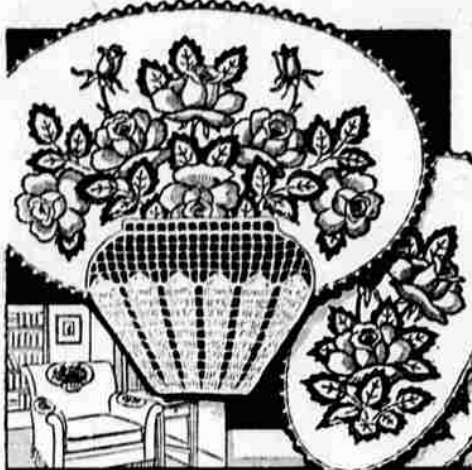

Trouble Seen for Russ-German War In Transportation

PORTLAND, June 24 (U.P.)—A University of Pennsylvania economist who visited Russia several times, Monday said both Germany and the soviet union face a major problem in transportation.

Dr. Karl W. H. Scholz told the Institute of International Relations at Reed college that even if Germany gets the Baku oil fields she will find it impossible to transport quantities of oil from the region.

"Summer showers turn the vast steppes into impassable bogs in a very short time," he said. "The soviet railway gauge is wider than that of European railways, requiring the transshipment of all goods crossing the Russian border."

Scholz said that there is only one rail line to the Baku region, and the soviets would be certain to destroy it before letting the area fall into German hands.

He said he questioned whether the Russian peasants would be willing to destroy their grain fields before letting the nazis get them.

New Giant Fir Tree Found in Washington

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 24 (U.P.)—Washington, which recently wrested the biggest fir tree honors from Oregon, is not content to rest on its laurels.

State Land Commissioner Jack Taylor today said the biggest yellow pine in the northwest has been found in Klickitat county, Wash.

The new giant measured 182 feet in height, 20 feet 6 inches through and contained 26,000 board feet of lumber.
