There was a happy hangover today among the baseball-batty boys and girls of Pa. Knickerbocker's village—like nothing that has been seen in the neighborhood since the Indians sold Manhattan for 24 bucks worth of fire-water and went to work on it.

The fans were singing the praises of Joe DiMaggio and company of Yankee stadium for smashing a major league home-run record; they were even thinking of naming a street after not-so-sweet William Terry for the way his Giants knocked off the St. Louis Cardinals in both ends of a doubleheader, and, as for Brooklyn, well Larry McPhail could be elected mayor by a landslide and have Leo the Lip Durocher for his police chief as a reward for the double jug the daffiness boys did on Cincinnati.

The Yanks were two games away from the Cleveland Indians in the American loop as a result of the 5-4 beating they handed Detroit's Tigers. But the big thing was that Joe DiMaggio and Red Rolfe homered, and this made it 18 straight hits in which the Bronx bomb-ers have exploded one or more of their subtle socks, thereby wiping out the record of 17 in a row which the Tigers chalked up as an all-time high only a year ago. What's more, DiMaggio's poke marked the 35th

straight contest in which he has hit safely, leaving him only six away from George Sisler's modern major league record.

The Dodgers took two one-run margin victories, 2-1 and 3-2 in Cincinnati, and, since the Cards blew a pair, it left Brooklyn only one game away from the senior loop's top spot.

Meanwhile, King Carl Hubbell oiled up his left, or business, arm and knocked off the Cards for the Giants, 4-3 and Johnny Wittig threw in a five-hitter to take the nightcap, 3-2.

The Cleveland ball club, otherwise known as Bobby Feller, posted his fifth shutout of the season in whipping the Washington Senators, 6-0, with a seven-hit performance, thereby reaching the halfway mark in his campaign to hit the 30-game winner bullseye.

Nonnie 2nd In Banner Race Event

Volador, a fleet, streamlined thoroughbred with the sudden speed of a lightning bolt plus the unflinching heart of a plow-horse, Saturday afternoon nosed out W. Millerick's Nonnie in a brilliant stretch duel to win the President's Cup handicap, banner event of the Klamath Jockey club's last summer meeting card at the county fairgrounds.

The shining chestnut, with Howard Conley on deck, was away with the bell but never over one length in the van as a closely-bunched field sped after him through the mile and 70-yard route. On the far turn Nonnie made her bid and the two pounded toward home shoulder to shoulder. At the wire it was Conley and Volador by one length.

Gold Cup
Panipat, H. E. Nelson's magnificent black router, closed swiftly from seventh at three-quarters to an oncoming third past the stand.

The race was worth an added purse and the presentation by Jockey Club President E. P. Ivory of the gold cup to Volador's owner, W. A. Philpot.

The gleaming gelding's victory also sewed up the undisputed eighth-day meeting jockey championship for Conley. It was his twelfth victory and third in succession for the day. Previous to the seventh he had booted in Postilipo in the fifth and Bogota in the sixth.

\$294 Quinella
Climaxing the successful summer meeting was the biggest quinella payoff of the two weeks of racing under the stars when Ernie Boy and Wragby combined in the fourth to return \$294 to J. Brownfield of Dorris.

Crowds, steadily increasing through two weeks of racing, reached their peak Saturday when an estimated 1200 persons jammed the stands to watch a nine-race program. Pari-mutuel ticket sellers reported a good-sized handle.

Weather was clear and warm with a stiff breeze slapping into the far turn. The track was dry and fast.

Bids Out for State Semi-Pro Ball Tourney

PORTLAND, June 23 (AP)—Invitations went out to eight baseball teams today for the annual Oregon semi-pro tournament to be held July 6 at Albany.

Ray Brooks, northwest semi-pro commissioner, selected the defending champion, Albany, and Silverton, Bend and Eugene of the State league; Marine Electric of the Greater Portland league; United Furniture Workers of the Spalding International league; Valselt of the Portland Valley league and Dairy Creek of the Tualatin Valley league.

The tourney will be a double-elimination affair, lasting a week.

Silverton Blasts Pelican Title Hopes With 10-0 Saturday Win; Hills Creek Contest Rained Out

Klamath Falls' hopes for an Oregon State league first title were conclusively blasted Saturday night at Silverton as the Red Sox shellacked the Pelicans, 10-0, behind the three-hit twirling of Cal McIlwain, the 17-year-old youngster from Jefferson high school of Portland.

Saturday night's win was the third consecutive shutout for the Silverton nine that has gone undefeated since their first game of the year a couple of weeks ago when Albany edged out a 4-3 decision. The Red Sox played errorless ball Saturday night.

Jack Lloyd, Marshall Eye-stone and Norman Peters with a single each were the only Pelican batters able to connect safely with McIlwain's hurling. Three of the 10 hits off Carlstrom and Davis, the Klamath pitchers, went for extra bases.

Pitcher McIlwain struck out 12 Pelican batters during the course of the contest and apparently was just wild enough to make his pitches effective. He walked six. Eight Klamathites were left stranded on the base paths.

Clyde Carlstrom, Klamath curve ball specialist, allowed the winners seven hits in the six innings he worked. Four of the hits came in the sixth frame when two tallies crossed the plate. Clyde walked five and struck out the same number. Orin Davis hurled the last two stanzas for the losers and was nicked for four runs, only two of which were earned.

The Saturday night clash marked the farewell performance of Babe Schwab, erstwhile Portland Beaver infielder, in a Pelican uniform. Schwab announced last week before the weekend game that he would quit the local squad in favor of a position on the Silverton club. Babe handled five chances without error against his new team mates but failed to bag a hit in three official tries.

Sunday's game with the Hills Creek contingent was rained out at Swimmer's Delight. The contest against the Hill Billies would have closed the first half slate for the Pelicans, but now probably will be made up when the team makes its second half appearance here in August.

Pelican baseball officials Sun-

day turned down an invitation by Baseball Commissioner Ray Brooks to enter the state semi-pro tournament beginning July 6 at Albany when it was learned that entry would involve a good deal of expense and time on the part of local players.

Wednesday night the Klamath Falls nine entertains the Yreka aggregation, leading team of the Northern California league, in a practice tilt at Recreation field under the lights starting at 8 p. m.
