Irish Lad Leading When Blitz Strikes

NEW YORK, June 19 (U.P.)—With the world heavyweight crown almost within his grasp, valiant Billy Conn was knocked out last night in the 13th round by Champion Joe Louis after one of the most electrifying battles ever staged in any ring.

Conn was counted out at 2:58 of the 13th after his magnificent stand against the negro monarch had thrown more than 50,000 fans in the Polo Grounds into a delirium of excitement.

Pittsburgh Billy apparently was ahead on points and it seemed that the mighty Louis was being battered straight to defeat when the challenger was caught with a smashing right hook to the chin early in the 13th.

Terrific Right
This blow staggered the game Irishman and Louis was after him immediately, throwing

Husky Hank Leiber's prolonged holdout in the spring is an annual headache the Chicago Cubs have come to expect but the man from Arizona ranked as the glamor boy of the Bruins Wednesday.

The Cubs defeated the Brooklyn Dodgers, 5-1, Wednesday, behind the five-hit pitching of Southpaw Vern Olsen and the heavy hitting of Hank Brooklyn started Luke (Hot Potato) Hamlin and left him in the oven

for Leiber to blast his fifth and sixth four-base blows of the year. His first blow came in the second

inning with none on to put the Cubs on in front and his second homer went over the wall with two on

fighting—particularly his body attack—on the seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth. In the latter session, Conn actually staggered Louis with a hard left hook to the temple and had Bomber Joe moving about on rubber legs

But Conn grew wild and missed many chances to put him away —if his blows actually carried enough dynamite to do it.

Didn't Quit
In his dressing room, Conn said, "I don't know what punch it was that started me down. I just wanted to fight the guy, and I did. I didn't quit, did I?"

Billy—slightly out above, and below the right eye—said he is ready to fight Louis again, and knows the outcome will be different.

The most surprising angle to Conn's amazing showing tonight was the fact that he spotted the mighty bomber 231 pounds, entering the ring at only 174 against Louis' 199.

Conn actually weighed one pound less than the limit of the light heavy-weight division which he formerly ruled, and was the lightest challenger for the golden crown since French Georges Carpenter tackled Jack Dempsey 20 years ago.

Louis said, "I planned my fight just as it finished. I waited for Conn to miss with a left and then caught him with a right. Conn hits faster than anybody I ever fought. I was dazed in the 12th and had to fight back the best way I could." The champion was virtually unmarked.

Conn was in such fine condition and so confident of victory in the ninth that he grinned at Joe as they came out at the gong and said, "I gotcha now, Joe."

The dead-panned champion merely blinked at him.

The triple win of Jockey Grant Zufelt, young Revere River, Utah boy, and a stirring ride by Apprentice Rider Tommy Gibson in the fifth race, featured the renewal program of the Klamath Jockey club's racing under the stars last night at the county fairgrounds.

Zufelt, an affable blonde lad with genius in his wrists and fire in his heels, booted home Baby Vela in the second, Cherry Lake in the third, and Royal Orb in the sixth for his three to tie the meeting mark set by H. Conley on opening night.

Young Gibson, son of Owner Mrs. C. C. Conley, topped on Stingy Lady in the Woodbray fifth, returning \$99.40 to win and, with Volador, \$123.20 on the quinella.

An estimated 1000 persons, biggest crowd of the eight-day meet, crowded the fairgrounds stands to watch the fifth program run off on a slow track made soft by two days of rain.

Opening the second and final week program, Frost Sox of the Lenhart stable of Dairy copied the 31-furlong first race for two-year-olds in 47 sec. 2. The Lenhart colt took the lead in the far turn from Goldfil, who ran second.

Neil Snelling, an aged mare ridden by H. Conley, took a first-half lead in the five-furlong second race but faded badly at the far turn and was passed by five ponies. Baby Vela, carrying the purple colors of the Gene House string, won, followed by Atrawith and Little Boy in 1:07.

Cherry Lake, one-half of the record-breaking \$217 quinella last Friday, made a bid in the

in the third to sew up the game and finish Hamlin.

Leiber also singled in the eighth. Olsen missed his third straight shutout victory of the year.

Max Lanier won his fifth victory of the season as the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Philadelphia Phillies, 7-3. The victory, third straight for the Cards, increased their league lead to three games.

The Cleveland Indians increased their American league lead over the New York Yankees to three games as Bobby Feller won his 14th victory of the year, 14-2, over the Philadelphia Athletics. Feller fanned eight to bring his trikeout total for the season to 119. He allowed four hits, two walks and committed a balk. The Indians backed him up with a 17-hit attack that included five homers.
