The New York Yankees are scouring the American league

again with a sizzling seven-game winning streak that has the Cleveland Indians trembling on their pedestal.

Yesterday they polished off the Indians for the sixth time in nine meetings this season and reduced the tribe's margin at the top of the league to two games. They had proved Saturday that Bob Feller was not invincible, and they came right back against young Jim Bagby and won, 3-2, before 43,962 fans.

The Cardinals and Brooklyn Dodgers were fighting for first place, and 34,543 spectators saw the pair divide a doubleheader.

Kirby Higbe pitched seven-hit ball and Lew Riggs batted in four runs, three on a ninth-inning homer, as the Dodgers won the opener, 8-1. Then Ernie White retaliated with a two-hit mound job to take the nightcap, 3-0.

A throng of 34,500 at Boston saw the Red Sox sweep two games from the Chicago White Sox, 8-6 and 6-4. Boston made 15 hits in the first hit and 11 in the nightcap.

The Philadelphia Athletics battered St. Louis, 10-4 with a 14-hit offensive and an eight-hit pitching job by Johnny Babich.

Washington and Detroit divided their bargain bill. Sid Hudson was wild but managed to pitch the Senators to a 7-5 triumph in the first contest with the help of some timely hitting by Buddy Lewis and company.

The Tigers won the second, 4-2. The Cincinnati Reds took a strong hold on third place in the National league by nailing the New York Giants, 5-2 and 6-3. Elmer Riddle scored his fifth win without a defeat by holding the Giants to eight hits in the first encounter.

The Chicago Cubs and Philadelphia Phillies split their twin bill. Claude Passeau pitched a 6-0 shutout for the Cubs in the first game and Charley Root added five scoreless innings in the second before the Phillies blew their top with an eight-run rally by Danny Litwiler's single and ended with his home run. Result: Phillies, 8-4.

The Boston Braves beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-1, on the five-hit pitching of Sailor Bill Fosel with a 14-hit assault against five Pittsburgh flingers.

Few Changes Made in Bag Limits

800 Doe Mule Deer Tags Issued for Klamath, Lake Area; Bear Added

PORTLAND, June 16 (AP)—Hunters will find few changes in bag limits and season dates in Oregon this year.

The state game commission lowered the cost of antelope hunting licenses from \$5 to \$1 Saturday and decided to offer 3000 of the special tags to sportsmen.

Three thousand doe mule deer tags will also be issued for the Ochoco area of Crook, Wheeler and Grant counties and 800 in the Fremont area of Lake and Klamath counties, selling for \$2 each.

No special cow elk licenses will be required, a \$5 elk tag allowing a hunter to bag one of either sex. An unlimited kill will be permitted on ranges which were hunted last year.

Bear, formerly hunted in all counties except Klamath, Jackson and Josephine, were added to the list of protected animals and a hunting season from November 1 to 30 was established.

Season dates included:
ANTelope — Sept. 22 to Oct. 5 in Klamath county and Sept. 28 to Oct. 12 in other designated areas.

BLACKTAIL DEER — Sept. 29 to Oct. 25 in Klamath county and Sept. 29 to Oct. 25 in other designated areas.

Oct. 22 to 25, Nov. 1 and 3, Marney, Wheeler, Jefferson and Lake counties, three pheasants a day, six for the season, quail may be taken in Marney and Jefferson counties.

Blasting out a total of 32 hits in two games, the Klamath Falls Pelicans beat back the Medford Craters, 12-7, Sunday afternoon in a regularly-scheduled State league tilt after soundly whipping their valley opponents, 13-7, in an exhibition contest Saturday night.

Sunday's triumph marked the sixth straight win for the locals and their third consecutive State league victory. The Pelicans haven't lost a game since Albany defeated them two weeks ago, 6-4. Season record for the Klamath nine now rests at nine wins and two losses.

Manager Ernie Bishop led the Pelican batsmen Sunday with four singles and a double in six trips to the plate. His State league batting average now has soared to .522 as a result of 12 hits in 23 times at bat. Paul Crapo, who connected for three blows in five Sunday, added 50 points to his average for a .450 mark.

With every man in the Klamath lineup except Center Fielder Warren Wahner hitting safely at least once the Pelicans had little trouble scoring 12 markers Sunday off the slants of Bob Fox, who pitched the first eight frames for the Craters. Three runs in the seventh and five more in the eighth sewed up the ball game for the locals.

Pitcher Bill Hanauka, in registering his second State league victory, scattered 11 hits, struck out eight Craters and walked five men. He weakened momentarily in the ninth inning to allow the Medfordites three runs.

In Saturday night's game Hurler Clyde Carlstrom was the master of the situation throughout the greater part of the fracas as he allowed the Craters but 10 hits, four of which came in the sixth when the valley club tallied five of its seven runs. He struck out nine and walked six during the free-scoring melee.
