## EGGS WITH MUSTARD SAUCE

(Serves 4 or 5)  
Two tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon chopped onion, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup milk, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard, salt, pepper, 4 or 5 hard-boiled eggs, sliced.

Cook the onion in the butter until it turns slightly yellow. Stir in the flour and when smoothly blended add the milk gradually. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add the seasonings and the eggs. Cook without boiling until the eggs are thoroughly heated.

## GREEN BEAN AND TOMATO BROIL

(Serves 4 to 6)  
Two large ripe tomatoes, salt and pepper, 24 whole green beans, cooked, 1 cup freshly

grated cheese, 2 tablespoons melted butter.

Remove blossom end of tomatoes. Split in half. Season with salt and pepper. Lay cooked beans across tomato halves,
