FEHL GETS PAROLE DESPITE PROTEST

SALEM, June 18 (AP)—The state hospital paroled Earl Fehl yesterday, but the former Jackson county judge protested the action. He insisted he was en-

titled to an unqualified discharge, and said he would appeal to the U. S. supreme court for one.

Fehl, who was imprisoned, originally in the state penitentiary on a ballot theft conviction, was committed to the hospital in 1937.

"I issued the parole despite Fehl's protests for the reason that he has showed considerable mental improvement and should

be given an opportunity to rehabilitate himself."

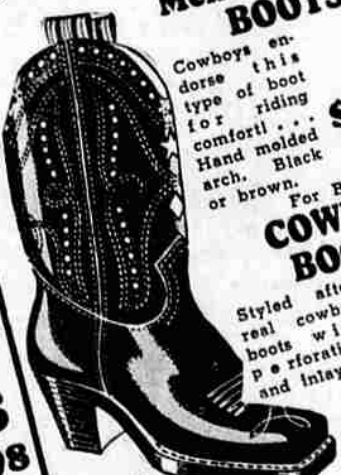

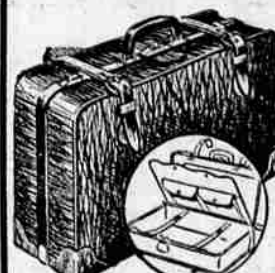
