TOURIST GUIDE SCHOOL HOLDS FIRST SESSION

Give correct information and be explicit in directions to visitors in the community, Commander A. W. Scott of the Pacific Greyhound lines advised the Klamath tourist guidance school at its first session at the Elk hotel Thursday evening.

Commander Scott and Ranger Jack Frost of the Crater Lake national park were the speakers at Thursday night's meeting. Another session will be held Monday evening and an urgent invitation was issued by the junior and senior chambers of commerce for attendance by all local people who come in contact with the tourist trade.

Commander Scott warned his listeners against the danger of overlooking the advantages of their own community and surrounding area. He pointed out that places of great interest to a stranger may become so commonplace to those residing nearby that they do not really recognize their worth.

Ranger Frost described various features of Crater lake which he said are often overlooked by the people of the surrounding country, who think of the park largely in terms of a view of the lake and skiing. Nature trails, wild flowers and other features were discussed by

the ranger, who also showed slides. At the Monday evening meeting, Ben Titus of the tourist information department of the state highway commission will discuss the "General Tourist Business of Oregon" and show Oregon's new technicolor film, "The New Oregon Trail." H. P. Bosworth will discuss "Why You Should Know Your Community," and Frank Jenkins' topic will be, "The Greeters' Viewpoint and Boosters' Attitude."

College Inn Burns In Third Serious Fire at Eugene

EUGENE, June 20 (AP)—The third serious fire in Eugene in nine days broke out late Thursday afternoon in the College Side Inn building at Thirteenth and Kincaid streets, causing an as yet unestimated amount of damage. The upstairs apartment of Professor W. R. B. Willcox and the roof were damaged.

The fire which started in the store room of the Campus Bookstore was apparently caused by overloaded or defective electric wiring, according to Fire Chief W. E. Nussbaum. The fire started at 6 p. m. and was extinguished by 6:55. Two fire trucks, the 500 gallon and 1000 gallon pumps were used. The building, owned by Dr. George Rebec is partially covered by insurance.
