Mohl continued to play it, however, and for 50 minutes it was a shuttle race as the big one ran up and then down.

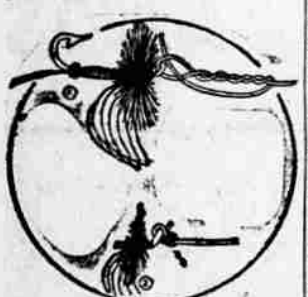
At the end of nearly an hour, Mohl had the giant near the rod and was about to haul him out when he gave a last leap, then dived under a log and was again away downstream.

TWIST OF THE WRIST

Here's DuPont's new clinch knot for tying nylon fishing leaders:



The dopesheet along with it says all that's necessary is to stick the end of the tipper through the eye of the fly, double it back against itself for four or five inches, and give the fly several complete twists to wind the leader spirally around itself four or five times as shown in Figure 1.

Thrust the end between the eye and the coils, hold on to it, and pull tightly and securely as shown in Figure 2. This completes the knot, one of the best known for nylon leaders.

Dodgers Half Game From League Lead

Franks Homers in Eighth to Defeat Pirates 9-4; Cubs Beat Giants, 1-0

The fast-moving Brooklyn Dodgers climbed to within half a game of the National league lead Monday by coming from behind to trounce the Pittsburgh Pirates, 9-4.

Herman Franks, rookie catcher recalled from the International league to replace Babe Phelps, hit a home run in the eighth inning with two on to turn the tide in Brooklyn's favor. His blow topped a rally that put Brooklyn in front to stay and began when another pinch-hitter, Jim Waddell, singled to score Dolph Camilli with the tying run.

Bob Killinger had held Brooklyn scoreless after the first inning when a double by Peeewe Reese, singles by Pete Reiser and Joe Medwick and Mickey Owen's long fly counted three runs.

Fred Fitzsimmons continued his victory string against the Pirates making up his 13th

straight victory over Pittsburgh and allowing them all their seven hits before he retired from the game for a pinch hitter in the eighth. Newt Kimball and Mace Brown finished. Reiser, Medwick and Camilli each collected three hits.

Claude Passeau held the New York Giants to three hits while the Chicago Cubs made the most of four safeties to win, 1-0 in the only other major league game scheduled.

The Cubs scored the game's lone run in the first inning when Stan Hack singled after Bob Sturgeon struck out. Phil Cavaretta grounded out, sending Hack to third and Bill Nicholson then doubled to score Hack and decide the game.

CHICAGO, June 24 (AP)—The Sad Russian has gone away—but a lot of Chicago Cubs fans hope he'll be back another day.

Lou Novikoff, who came to the Cubs last spring as the most highly publicized rookie in National league history, will be back in the minors tonight as a member of the Milwaukee Brewers. He failed to meet major league standards so was sent to the American association club for more seasoning. His new boss will be genial Charlie Grimm, who still believes Lou some day will develop into a great hitter.

"I'm going to give Lou the microphone in Milwaukee and let him rip," said Charlie in discussing the strategy by which he, as the Brewers' new manager, hopes to get Novikoff back into the happy mood which had him singing into loud speakers and clouting prodigious home runs last season in the Pacific Coast league.

"He's been trying too hard," Grimm said, "I think he still will develop."

The likable Novikoff made a lot of friends at Wrigley field despite his .237 batting average. When he failed repeatedly at the plate, the attitude of most Cub fans was "he's pressing, let's give him a chance."

MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 24 (UP)—Two members of the Chicago Cubs management Monday acquired control of the Milwaukee Baseball club of the American association and promptly reinforced the hapless

July 13 Set for Annual Klamath Lake Regatta

Large Entry List Expected For Junior Chamber Event

July 13 has been set as the date for this year's edition of the Upper Klamath lake regatta, sponsored annually by the Klamath county junior chamber of commerce, and with good weather almost a certainty by that time, Chairman Jim Kerns is looking forward to what he believes will be one of the most successful days in the history of the event.

As in past years, the regatta will combine water events and lumberjack contests, and large entrant lists are expected on both sides of the program.

The National Outboard association will again sanction the speed boat races, and the outstanding drivers from three states—Oregon, Washington, and California—will be here to compete for the honors and cash prizes, which total almost \$700. Entry blanks are being handled through the association and will start coming in within the next week.

Local boatmen will predominate in the sailboat race, although some outsiders are also expected. Last year a couple of boats from Bend sailed off with the honors, but new boats such as Innis Roberts' "Swedish" and Fred Goeller's "Windrift" will make it a tougher contest this time.

One-man log bucking, two-man log bucking, and a log chopping contest have been scheduled for the lumberjacks, and timber beasts from Tennant on the south to the Ochoco on the north are already sharpening their axes in preparation. A total of \$260 has been set aside as prizes in these three contests.

Marvin Ragsdale of Big Lakes, a two time winner, is expected to be there to defend his bucking championship. Ole Nassen and Adolf Feusi, both of Weyerhaeuser, are former title-holders who are also expected to be on hand. The chopping contest will bring forward such outstanding axemen as Orval Taylor, Charlie McKean, and Earl Hilton.

Following that, the touring Israelite House of David contingent, boasting its best and cleverest nine in years, invades Klamath for a night game, Tuesday, July 15. The Israelites have been here before and local observers probably are looking forward to this encounter three weeks from now.

Meanwhile the Pelicans engage two league opponents in the Bend Elks here next Saturday and Sunday, June 28 and 29, and the Silverton Red Sox here Saturday and Sunday, July 12 and 13. Only the Sunday engagements with their local rivals, however, will count in the league standings.

The Pelicans now have a season record of four wins and two losses in Oregon State league contests. The Hills Creek crabs, postponed on account of rain Sunday, would have completed the first half slate for the locals. The Bend tilt here this Sunday formally opens the second half schedule for the Pelican baseballists.

San Diego Looms in Coast Loop

For three rounds Snapp whaled away at his lighter opponent to pile up a big point margin but in the fourth he grew bolder and was tagged in dead center by a Miller right. Only the fact the bout went for just four heats saved him from a quick defeat.

Fearless Frank Calise, Snapp's amateur manager, says his boy has taken on a few pounds and is in better shape than he was last Tuesday. The fight will be Miller's 100th as an amateur and he wants to win.

Leading up to the windup mitt go will be a set-to between Lloyd Smith, young Bonanza wallop who last week won on a first-round knockout, and Larupin' Larry Ray, Klamath high school slugger who has been gradually rounding into shape for the past fortnight.
