the general theme of the convention, "The Kingdom That Cannot Be Shaken."

Details of the program have just been completed and released to the churches by C. F. Swander, state secretary of the Oregon Christian convention and Missionary society. Missionaries from the foreign fields, who will also participate in the program, are John T. Chase of Korea, and Dr. Royal J. Dye, of Belgian Congo. Wilbur R. Hensley of Gladstone, Ore., is the convention chairman this year, and Mr. and Mrs. Claude Neely of the Central Christian church, Portland, will again have charge of the music.

The conventions at Turner have been in the nature of a camp meeting since 1885, and with the exception of 1911 when the international convention of the church was held in Portland, has been continuous. The first tabernacle on the grounds — now serving as a dining room — was built in 1885 to seat about 500. The present tabernacle, constructed in 1891, has a seating capacity of about 2000. The attendance for this year has been set at 2021, with each church in the state having been given a definite goal to reach in this attendance. The 1940 convention, the largest in the history of conventions in Oregon, reached the 1750 point in registered delegates.

The Churches of Christ in Oregon have had a steady growth through the years until now they number more than 26,000 in Oregon in 140 churches. This year's record is no exception to the record and shows four new churches on the roll, two of those are new churches at Nyssa and the Community Christian church in Portland; two others are reorganized after a period of inactivity, at Irving and Wolf Creek.

FIVE NAMED FOR STUDENT PILOT COURSE

Earl Reynolds, secretary of the Klamath County chamber of commerce and local coordinator of the civilian pilot training program which is sponsored by the chamber, announced Friday that four youths and one girl had been selected for flight training from the spring session of the CPTP ground school. The five are: John Thomas Ray, grade point average of 93.83. Charles Robert Lind, 93.86 average. Donald Vincent Blachly, 92.50 average. Purvan Elmer Wilder, 91.16 average. Jilene Louise Woodruff, 91.16 average.

The quintet was chosen from over 25 students who have been undergoing intensive ground school training since early spring under the tutelage of Wilbert K. Carter. They will be given flight training under the guidance of Bill Forbis, Klamath Air service instructor. The five will make a total of 20 Klamath persons given free flight training by the government and constitute the third local CPTP class.

Reynolds said formation of a fourth class is indefinite and will hinge on interest shown among Klamath youth. Inquiries may be made at the chamber office, he stated.

BICYCLE SAFETY PARADE SCHEDULED

Hundreds of boys and girls—practically every bicycle rider in the Klamath basin—are expected to participate in the big parade to promote safer bicycle riding on June 27, under sponsorship of Montgomery Ward and company.

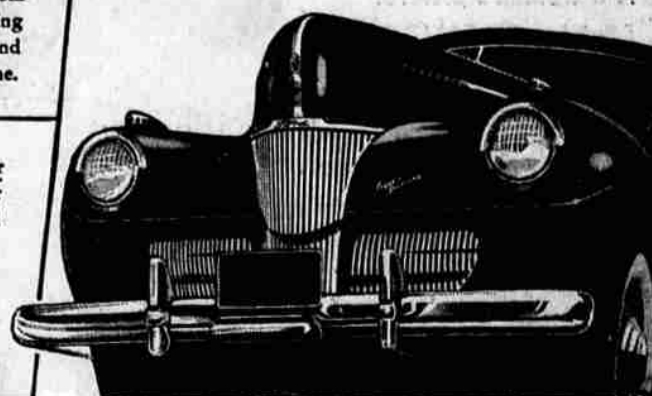
