

SAILOR UNION OFFICIAL SUE FOR DIVORCE

TACOMA, June 20 (AP)—Clarice Lundberg, wife of Harry Lundberg, president of the Sailors' Union of the Pacific, filed a divorce complaint Wednesday afternoon in superior court charging that her husband "refused to permit her to establish a home and compelled her to live in hotels."

Mrs. Lundberg, a resident of Tacoma, was accompanied to the office of Superior Judge Joseph Mallory by Mark Litchman, prominent Seattle attorney, just at court closing hours. The session was private and identity of the pair were not disclosed until today. The complaint filed was dated December 19.

In the complaint, Mrs. Lundberg, the former Clarice Elita Trip of Tacoma, charged that Lundberg "would remain away nights without giving any explanation for such absence. That three years ago he left her in the state of Washington and requested her to stay here while he went to live in another city."

The complaint also states "during the past three years they have lived separate and apart. He has told her time and again that he has no time for love."

Mrs. Lundberg further claimed that as a result of "this treatment the plaintiff became very ill. There is no hope for reconciliation in view of the fact the defendant does not want the plaintiff to live with him."

A property settlement, accompanying the complaint, awards a 1939 automobile and \$20 a week for a year, after the final decree is in force. An interlocutory decree can not be given for 30 days after the filing of the complaint.

Court attendants, who were not aware of Mrs. Lundberg's identity when she entered the court room, reported she was dressed in bright green hat and gloves and a gray ensemble.

Records show the Lundbergs were married in Tacoma September 13, 1929. At that time he gave his name as Harold Lundberg, resident of Seattle, and his occupation as a sailor.

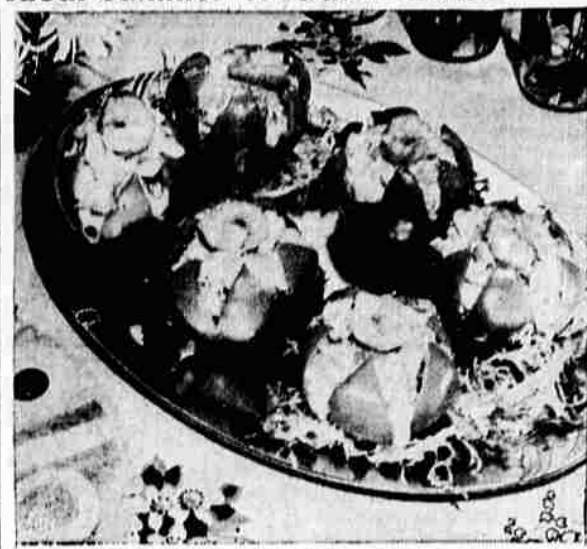
Publicity Sought in Leningrad for American Soldier

Prepare Shrimp, Salmon for Ideal Summer Weather Dishes

Shrimp is an all-American seafood favorite. So is salmon. For summer meals these and other canned fish make good protein dishes at moderate cost and without extra kitchen work.

CHINATOWN SHRIMP (Six Servings)

One can shrimp, 5 ounces or 1/4 pound fresh shrimps, 4 strips bacon, 2 tablespoons minced onion, 3 tablespoons melted butter, 1 cup grated American cheese, 5 cups cooked rice, 1 1/2 cups coarsely chopped salted peanuts.

Clean and remove black vein from shrimps. Brown diced bacon and onion in a 1 1/2 quart heat-resistant glass saucepan with removable handle until onion is tender, about 5 minutes over low heat. Add butter, cheese, rice, shrimps and salt. Cook until heated throughout, stirring constantly. Serve in saucepan. Peanuts are to be sprinkled on top.

TULIP POTATOES FILLED WITH SHRIMP (Six Servings)

Six tomatoes, 1 cup finely diced celery, 1 cup canned shrimp (2 No. 1 cans), 1/3 cup mayonnaise, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, dash cayenne pepper.

Cut tomatoes in X sixths with sharp knife, cutting through outside of tomatoes, and just enough so that each section can be pulled back to form a petal. Combine diced celery, canned shrimp (save 6 whole shrimp for garnish) and mayonnaise, lemon juice and cayenne pepper. Chill. Sprinkle inside of tomatoes with salt. Fill with shrimp celery mixture. Garnish with whole shrimp.

SALMON RING (Eight Servings)

One cup flaked salmon (fresh or canned), 3/4 cup bread

crumbs, 1 cup cream, 3 eggs, salt, pepper, 1 pt. cream sauce.

Mix salmon and bread crumbs. Add cream, unbeaten yolks of eggs, one at a time. Season, then add stiffly beaten whites of eggs.

Put into well-buttered, paper-lined ring mold. Place in pan of hot water and bake 1 hour.

Serve with cream sauce poured into center and over entire ring.

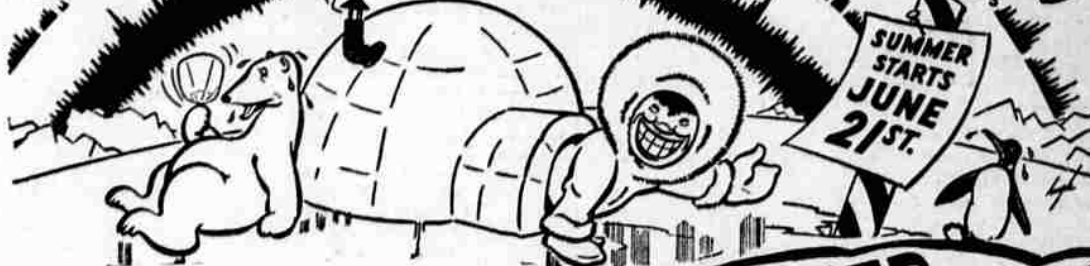
