

FOUR KLAMATH GIRLS ENTER DRIVING TEST

Four girls of Klamath county have entered the Oregon state safe driving contest at Portland. Twenty-four boys and girls are entered in the contest which will be held on July 1.

The four girls which will represent Klamath county are as follows: June Michelson of Klamath Falls, Dorothea Ellingson of Klamath Falls, Edna Beasley of Klamath Falls, and Pauline Clemens of Merrill.

These finalists of the state were chosen by a nationally-known board of judges which have selected the contestants by the actual road tests and written examinations. The boy and girl who are rated best in Portland will compete in the national finals at Dearborn, Mich., on August 21-25. Scholarships will be awarded to the first five in the national contest.

Ozark School Teacher Convicted In Flogging Case

CAMDENTON, Mo., June 20 (AP)—Miss Aldythia Keeth, 26-year-old Ozark's school teacher who testified she acted in fear, was convicted of common assault for her part in the flogging of Max Caldwell with a cat-o'-nine-tails.

A jury of farmers and businessmen returned the verdict after two hours deliberation yesterday. Circuit Judge C. H. Jackson fined her \$100 and set a hearing on her trial motion for July 23.

Miss Keeth said she struck the 23-year-old resort guide "only three or four times, lightly" and then only because she feared Dr. Robert Murrell might shoot her if she refused. The Eldon, Mo., osteopath handed her the whip and told her to give Caldwell "a few lashes for the sake of womanhood," she testified.

On cross examination she told the jury that at no time during the whipping did Mr. Murrell actually threaten her.

The state, asserting Caldwell was whipped for 45 minutes in the teacher's Ozark's beach cabin, charged Miss Keeth and her roommate, Miss Hilda Rhoads, 25, with felonious assault. Dr. Murrell, Miss Rhoads' fiancé, accused of turning a pistol on Caldwell during the flogging, was charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

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State Federation Of Labor Assails WPA Competition

ASTORIA, June 20 (AP)—The Oregon State Federation of Labor declared in a resolution late yesterday that the WPA threatens to "reduce the workers of this nation to serfdom at the hands of the government."

Approving remarks by Governor Sprague before the convention Tuesday, the delegates assailed WPA failure to pay prevailing wages and meet standard working conditions.

The resolution said the present situation, if continued, would "strike a vital blow at labor" and would "destroy private enterprise because legitimate business enterprise cannot compete in a field of cheap labor."

DEFENSE HIGHWAY PLANS HELD BACK

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP) Designation of strategic military roads throughout the country by the federal works administrator will await enactment of the road authorization bill.

Final action, according to the office of John M. Carmody, administrator, will depend on just what funds the agency has to work with. The senate passed the measure setting the total expenditure at \$250,000,000 with Senator McNary (R-Ore.) taking a prominent part in getting the basis of state participation relaxed.

The house roads committee, Rep. Mott announced yesterday, approved an increase of \$37,000,000 in the senate measure to \$287,000,000.

As approved by the committee, the bill provided \$100,000,000 for a strategic highway network on which the states will pay 25 per cent; \$150,000,000 for access highway to military establishments, paid wholly by federal funds; \$25,000,000 for emergency repair of roads used by the military; \$10,000,000 for post war road planning and surveys and \$2,000,000 for airplane flight strips along highways.

McNary objected two weeks ago to a provision in the senate measure requiring states to match federal funds on a 50-50 basis.

"The roads are to be constructed for national defense," he said, "and in matters of national defense the government always pays 100 per cent. I think we should not expect any more from the states than 25 per cent which they would pay in order to identify themselves as partners."

His suggestion was adopted by the senate.

McNary added that he believed the federal government should pay for strengthening or constructing bridges needed by the army in moving its heavy equipment, a view in which he was supported by Sens. Hayden (D-Ariz.) and Chavez (D-N.M.).

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GAS WARFARE SET FOR COAST FORCES

CAMP HUNTER LIGGETT, Calif., June 20 (AP)—Gas warfare—realistically simulated but actually harmless—will be experienced in the fourth army war games next week when 60,000 men engage in a vast coast defense problem.

Major Patrick S. Powers, third division chemical warfare officer, said this would be the first time that the war department has permitted a persistent gas to be simulated, except in small, special tests.

Throughout the week of maneuvers—wherever any of the 22,000 "red" invaders contact units of the 38,000-man "blue" force—soldiers are likely to run into gas—and have to take quick recourse to their masks.

There will be no danger, as the "gas" will be simulated by smoke and a molasses compound which vaporizes to resemble the deadly mustard gas—which caused about 85 per cent of the gas casualties in World War I.

This imitation "mustard gas" will be discharged by "mines" made from gallon cans. Small explosive charges set off in the bottoms of these cans will diffuse the gas in the air. Umpires, judging how fast the soldiers get their masks on when they encounter the gas, will rule on "casualties."

Can When Fruits are Cheap to Help Kitchen Budget Balance

Let's re-educate ourselves on the question of home canning, as part of our national defense program. "Certainly millions of quarts of good food stored away in home pantries are important to both family and national preparedness," says Dr. Louise Stanley, chief of the bureau of home economics.

Home canning is most economical on farms or in villages where families grow their own garden stuff. Only when fresh fruits and vegetables are available cheap, from nearby, is it economical for city families to buy food to can.

Sugar is an item that some home-makers have been wondering about. The sugar division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports ample reserves of sugar either here in the United States or on nearby islands for all needs.

USE PRESSURE CANNER

For non-acid vegetables use a steam pressure canner. In such a canner only is it possible to get temperatures above boiling. These high temperatures are needed to kill the organisms that cause spoilage in practically all vegetables except tomatoes. Steam pressure canners need to be rechecked each year to see that the pressure gauge registers correctly.

For processing acid foods—fruits and tomatoes—use a water bath canner. You need a tight-fitting lid and a rack for the bottom to set cans or jars on. A wash boiler or a bucket makes a good water-bath canner if it is high enough to permit covering the cans or jars with one to two inches of water.

GET PROPER CONTAINERS

If you use tin cans, you'll want to make sure that you have the right kind of tin for the kind of food included in your canning budget. You'll need C-enamel lined cans for corn, lima beans, kidney beans, and succotash. C-

enamel cans have a dull finish and light gold color. You'll need the deeper gold, brighter R-enamel for beets, all kinds of berries, cherries, cranberries, plums, pumpkin, and squash. Plain tin is satisfactory for all other fruits and vegetables.

Water that is suitable for drinking is usually all right for canning purposes. But very hard water may make the tissues of

vegetables tough and make fruit syrups look cloudy. If you have no other water to use but hard water, you can soften it by boiling the water, then straining it through several thicknesses of muslin. Or boil the water, allow it to stand until a fine precipitate settles to the bottom of the pan. Then pour off the water from the "settling" and use it.
