

PHIL HARRIS BRINGS BAND FOR 1-NIGHTER

Phil Harris is bringing his aggregation of stars featuring the charming Ruth Robin to the Main dancehall on June 15, Sunday evening, through arrangements with Music Corporation of America.

A master showman as well as versatile performer, Harris has recorded successes on the screen, which, combined with his brilliant record as an orchestra leader and radio star, have contrived to make him the idol of the entertainment loving public.

While Phil has never given it much consideration, his eventual rise to fame might well be attributed to the fact that he was reared in an environment that permitted him to study rhythm and showmanship at close range. Born in Linton, Indiana, Phil was taken to Tennessee while still a comparative child and it was there that he made his first advances in the entertainment field. There he devoted much of his boyhood studying the rhythms of the dusky youngsters who literally beat a tattoo on the sidewalks of Nashville with their rhythmic outbursts.

In high school in Nashville he started with five-piece band called "The Dixie Syncopators" . . . Phil played the drums . . . went on the road with Ruth Stonehouse for nine months and then to Honolulu for a year at the Princess theatre . . . left the five-piece band and went to San Francisco at the Strand theatre . . . then to Australia and back to Balboa, Calif., to form partnership with Carol Lofner . . . with him for about three years at the St. Francis in San Francisco . . . then by himself to Los Angeles at the Cocoanut Grove for a year and a half . . . there Leah Ray joined the band . . . while there he worked in "So

This Is Harris" and "Melody Cruise" for Mark Sandrich at RKO . . . then east to the Hotel Pennsylvania in New York, the College Inn at Chicago, and back to New York and the St. Regis and 78 weeks on Cutex-NBC . . . then to Palais-Royal on Broadway and the theatres . . . a rest and then Netherlands-Plaza in Cincinnati; Adolphus in Dallas; Hollywood Dinner club in Galveston, Waldorf Astoria in New York; then to Chez Paree, Chicago . . . other well known locations that have featured the music of Phil Harris and his orchestra are: Roosevelt Hotel, New Orleans; Beverly Wilshire, Los Angeles; Cocoanut Grove, Hollywood; Palomar, Los Angeles; the Sherman hotel, Chicago; and direct from the Wilshire Bowl in Los Angeles.

With his background of colored rhythms in the south, the diversified music he studied on his world tour, Phil made his debut with his own orchestra at the Cocoanut Grove. Since then he has been acclaimed for his stage, screen, radio and dance appearances everywhere.

TOT SUFFERS BROKEN LIMB IN ACCIDENT

FORT KLAMATH—Little Jacqueline Schroeder, 4-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orville Schroeder of Fort Klamath, is in the Klamath Valley hospital suffering from a broken right leg received on Thursday afternoon when a car driven by Weston Engle backed over her. The little girl was busy picking up crayons which she dropped behind the car and her presence there was not known to Engle, who had just put water in his car radiator and got in the car, which was beside the Fort Klamath garage. Spectators to the near-tragedy shouted at the little girl as the car started to back out, and she started out of the way getting out of the way of the rear wheels, but was caught by the fender and thrown under the left front wheel, which passed over both her legs. Severe scratches and bruises were inflicted by the accident, and after little Jacqueline had been taken to Klamath Falls for medical attention, a physician examination and X-ray revealed a fracture of the upper right leg above the knee. The child was operated on Saturday, and a further operation will be necessary in six months, it was stated by her father, who returned Thursday evening to Fort Klamath. His wife remained in Klamath Falls with her daughter. The Schroeders operate the General Auto Camp and service station in Fort Klamath formerly owned by Ray Ballou. Jacqueline is their only child.

Young Engle, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Engle of Fort Klamath, had to leave the same evening the accident happened for Portland, having enlisted for service with the U. S. marine corps.

UNION FILES PROTEST ON STATE RULING

A resolution protesting a registration practice of state unemployment offices was released Saturday by the Klamath Basin District council of the Lumber and Sawmill workers Union (AFL).

The action, made at a council meeting here last Sunday, put the group on record against the unemployment commission's rule requiring applicants to state when making application for work, whether they belong to a union and, if so, what union.

The resolution follows: WHEREAS, it is the practice of the unemployment offices of the State Unemployment commission to require applicants to state, when making application for work, whether they belong to a union, and if so what union. WHEREAS, this is a fact that no worker should be required to reveal.

WHEREAS, this practice gives opportunity to the management to have the employment service make selections for him. WHEREAS, if such selection is made it is discriminatory, and contrary to the intent of the Wagner Act.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Klamath Basin District council of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union, AFL, condemns this practice, and protests its continuance to the State Employment commission.

This resolution passed this 8th day of June, A. D., 1941.

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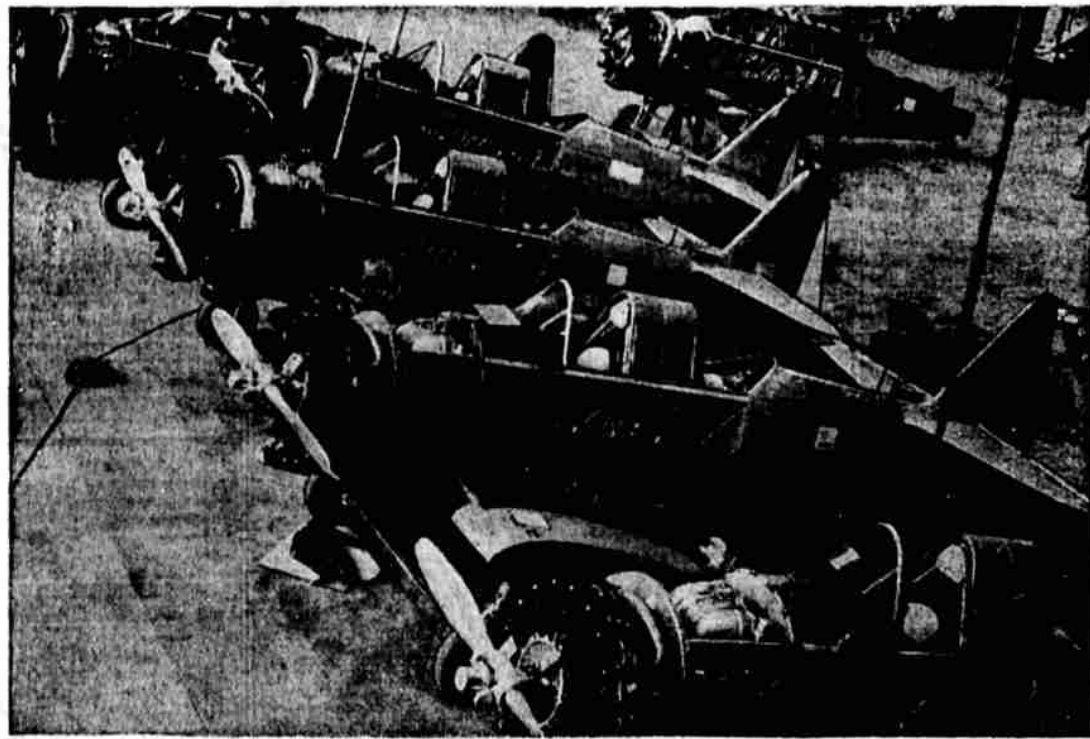
