

TELL TOURISTS TRUTH, ADVICE OF STATE MAN

"Answer their questions and tell them the truth," was the advice of Ben Titus, acting director of the state highway and tourist information bureau, in a talk to an audience of about 70 persons attending the second of the junior-senior chamber of commerce tourist guidance schools Monday evening.

Titus was discussing the need for a good local information service for tourists when he brought out the importance of making all statements to visitors absolutely truthful.

"We get more squawks from tourists who have been lied to than any other type of complaint," said the speaker. "People who, out of a sense of loyalty to their community, say that a road is in good shape when it is bad, or say the fishing somewhere is good when it is terrible, are really doing a lot of harm and the chances are they have cost their community another visit by the person to whom they have falsified."

Titus pointed out that the tourist business is worth \$45,000,000 of new business to Oregon each year, and that this return can be increased by inducing people to stay longer in the state. He urged that Klamath people try first to induce tourists to remain longer in this vicinity, and if they want to go to farther places, to try to get them to spend more time within the boundaries of the state.

After Titus' talk Ralph Gifford, photographer for the highway information bureau, presented the state's new tourist promotion picture, "The New Oregon Trail."

H. P. Bosworth Jr., gave a talk on "Why You Should Know Your Community." The speaker gave a great deal of detailed and little known information about weather, history and wildlife of the Klamath country.

He told, for instance, many facts about the pelican, Klamath's symbolic bird. There are three species of pelican common to the North American continent, Bosworth said. These are the brown pelican, found around the Gulf of Mexico; the California brown pelican of southern California, and the North American white pelican common in the Klamath country. The latter

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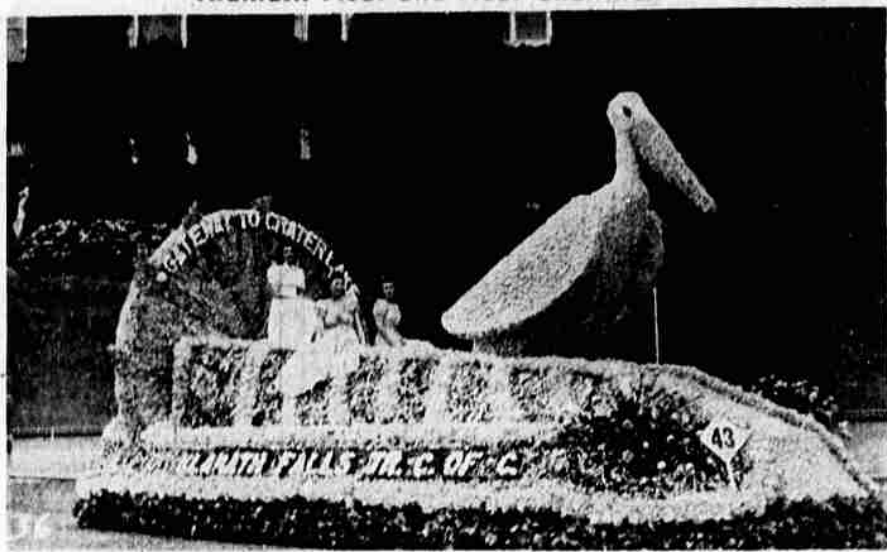

PAINTER FINED IN CITY COURT AFTER HIT-RUN

City police cleared up another hit and run case involving property damage with the arrest of William Laahs, a painter, residing at 222 North Rogers street. Last Saturday, June 21, at 4:30 p. m., Mrs. L. R. Stringfellow of 2280 Garden avenue, reported to the police that her 1941 Buick coupe was struck while parked in front of 904 East Main street. Her car was damaged on the left side.

At 7:30 p. m. the city police found that the black paint from Mrs. Stringfellow's automobile had adhered to the light copper colored car of William Laahs. The Laahs car was damaged on the right front fender, matching the damaged left side of the Stringfellow automobile. With this evidence the arrest of William Laahs followed.

Laahs was charged with hit and run, involving property damage and pleaded guilty in Judge Ackerman's court Monday morning. Judge Ackerman lectured the defendant, telling him that he was not a fit person to drive an automobile. He was fined \$25 and his right to apply for an operator's license was suspended for 90 days. Laahs also pleaded guilty to the charge of having no operator's license and was fined \$5 on this count.
