

Members Hear Informing Talk

Former Resident of France Guest Speaker at Soroptimist Club Luncheon

Arthur Buick, native of Silver Lake, Oregon and resident of France for a number of years, who left that country as the Germans entered and sailed aboard the Manhattan for the United States, gave members of the Soroptimist club a thought-provoking and informative talk at the Thursday noon luncheon at the Willard hotel, concerning conditions both here and abroad that are only too apparent.

Knowing the French people as he does, he told of their deep disappointment in lack of help from America and told of hearing Ambassador Bullitt, with tears streaming down his (Bullitt's) face, that no aid would be forthcoming from his country.

In contrast, Mr. Buick described Memorial day in France when thousands of French people decorate the graves of the American soldiers, and said that in all parades the American flag preceded the French flag and was looked upon with reverence. He stated that he was a color-bearer for the American legion in that country.

Mr. Buick told the Soroptimists that it looks as though the United States is sitting passively while German forces organize their fifth column work here as they did in France and Belgium, and he declared that South American trade was bought away from the United States by Germany with money loaned to Germany by this country. This trade condition has somewhat improved, he said, but there is still cause for alarm.

Another statement made by Mr. Buick was that farmers in this country are encountering difficulties in obtaining heavy farm machinery because it is being shipped to Japan which is paying higher prices.

"Hitler's plans undoubtedly are for the conquest of America by economic penetration," he emphasized, "and if that happens the American workmen will be laboring twelve hours a day instead of eight, and laboring under poor conditions."

An announcement by Jean Young of the club's legislative committee called attention to Secretary Ickes' warning that the people may have to curtail use of fuel oil and gas next winter, and from the same paper she read a report published by the interstate commerce commission that shipments of these same products to Japan the past year increased more than 280 per cent and that shipments of scrap iron are continuing.
