

# HOOVER RAPS PROPAGANDA, LAUDS TRUTH

PALO ALTO, Calif., June 20 (AP)—Stanford University completed its first half-century of existence today with the dedication of a unique library named for its most famous alumnus, Herbert Hoover, after having heard the former president declare that universities must be the main bulwark of freedom.

Taking part in a symposium on the future of higher learning, Mr. Hoover last night told a Stanford audience that universities were "the one great hope in a world 'sodden with propaganda and demagoguery.'"

The world war and subsequent events demonstrated, the former president declared, "that free minds and free spirits cannot thrive if the people are to be corrupted even by half-truths."

"The roads to totalitarianism," he continued, "are bordered with the wreckage of truth. And I may add that the road to foreign wars is lighted with propaganda which itself is half-lies and half truths."

"The future of America depends upon our people reaching their own conclusions unclouded by such poison."

About 60 university and college presidents and scientists assembled on the campus today for the dedication of the Hoover library, an war, peace and revolutionary institution founded by the former president as the result of his notable relief work in Europe during and after the World War.

This library, housed in a \$600,000 ivory-colored tower, contains many of the rarest World War documents and large amounts of literature bearing upon that period of world events since that period.

Coincidental with the anniversary celebration, it was announced that Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, Stanford's president, would continue as head of the institution until January 1, 1943, and also would be made chancellor of the university.

Dr. Wilbur, who was secretary of the interior under President Hoover, reached the retirement age of 65 more than a year ago but his tenure was extended to January 1, 1942, in order that he might continue as head of the institution during its 50th year.

# First Woman to Fly Bomber to England Arrives in London

LONDON, June 20 (AP)—Blonde Jacqueline Cochran, first woman to fly a bomber across the Atlantic, arrived in London today after delivering an American-built Hudson bomber and instantly became the envy of every woman in England—she brought three dozen pairs of silk stockings with her.

It was the American flyer's first flight across the Atlantic but she said she was "at the controls all the way and had a wonderful trip completely without incident."

She said her plans were not complete but added that she "probably" would fly back to the United States and "hoped" to fly more bombers across.

"My only companion was Captain Grace Carlisle, who captained the craft and did the navigating," said Miss Cochran, who in private life is Mrs. Floyd Odom.

"The ship was wonderful to handle," she continued. "This was my first trip across the Atlantic and we had plenty of sandwiches, boiled eggs and tomato juice."

She said 13 was her lucky number and promptly got room 913 in a London hotel.

# Churchill Resists Demands for Debate

LONDON, June 20 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill resisted demands yesterday in the house of commons for public debate on the gravity of the shipping situation by insisting it was impossible to state the government's position "except under the protection of the secret session."

Announcing that the government will review the battle of the Atlantic at an early date, he said:

"It would be a great pity if we were forced to conduct discussions on these most grave matters with every word quickly reaching the enemy. No justice could be done to the argument in such circumstances."

# Make the Most of Fresh Berry Bargains While They Last

Fresh berries are in season so make the most of this delicious opportunity.

Lemon snow combines well with berries. Here's a tested recipe from "The Merry Mixer Cook Book," one of the most satisfactory guides to economy, that tastes good. All the recipes given here are from the same source.

**Lemon Snow (Serves 6)**

One-quarter cup cold water, one tablespoon unflavored gelatin, one cup boiling water, three-fourths cup sugar, one-fourth teaspoon salt, one-fourth cup lemon juice, two egg whites.

Proceed as in making clear gelatin. Measure cold water into mixing bowl, add gelatin and let stand 5 minutes. Add stirring water, sugar and salt, and stir until gelatin, sugar and salt are dissolved. Add lemon juice. Let stand until mixture starts to congeal, then beat with a rotary beater until frothy. Beat egg whites stiff, add to gelatin mixture, beating them in until the mixture is stiff enough to hold its shape. This process is speeded if bowl is set in a pan of ice or cold water. Turn into molds rinsed with cold water and chill, or pile lightly in serving glasses. Chill until firm. Serve with crushed and sweetened fresh or preserved berries or with soft custard.

**Blackberry Mousse**

One cup blackberry pulp, one-fourth to one-half cup sugar, two tablespoons cold water, two cups whipping cream.

Crush enough blackberries to make one cup pulp, and mix with sugar and salt. Let stand until sugar is dissolved. Soak gelatin 5 minutes in cold water, dissolve by holding over hot water. Stir a tablespoonful or two of the

# Petroleum Export Put Under Control As Shortage Eyed

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—By direction of President Roosevelt, all petroleum products were subjected today to export control, and exports from the eastern seaboard may be made only to the British Empire, Egypt and the western hemisphere.

The White House disclosed that the president has directed the export control administrator to place the restrictions on oil products.

A plan will be prepared, the White House said, for the most effective use of tanker facilities in supplying petroleum to the eastern seaboard and the other American republics.

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**APPLE JUICE PIE**

Mixture No. 1: One (12 oz.) can Apple Juice; one cup sugar; one tablespoon butter; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon; 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg; 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice.

Mixture No. 2: 1 tablespoon cornstarch; 1 egg yolk.

Take 1 cup Mixture No. 1 and dissolve cornstarch; add egg yolk. Stir all together and cook until thickened. Place in baked pie shell and cover with whites of eggs to which 2 tablespoons of sugar have been added. Brown in oven.

**PASTRY**

1 c. Shortening 1/4 c. cold water  
1 c. shortening 1/4 c. salt

Combine shortening with flour and salt in large flakes. With a knife, cut in the water until it holds its shape. This makes 4 shells.

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
