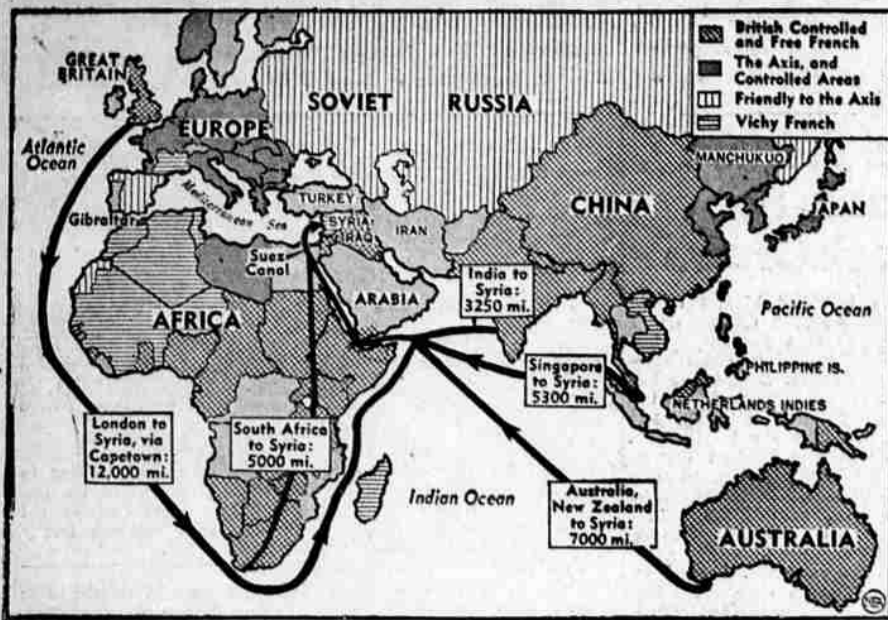


### It's a Long, Long Way From Home to the Battlefield



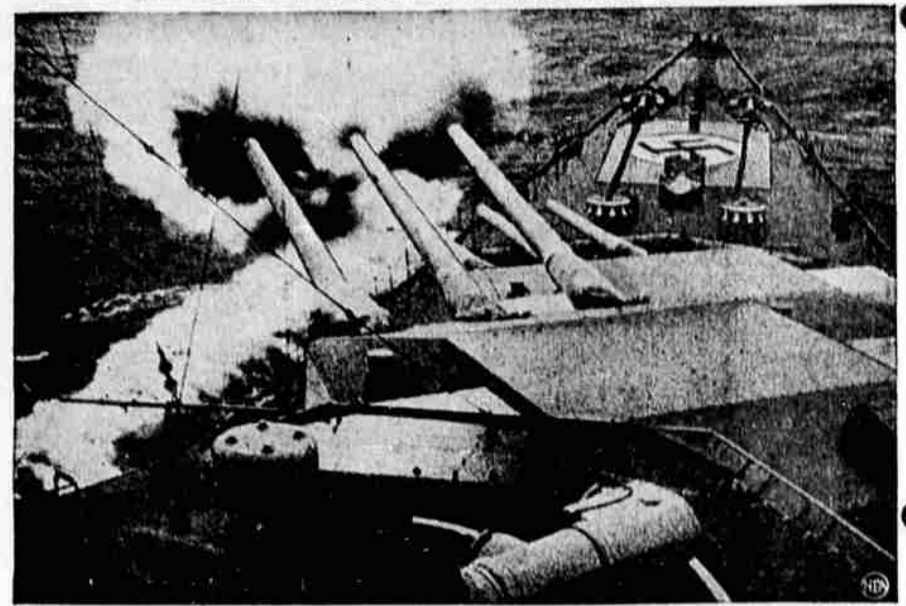

### Are These the Guns That Sank the Hood?



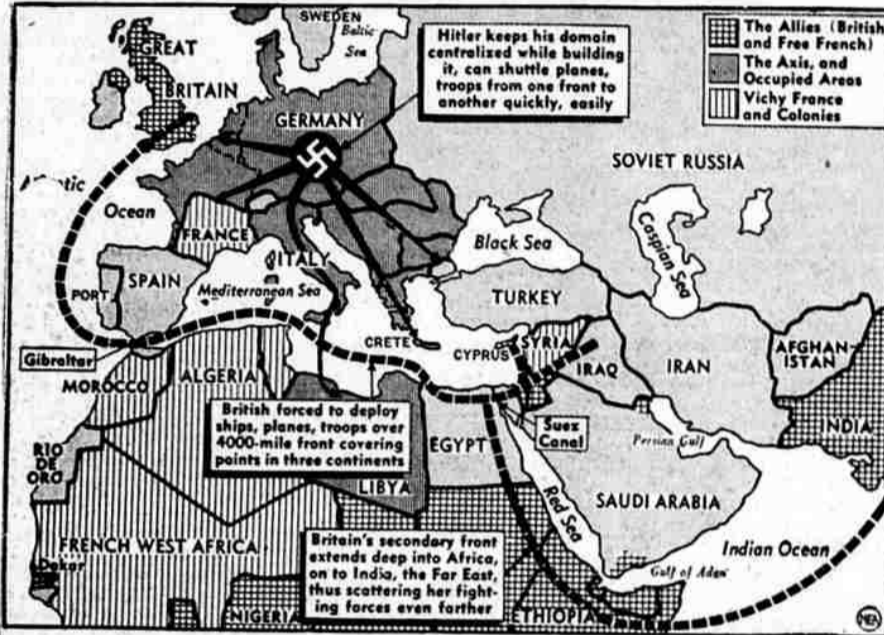

### Smiling Isolationists



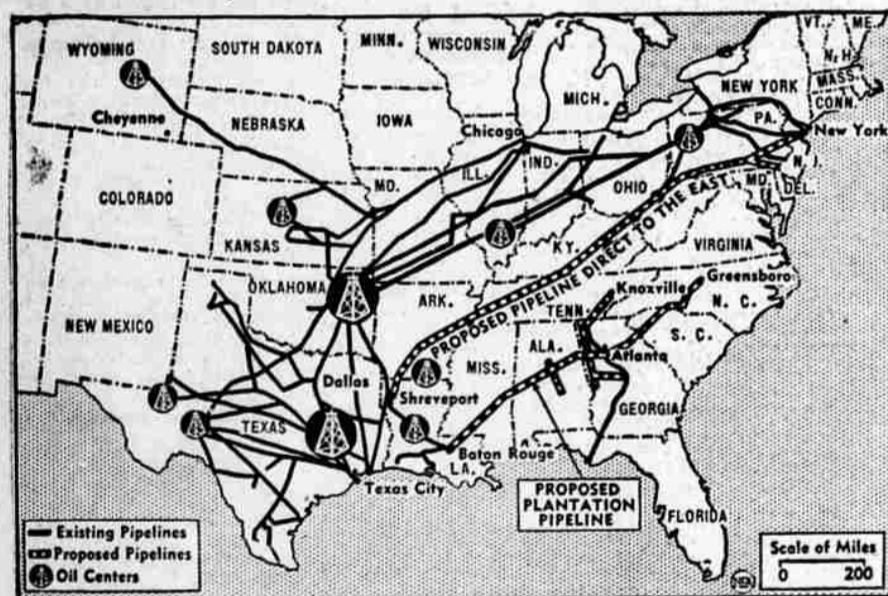

### Acquittal Brings Tears—of Relief



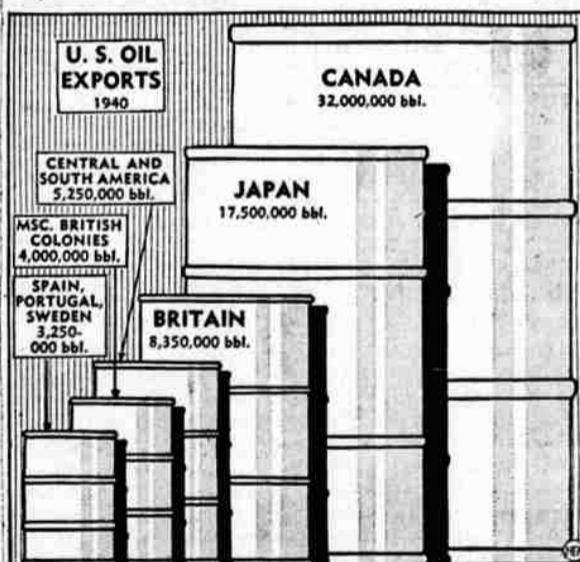

