Perfuming the Liver May Combat Dreaded Halitosis

CLEVELAND, June 17—(The Special News Service)—Perfuming the liver is the newest, scientific way to control halitosis. Swallow, for example, oil of wintergreen, and in about two hours you should have a breath slightly perfumed with wintergreen. This scent may last two days.

Oil of peppermint works similarly. The perfumes, in both instances, come from the blood, into the lungs to be exhaled. But the storehouse is not the blood. The liver appears to be the place where the scent gathers.

Both of these perfumes are rather faint, too ladylike, in fact, to mask the odor of garlic. Adding more of these oils does not help. Too much of either may be dangerous to health or life, particularly in children.

The experiments which ferreted out this natural storehouse of either halitosis or sweet breaths in the liver were done mainly with garlic. It too perfumes the liver.

Important results are a new theory of the mechanism of this kind of bad breath, and a principle of diet which promises to get rid of some halitosis without need of perfuming.

These experiments were described to the American Medical association by Dr. Burrill B. Crohn. They started with an observation that the sleep-producing drug, paraldehyde, may leave its disagreeable odor on the breath for two days.

Obviously the odor does not remain in the mouth for that long time. Dr. Crohn chose garlic as his guinea pig for finding out more about this scent puzzle.

He tried garlic in the mouth only. That is, none was swallowed. Either chewing it vigorously, or painting it on the teeth, resulted in a garlic breath for never much more than one hour.

Then he introduced garlic directly into the stomach, without touching the mouth. There was no garlic breath at all until about two hours. Then it appeared and lasted for two days.

Two hours is the length of time that garlic would take to pass from the stomach into the small intestines and for the further step of diffusing through the digestive canal into the body.

The next experiment was on a surgical case, where it was possible to place the garlic directly into the small intestine. This time the garlic scent showed on the breath in about one hour. That is, the time in the stomach was eliminated.

The tests have led to a new theory, that the storage of odors in liver and bile is associated with the natural processes of breaking down fats and fatty acids.

As evidence Dr. Crohn said that a diet high in butterfat and milk may cause halitosis. In a number of patients, furthermore, he found that bad breath could be controlled by regulating the amount of fat in the diet.

He tried experiments with whiskey breaths. One was rinsing the mouth with whiskey, but not swallowing. The longest that alcohol stayed on the breath after the rinse was 20 minutes.

If whiskey was placed directly into the stomach, without contact in the mouth, there was no breath odor at all.

YOUTH CORRECTION BILL HITS CRIME

SACRAMENTO, June 16 (UP)—Assemblyman James Phillips of Oakland, predicted today his youth correction authority bill, passed by the assembly and now in senate finance committee, would meet the problem of "youth in crime" which has arisen as the result of "failure of the home to do the job."

Already given a "do pass" recommendation by the senate welfare and institutions committee, the bill was taken under submission by the upper chamber's finance committee for general consideration with other appropriations measures. It requested \$200,000 to finance the authority.

The bill would add a provision to the welfare and institutions code "to protect society more effectively by substituting for retributive punishment, methods of training and treatment directed toward the correction and rehabilitation of young persons found guilty of public offenses."

It provides for appointment of a youth correction authority of three members to which offenders less than 23 years of age, except those sentenced to less than 90 days, life imprisonment or execution, would be committed.

Upon receiving a commitment, the authority may:

1. Permit the youth his liberty under supervision and under such conditions as it believes conducive to law-abiding conduct.

2. Order his confinement under such conditions as it believes best designed for the protection of the public.

3. Order recommitment of renewed release under supervision as often as conditions indicate to be desirable.

4. Revoke or modify any order except an order of discharge as often as conditions indicate to be desirable.

5. Discharge the youth from its control when it is satisfied that it is consistent with protection of the public.

Youths committed to the authority also may be required to participate in vocational, physical, educational and corrective training and activities. The board also would be empowered to make use of methods of treatment "conducive to the correction of the person and to the prevention of future public offenses by him."
