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ever such commerce was considered a disadvantage to German designs.

Its specific purpose, he said, "would appear to be interruption of our trade with all friendly countries."

"We must," he added, "take it that notice has now been served upon us that no American ship or cargo on any of the seven seas can consider itself immune from acts of piracy. Notice is served on us, in effect, that the German reich proposes so to intimidate the United States that we would be dissuaded from carrying out our chosen policy of helping Britain to survive."

**Taken as Warning**

"In brief, we must take the sinking of the Robin Moor as a warning to the United States not to resist the Nazi movement of world conquest. It is a warning that the United States may use the high seas of the world only with Nazi consent."

"Were we to yield on this we would inevitably submit to world domination at the hands of the present leaders of the German reich."

"We are not yielding and we do not propose to yield."

Mr. Roosevelt told the legislators the implications of the incident might be less serious if it could be regarded apart from a more general background. But it must be interpreted, he said, "in the light of a declared and actively pursued policy of frightfulness and intimidation which has been used by the German reich as an instrument of international policy."

The present leaders of Germany have not hesitated, the president declared, to engage in acts of cruelty and many other forms of terror against the innocent and helpless in other countries.

"This government can only assume," he continued, "that the government of the German reich hopes through the commission of such infamous acts of cruelty to helpless and innocent men, women and children to intimidate the United States and other nations into a course of non-resistance to German plans for universal conquest—a conquest based upon lawlessness and terror on land and piracy on the sea."

These methods are completely in line with those used heretofore by the German leadership in a policy toward many nations subsequently victimized, Mr. Roosevelt said. He added: "The government of the German reich may, however, be assured that the United States will neither be intimidated nor will it acquiesce in the plans for world domination which the present leaders of Germany may have."

Mr. Roosevelt proposed to congress no line of action or retaliation.

**Plans Not Revealed**

Apparently he chose the vehicle of a special message so he could couch his protest in the most forceful language at his command.

Nor was there any disclosure what steps the government might be contemplating to protect American merchant vessels on the high seas.

It was regarded as doubtful, in order not to tip Germany off on what to expect, that there would be any disclosure on this point—whether in the field of arming cargo ships or of bringing the navy into play to protect them.

Mr. Roosevelt told congress the Robin Moor was sunk without provision for the safety of the passengers and crew and despite the fact that the ship's American nationality was known to the submarine commander and was clearly indicated by her flag and markings.

# RUSSIA DECLARES DEFENSES READY

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casting military marches and patriotic poems throughout the day and that the Rumanian press was alluding to "forthcoming decisive events."

MOSCOW, June 20 (AP)—There was no outward indication in Moscow today that Soviet Russia expects an invasion by the German government newspaper, Izvestia, declared that "neither through the forests, nor the steppes, mountains nor seas will the enemy ever step across the forbidden boundary."

While the capital was perfectly calm, intensive training of the red army and its reserves was underway throughout the soviet union.

The Russians were represented as ready to answer blow for blow any attempt to violate the soviet frontier.

This stand was reiterated by Izvestia when it was said "the enemy" would never trespass on the far-flung borders. Izvestia's declaration came in a description of the special border units of the NKVD (state police) "who keep watch all year round, day and night, afoot, on horses and camels, or drawn by reindeer."

The words gave full geographical scope to the watchfulness of the soviet union over her frontiers.

(London, Ankara and other capitals have heard rumors for days that Germany was massing troops on her eastern frontier for a possible drive against the soviet union.)

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north Chicago suburb. Since then Kramli's plan has been adopted in most of the country's larger cities and has proven enormously successful. The Northwestern institute is an outgrowth of Kramli's ideas.

The plan, according to Officer Judge, is based on the three E's—Engineering, Education and Enforcement.

The engineering side, Judge told safety council members, includes the use of stop lights at dangerous intersections, a thorough and continuous check of other crossings for the best type and location of signals, and pedestrian crossing lines painted on street surfaces as requisites.

Judge suggested, in advocating educational moves, that the city be active in making regular accident reports to the National Safety council, use selective educational methods for persons involved in accidents, and carry out a traffic program in the city schools.

Enforcement methods in the Kramli plan, Judge said, involve the use of exhaustive records on each accident and the equipping of the police force to make arrests on the scene of an accident. He also suggested the inauguration of a traffic court day once each week during which all tickets and complaints handed out during the week would be acted upon. This, Judge stated, would save officers' time in court appearances.

Full support and cooperation of the safety council was pledged at the Elk hotel meeting.

# Watters Tells 4-H Meeting of Klamath Livestock Show

CORVALLIS, June 20 (AP)—How the Klamath Falls Rotary club helped bring farm and town together by sponsoring the junior livestock show there for the past five years was described to 4-H club members on the final day of the summer session at Oregon State college by Tom Watters, Klamath Falls Rotarian.

Watters said the show has annual sales totaling around \$12,500 and has become the largest community enterprise in the county. Corvallis and Albany Rotary clubs were also represented at the final day's assembly.

Early this morning—at 4:30 a. m. in fact—delegations started leaving for home with the big eastern Oregon special train pulling out at dawn. The remainder of the 2054 youngsters and some 200 leaders and helpers left throughout the day, thus ending the largest such session of the 27 held here.

Barnes had entered a plea of guilty to the charge following his arrest by city police after an investigation of a hit-and-run accident reported by J. C. Hamaker, 920 Lincoln street. At 8:45 a. m. Hamaker told police his car had been hit in front of his home. Damage was done to the left side of the car. Police started looking for the car and found the machine. Later they picked up Barnes.

Judge Ackerman will recommend to the secretary of state Barnes' operator's license in California be suspended for 90 days.
