Pay Increases Set For Dairy Workers, Bakery Drivers

Dairy workers and bakery truck drivers were granted pay increases in negotiations recently concluded between employers and the Teamsters' union. It was announced Thursday by Business Agent Earl K. Edsall of the AFL labor organization.

The boosts will guarantee a minimum of \$33.50 per week to bakery driver-salesmen and 52 1/2 cents per hour to all dairy workers whether on inside or outside jobs. Previous minimums were \$30 weekly for bakery men and 46 cents per hour for dairy employees. Bakery employees were also granted a week's vacation with pay.

Under the existing bakery compensation set-up, drivers work on a straight commission basis.

CAB Man Questions Hitler's Plans

PORTLAND, June 26 (AP) — "If Hitler has no designs on the western hemisphere, as he told John Cudahy, former ambassador to Belgium, why is he operating air lines in sparsely settled regions of South America where there is no commercial need?" Oswald Ryan of the civil aeronautics board asked today.

Ryan was here to confer with the state aeronautics board. "Every axis controlled air line in South America is a challenge to the security of this nation and this hemisphere," he asserted.

KLAMATH FISHING SEEN TRAVEL AID

Klamath county is in the heart of a fine summer fishing area and can use fishing effectively in attracting tourists, Frank Wire, state game supervisor, stated at the final tourist guidance meeting held at the Elk hotel Wednesday night under sponsorship of the junior and senior chambers of commerce.

Wire said that he gets frequent complaints from the coast because fishing is not good at the time the tourists are coming through in large numbers. There is nothing, he said, that can be done about it, because no matter how many fish might be planted in the streams, they would not be there in midsummer.

However, he said, in the interior lakes in this territory fishing is good at tourist time. Likewise, he stated, this is a fine bird and deer hunting territory and these attractions should go far in bringing outsiders into the district.

Wire discussed the game commission activities as a whole and went into detail about fishing lakes and streams of the nearby territory.

After his talk, Wire showed wildlife pictures. Final speaker of the tourist guidance series was L. Orth Sisemore, who reviewed the meetings.

PORTLAND, June 26 (AP) — Oregon loggers and sawmill workers of the Columbia river area will start their paid vacation schedules with the close of operations Friday.

Approximately 80 per cent of the camps and mills, employing 10,000 men, have accepted that starting date for the western lumber industry's first vacations with pay. Both AFL and CIO workers are affected.

Employers said that most operations would shut down units although some planned to operate with staggered shifts.

TWO RESOLUTIONS PASSED BY LABOR

Two important resolutions proposed by Klamath labor executives were adopted at last week's Oregon State Federation of Labor convention in Astoria, it was reported Thursday.

The first, put forth by C. D. Long, business agent of the Carpenters' union local, proposed that federation members should use every arbitration or mediation method at their disposal before calling a strike in a defense industry.

A second measure, offered by Long and G. C. Tatman, secretary of the Culinary Alliance, urged that the state legislature require all motorists to carry first aid equipment in their cars.
