TRENDS HAZY IN STOCKS AS PRICES SHIFT

NEW YORK, June 16 (AP) — Price trends were hazy in today's stock market and, with a few exceptions, leaders generally shifted listlessly over an extremely narrow range.

Transfers approximated 300,000 shares.

War news, while interpreted as fairly optimistic marketwise, still was too indecisive to touch off much buying enthusiasm. Speculative contingents seemed more confused than otherwise by the latest assets "freezing" contest between the United States and the axis powers.

Growing government spending and the business picture provided some comfort for the bullish ranks.

U. S. distributing preferred edged into new high ground for the year and American Car and Foundry common and preferred and Certain-teed preferred exhibited strength.

Occasional gainers included Bethlehem, Chrysler, Yellow Truck, Consolidated Aircraft and Du Pont.

In the backyard division most of the way were American Telephone, Western Union, Standard Oil (N.J.) Dow Chemical, Pennsylvania and General Steel castings preferred.

Bonds were a shade uneven.

WHEAT BOOSTED BY ACTION ON CONSOLS

CHICAGO, June 16 (AP) — Wheat prices today advanced more than a cent a bushel due to short covering and buying inspired largely by reports of rust damage in the southwest and the government's action in requesting German consular agents to leave the country. Another sharp advance in soybeans also attracted wheat traders' attention.

Earlier, prices had fluctuated nervously, dipping about one-half cent at times due partly to selling associated with increased wheat marketings and better weather conditions in the harvest area.

Although last-minute hedging, profit taking and spreading sales reduced the gains, wheat closed 1-1/4 higher than Saturday, July 1, 1940, at \$1.02 1/4. September \$1.02 1/4. Corn was 1-1/4 up, July 73 1/2, September 75 1/4; oats unchanged to 1/4 lower.

FIRMS MAY SAVE ON FEDERAL TAX

SALEM, June 16 — Firms employing eight or more workers and which still owe state unemployment taxes for 1940 can save 81 per cent of their federal excise tax by paying contributions before June 30, Administrator Silas Gaiser announced today.

The federal tax offset is 90 per cent if paid in January, the administrator pointed out, but only nine tenths of this is allowed if payment is completed during the first half of the year. After June 30 delinquent employers will be liable for the entire amount, making almost a double tax of 3 per cent plus 2.7 per cent for the one year.

The state unemployment compensation commission is notifying all employers whose records indicate incomplete tax payments on last year's payrolls. The percentage of delinquency is much lower than last year, showing improved business conditions, officials declare.
