Here it is:

- 6 25-watt bulbs
- 6 40-watt
- 6 60-watt
- 6 100- or 75-watt
- 2 100-200-300 watt
- 3 150-watt.

This is a supply that should last for many months in the average home... The total cost is \$5.04... But with the 20 per cent discount, you'd pay only \$4.03.

I see where hereafter I buy light bulbs in quantities like this... And I'll never be charged with the so-called crime of bulb-stealing any more.

65 CALLED BY DRAFT BOARD FOR JULY 11

SALEM, June 19 (AP)—Transportation schedules for the 458 Oregon draftees ordered to be inducted into the army at the Portland armory July 7-15 were announced today by state selective service headquarters.

The schedules follow:

To report at Portland July 7—33 men from Clackamas board No. 2, 33 from Clatsop county.

July 8—Cooks No. 11, Coos No. 22, Columbia 22, Crook 11.

July 9—Harney 15, Hood River 25, Lane No. 3 26.

July 10—Multnomah No. 3 25, Grant 8, Lincoln 12, Deschutes 20.

July 11—Klamath No. 1 20, Klamath No. 2 45.

July 14—Multnomah No. 12 22, Multnomah No. 8 21, Lane No. 2 22.

July 15—Lake 15, Malheur 25, Curry 5, Polk 20.

The Klamath county Board 2 quota of 45 men is the largest in the entire state. In all 65 men will entrain from the city Thursday night, July 10, for Portland. The contingent will be the largest single unit yet to leave Klamath county for service under the draft act.

Traffic Judge Wishes He Could Sentence Gayda

NEW YORK, June 19 (AP)—Piero Saporiti, a correspondent of Il Giornale D'Italia, appeared in traffic court with a summons for allnight parking.

"I want to tell you something," said Magistrate Michael A. Ford. "I wish it was your employer who was in front of me. I would like to give him six months twice a year for telling the Italian people falsehoods—not telling them the truth about this war."

The newsman's employer, Virginio Gayda, being in Italy, the judge gave Saporiti a suspended sentence.

SILVERTON, June 19 (AP)—The strawberry crop still unharvested is threatened by lack of pickers, growers said today. Rain has caused some damage.

PORTLAND, June 19 (AP)—A display of the city's potential defense strength will be made here tonight with some 1200 men parading through the downtown district. Policemen, police reserves and veterans' organizations will be in the line of march.

LA GRANDE, June 19 (AP)—Grande Ronde valley crops are reported suffering severe damage from heavy spring rains. Winter peas, wheat and hay have been flattened, agricultural officials said today.

ASTORIA, June 19 (AP)—Clatsop county's elk population has fallen to 1805, Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor, said today. As a result, there will be no open season on elk in the county next fall for the first time in several years.

REDMOND, June 19 (AP)—Redmond will open its drive Friday for funds for the United States organizations which will provide recreational and other facilities for men in military service.

LUMBER EMPLOYERS REJECT MEDIATION

SEATTLE, June 19 (AP)—Employers' spokesmen today announced rejection of the national defense mediation board's proposal for immediate resumption of working agreement negotiations with the International Woodworkers of America (IOWA). The IOWA, after repeatedly flouting the board's recommendations, finally accepted them last Saturday night and called off its 5-week-old western Washington strike last Monday, pending a federal study of the dispute.

pute. It affected 22,000 mill and logging camp workers.

Employers, rejecting negotiations on an industry-wide basis, told the board they would "be glad to meet with and negotiate any time with properly delegated representatives of unions under the twin districts (western Washington strike-affected area) contracts. We believe in industry settlement wherever possible through collective bargaining as long as it does not interfere with autonomy of individual employers."

The board responded with another telegram urging resumption of negotiations.

Employers' spokesmen however told interviewers that more than half the strikers had voted to return to work on the basis of earlier mediation board proposals, before the international officers finally acceded to resumption of a work last Saturday. They asserted that at least two-thirds of the strikers had returned to work today and that the idea of resulting negotiations on an industry-wide basis now would confuse both sides.

The strike was called in early May when employers rejected IWA demands for the closed shop, union hiring halls and guarantees against piecework. They agreed to wage increases of 7 1/2 cents to a basic 75 cents an hour, and for annual vacations with pay, and signed contracts with the AFL-affiliated lumber and sawmill workers on that basis.

Assistant County Agent to Enter Army at Portland

Walter Jendrzewski, for the past three years assistant Klamath county agricultural agent, has left for Portland to submit to his physical examination before entering the United States army as a reserve officer.

Jendrzewski will have a 10-day vacation before returning here to complete his work in the office of C. A. Henderson, Klamath county agent. Jendrzewski's successor has not been named. He plans to visit his parents in Hermiston before returning to Klamath Falls.
