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3300 VEHICLES TO MOVE ARMY ACROSS OREGON

A military motor convoy of approximately 3300 vehicles will be moving over Oregon highways during the week of July 3 to 10, according to word sent to the Oregon State Motor association by headquarters of the forty-first division.

In their efforts to conduct the columns with least interruption possible to civilian traffic, all military truck columns will remain off of the highways on July 4 because of excessive highway traffic. This means that columns will not move after the night of July 3 until early morning of July 5.

Two routes have been designated, an east and west route. The east route will be along highways US 97 and US 99 and the west route generally along highways US 99 and US 101.

Columns using the east route will bivouac at Modesto, Calif., July 1-6; Red Bluff, July 2-7; Klamath Falls, July 3-8; Eugene, July 5-9; Vancouver, July 6-10.

Columns using the west route will bivouac at Fairfield, Calif., July 1-6; Redding, Calif., July 2-7; Grants Pass, July 3-8; Eugene, July 5-9; Vancouver, July 6-10.

Motorists were warned that the motor convoys will have right-of-way over civilian traffic and private trips should be planned in advance to avoid the military groups.

These units frequently are spaced far enough apart to allow civilian motorists to pass, but extreme care must be used.

Military convoys going through cities, if escorted by city police, may frequently move through stop lights and stop signs without halting. Motorists should never attempt to break through such a column or drive alongside. The motor association advised civilian drivers to pull well off to one side of the street and let military convoys pass under these conditions.

NEW TAVERN OPENS AT EL NIDO SITE

El Padre, a new night club, was scheduled for opening Wednesday evening by John Kandra and Val Valente. Modernistic in treatment and with a color scheme of varying shades of red, white and blue, El Padre is planned as a higher-type tavern with facilities for dining and dancing, private dining rooms, and a banquet room which will hold 75 persons.

El Padre is located at the junction of the Merrill and Lakeview highways, on the site formerly occupied by El Nido. The building is much enlarged and completely remodeled and decorated, with the added feature of air conditioning throughout.

Even the four private dining rooms are air conditioned, and are equipped with public address outlets so that customers can enjoy the music in private.

Featured on the menu are steaks "cut to the specifications of the customer" and chicken.

Mrs. Ella Sutton, formerly of Homedale Inn, is in charge of the kitchen.

A four-girl orchestra led by Berta Gentry will furnish music every night in the dining-and-dancing room made gay by chromium bakelite furniture of red, white and blue.

Besides dinners and sandwiches, El Padre will serve beer, wines, champagne and mixers. A cover charge will be in effect every night.

ECCLES WARNS OF TIMBER SABOTAGE

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 25 (AP)—Douglas county residents were warned last night by David Eccles, secretary to Governor Charles A. Sprague, that the county's vast timber resource is open to sabotage in the event of an attack on the Pacific coast. Speaking before a public meeting called by the Douglas County Defense council, Eccles said that Douglas county, which has more standing timber than any county in the United States, might be transformed into a blazing inferno by an enemy attempting to hinder troop movements and destroy resources.

He outlined the plan for statewide defense organization, stating that, while there is no immediate prospect of emergencies, the United States "cannot escape a showdown sometime, someplace with Hitler."

Much of the defense program planned by the state includes special training, he said, speaking particularly of aircraft warning service, police and fire department reserves, air raid wardens and first aid services.

"It may seem fantastic here in peaceful Oregon to consider air attacks as a possibility," he declared, "but it is no more fantastic than it was to the people of Great Britain a few years ago."

RFC to Construct New Bomber Plant

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—The Defense Plant corporation announced today it would build a \$47,620,171 bomber factory at Ypsilanti, Mich., to be leased to and operated by the Ford Motor company.

The Plant corporation, an RFC subsidiary, said that the land and construction would cost \$31,961,300 and equipment \$15,658,871.

This factory was understood to be an important part of the army's new plan to construct facilities to build 500 bombers a month.