### New Pipelines to Rush Oil to Worried East



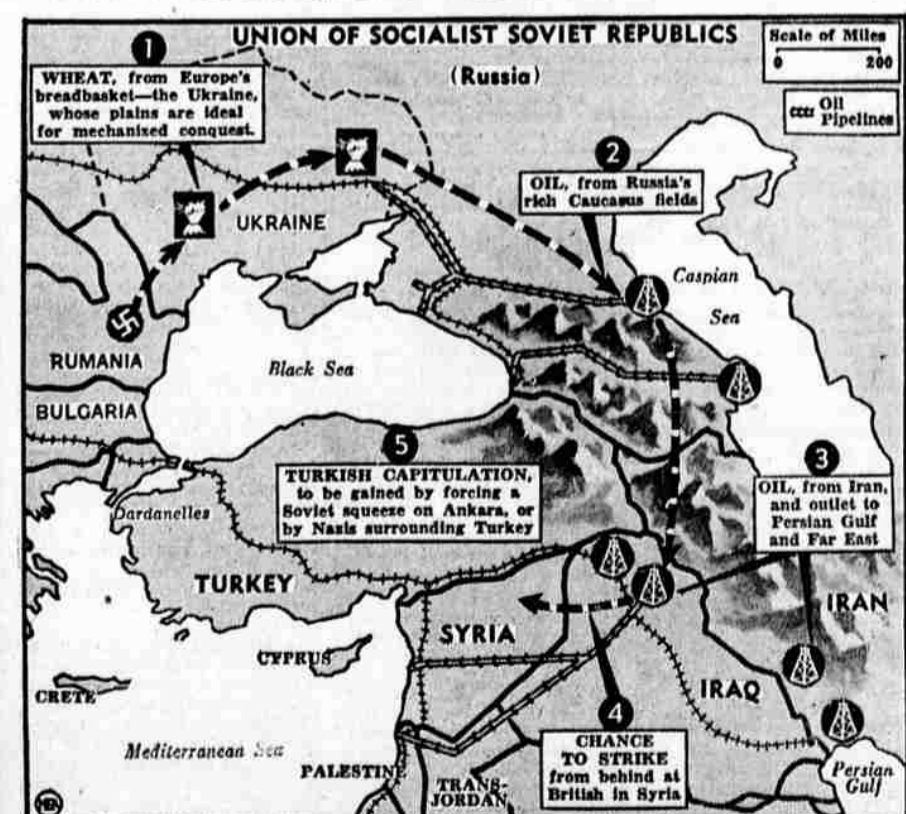

Map shows proposed routes, one direct to New Jersey, the other across the south, and network of oil pipelines that cover middle west.

### Exports No Drain on U. S. Oil Supply



The U. S. exported some 80,000,000 barrels of petroleum and its products in 1940, but had left for home consumption 95 per cent of total production of 1,425,000,000 barrels. Major part of exports went to nations shown on chart, all of which are still buying our oil.

### Five Prizes Conquest of Russia Would Net Germany



Russia seems due for a dish of conquest, either diplomatic or military, from her strong neighbor Germany, now reported massing troops on the Nazi-Soviet frontier from the Baltic to the Black Sea. Map shows five prizes Germany might gain by sending her troops across southern Russia.
