(Continued from Page One) of about 5 per cent despite the administrator's request that such increases first be submitted to his office.

Henderson said some comment on the developments could be expected from him during the day.

The furniture increase topped previous 5 to 10 per cent price increases applicable to the opening of new lines in New York last Monday. On the same day, Henderson wrote 47 furniture manufacturers that "if such price increases continue in this and other industries, the result will be inflation and demoralization, not only in your industry but over the economic system generally."

Henderson recently proposed to the automobile industry generally that increases tagged on new models be withdrawn.

Chrysler's failure to comply, he said, "is forcing us to take the pricing of automobiles out of the hands of this industry." At the "proper time," he continued, he would report the full facts to President Roosevelt and to congress.

Meanwhile, Henderson said, plans would be pressed "immediately to establish a complete overall price ceiling for new automobile models," extending not only to manufacturers' prices and dealers' mark-up, but also to trade-in values.

DETROIT, June 26 (AP) — Defending its recent increase in retail automobile prices, Chrysler corporation issued a statement today asserting that the advances had added only \$26.62 per car to its net income while recent increases in labor, materials, tools, supplies and other items had increased the cost of production by about \$27.55 per car.

Packard Motor Car company increased prices from \$20 to \$45 on its entire line of automobiles, a company official said today. The increases are effective immediately.

The Packard price increase, according to M. M. Gilman, president of the company, was made with the approval of Henderson.

Williams Enters Not Guilty Plea

J. R. "Tex" Williams entered a plea of not guilty Wednesday morning in circuit court to a charge of forgery, and Robert George Rusk was arraigned at 2 p.m. before Judge David R. Vandenberg on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. Rusk was scheduled to enter his plea at 10 a. m. Thursday.

Dates for trials of Williams and Rusk will be set on July 7. The men were indicted on Wednesday of last week by the new June term grand jury.

BERLIN REPORT SILENT ON WAR FRONT DETAILS

(Continued from Page One) ed, including the Vilna offensive.

The red army was reported in Russian military dispatches to-day to be enveloping the thrusts of Germany's mechanized armies and if ultimately successful the tactic will be the first checkmate ever found for the panzer infiltration.

By the Russian account, masses of red troops, thrown into the breach after passage of German tanks in their drive toward Vilna, Lithuanian, reformed the front, leaving the tanks to be disposed of in rearward action. The French tried it a little more than a year ago and it didn't work.

Russian forces were reported holding tight in the Vilna sector and elsewhere along the 1000-mile active battle front. Russian dispatches said that Przemysl, on the border of German-occupied Poland, had been recaptured in a Russian counter-attack.

Instead of issuing the detailed account of German "successes" baffling the imagination that had been forecast for its campaign, Adolf Hitler's headquarters today continued only generalized claims of success.

As such it was a let-down from the prediction made by military commentators in Berlin yesterday.

Whether it meant that Germany had encountered resistance far greater than she had counted on before she invaded Russia last Sunday—as the Russians said she had—or that the high command simply did not choose yet to name places and give distances was not known.

The language of the communication was restrained. In this it might be compared with communiques issued in the early stages of other German campaigns which showed sweeping success from the start. It said:

"In the east, operations on land and in the air continued on schedule yesterday. After decisions fell in our favor in numerous border battles successes in operations of great dimensions are beginning to show themselves.

Whether she needs it or not, Germany will get active help from Italy against the red army, it was announced in Rome.

DNB, official German news agency, carried today a report attributed to authoritative sources in Budapest that Russian planes had bombed Hungarian territory, causing heavy damage in two villages. Hungary still is not at war with Russia although her territory is one of Germany's avenues to the Russian front.

In four days of air war, the Russians said, the score in planes destroyed was 457 to 391 in their favor.

An authoritative Berlin announcement said that German Stukas had wrecked 15 Russian transport trains filled with troops and war materials.

Russia, he said, had tried to take Finland, "either by decomposition or force," but both methods had failed.

Soviet air raiders kept up devastating raids on Finland today, inflicting death and destruction over a wide area of the country.

Heaviest hit, apparently, was the Gulf of Bothnia port of Turku, in southwest Finland, which was raided 10 times last night alone. Many were killed and wounded there and damage was heavy.

BUILDING LABOR AGREEMENT LOOMS

A new master labor agreement covering all phases of building and construction work was in the making here Thursday between 28 Klamath contractors and the AFL Building Trades council.

