Continuing the parade of famous orchestras to the Klamath basin, Fats Waller and his orchestra will appear here at the armory Wednesday night, July 5, for a public dance.



Thomas "Fats" Waller, composer, pianist, organist and vocal entertainer, has appeared in a number of motion pictures including "Hooray for Love" and "King of Burlesque," as well as a number of movie shorts. Among his compositions are "Ain't Misbehavin'," "If It Ain't Love," "Keepin' Out of Mischief Now" and "Honey-Suckle Rose." Waller is 5 feet 11 inches tall and weighs 285 pounds, and besides writing songs he is said to put them over vocally in a style that defies imitation. At the piano the colored star plays jazz or classical music with equal dexterity. At the organ Waller claims ability to make the keys ripple with the hottest rhythms of the day or set them murmuring gently with some solemn-toned spiritual. He is also a master of the violin. He has been recording Victor and Bluebird records for a number of years, having made some 150 recordings. He has also been featured over both NBC and CBS radio networks.

For his Klamath Falls appearance Waller will present his entire orchestra of 13 pieces.

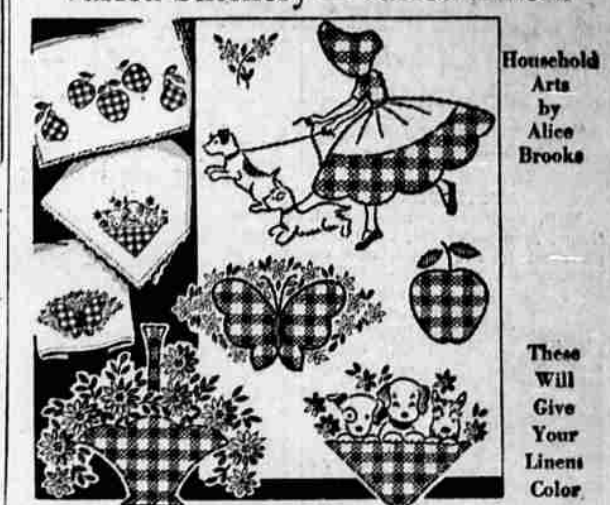