Negotiations were begun last week and center around the union's refusal to work with non-union help engaged in any phase of the construction field after July 15. Discussions are proceeding satisfactorily, according to a union spokesman who believed signatures of both parties would be on the contract on or about July 1.

The new proposal covers the activities of 11 separate crafts represented by the council but will not infringe on nor invalidate any individual agreement now in force between the crafts and their respective employer fields.

In effect, the spokesman said, the plan calls for 100 per cent union labor on all construction jobs by contractors or their affiliates.

'MEIN KAMPF' NOT COMING TRUE, CLAIM

By FRED VANDERSCHMIDT Required re-reading for this week in Moscow, Rome, Tokyo and elsewhere is chapter XIV, Mein Kampf, by Adolf Hitler.

One wonders, too, if Hitler is not re-reading it himself in some humiliation.

Contrary to some impressions, Mein Kampf has not turned out to be a precise chartbook for Hitler, for Hitler has betrayed himself, by reason of necessity or convenience, in various respects: For instance, in his expressed desire for an alliance with Britain as well as Italy.

The Russians, however, can now weigh the utter insincerity, from the beginning, of the treaty which Hitler made with them when he had to detour from his course. For Mein Kampf not only dismisses as worthless any treaty with Russia ("we must not forget that the international Jew, who today rules Russia absolutely, sees in Germany not an ally but a state marked for the same destiny. . . . One does not conclude a treaty with someone whose sole interest is the destruction of his partner.")

The book also, by constant repetition, drives home this thought: "Neither western nor eastern orientation should be the future goal of our foreign policy, but an eastern policy signifying the acquisition of the necessary soil for our German people."

Well, Hitler, having failed to knock out England, has gone back to the book and gone after the "necessary soil," and the danger for his foes on the west lies in the chance that he will be able to carve that soil out of the heart of the Russian richlands in six, or eight, or twelve weeks; encircle and destroy the Russian army and turn back again in the direction of England.

In this one military decision he has left his allies, Italy and Japan, dangling unhappily from the frayed threads of the tripartite pact, and he has done so with cynicism and contempt, for as he wrote in Mein Kampf: "An alliance which does not comprise a plan for war is senseless and worthless. One makes alliances only for fighting."

Hitler made the Italian alliance for fighting; Italy fought, but now Italy has expended her fighting strength, and is becoming what Hitler wanted to avoid: One of those allies "who suck like leeches on our own economy." (Again Mein Kampf.)

As for Japan, she was given to believe that by signing the tripartite pact she would be able to complete her advance southward whenever the final assault on England took place. Then, she was told, Britain's eastern strength would be dispersed and weakened and the United States fleet would have gone on guard in the Atlantic.

Japan's unexpected withdrawal from her heavy pressure on the Dutch East Indies is evidence that she suspected some days ago that Germany was about to reverse herself. Now the German assault on Russia leaves British and American defenses unimpaired in the Pacific and it postpones, indefinitely, Japan's original plan of expansion there.

The German-Russian war also cuts off Japan from economic contact with the reich.

Safety Council Says 475 Persons Will Die on Fourth

CHICAGO, June 26 — Four hundred and seven-five persons will start out to celebrate the Fourth of July this year—and they won't come back.

They won't come back because, ironically, they are celebrating a day dedicated to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Some of them will start across the street—never to reach the other side. Others will climb into their cars, step on the gas and ride to their death. Still others will lose their lives in a split-second of horror because someone else forgot to be careful.

None of these people will want to die. None of them will have a premonition of tragedy. Every one of them will think, "It won't happen to me!"

But it will happen to 475, the National Safety Council predicts from its surveys and studies of previous Independence day traffic accidents.

The Council points out, however, that this gloomy forecast need not be fulfilled—that none of these people need die if every driver and every pedestrian makes up his mind to avoid an accident by using skill and caution.

The same caution, the council said, will prevent the other common holiday tragedies—drownings, death and injury from fireworks, from over-exertion and over-exposure to sun.

The highways of the nation will carry the greatest traffic load over the holiday that they have ever borne, the council said. They will be jam-packed with throngs taking advantage of the three-day vacation.

Federal Charge On Morals Count Names Youth, 18

A charge of raping a 5-year-old white girl was filed in federal court Thursday against Clifford Wilson, 18-year-old Klamath Indian.

Wilson was arrested by federal officers after the alleged incident occurred within the city limits of Chiloquin. The officers asserted Wilson took the girl into willows not far from her home. They stated further that physical examination showed the child had been injured in the alleged attack.

U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas set Wilson's bond at \$10,000 and the defendant was incarcerated in the county jail.
