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ers said the devastation was as bad as that which marked the Russian invasion of 1939-40. Thousands were believed to have again been made homeless.

In Spain it was reported that Adolf Hitler had demanded a token anti-communist force from each nation of the nazi-ruled new Europe. Spain leaped quickly into the vanguard of the crusade with recruiting of a Spanish legion.

Italy already had stepped in line with announcement of a motorized division to help Germany against Russia.

Volunteer forces were reported in formation in Norway, Denmark, Sweden and occupied France. Croatia was ready to march, Slovakia had marched, Denmark broke relations with the U.S.S.R., and German spokesmen looked benevolently on signs of the anti-red spirit in the Netherlands, Belgium and even Portugal.

Police Capture Montana Pair After Manhunt

"Their confession covers about eight pages now," Sheriff Anderson said, "and the statement is not complete."

RUSS-NAZI WAR AID TO ALLIES, SAYS DR. MUNK

The nazi-soviet struggle may provide the three or four months that will give the democracies the edge in production needed to win the war with Hitler, Dr. Frank Munk, lecturer in economics at Reed college and former resident of Czechoslovakia, told an audience here last night.

Dr. Munk was not hopeful, however, of successful Russian resistance of the nazi attack. He said Hitler had brought to bear all of his well-established and effective methods—fifth column, disunification, isolation from friends and allies, inner confusion—upon Russia and now was moving in for the familiar kill.

Like Locust Scourge

Hitler, the speaker told the large audience in the Fremont school auditorium, has to continue his invasions. He must have a new victory every six months or so. When his armies swarm over a country it is like a locust scourge—they take everything out, moving it back to Germany. It doesn't take long for the supply to be exhausted, and then Hitler must move on for other rich spoils, as he is now prepared to move on the Ukraine.

There will be no revolution in Germany, Dr. Munk predicted, so long as the German army is victorious. The German people have to be provided with new triumphs periodically, in order to sustain their morale. Let there come a stalemate, with no new successes to enthuse about and no more lands to despoil, and the inner situation in Germany may become something entirely different than it is today.

Dr. Munk spoke under sponsorship of the Klamath chapter, League of Women Voters, as a part of the league's "campaign to win the battle of production."

World Rule

The audience of townspeople heard him at the outset declare that "it is not a problem as to which country is going to win the war, it is whether a single nation, or group within one nation, is to become the master of the globe.

This, he said, is now technologically possible. It is accomplished through concentration of physical, economic, political and international power. It was done before, Dr. Munk said, when the Romans ruled the comparatively little world around the Mediterranean.

"Invisible War"

The history of the human race, Dr. Munk stated, is a race between culture and power. "Will we allow power now to overthrow culture?" he asked.

Dr. Munk outlined the "invisible warfare" waged by Hitler against the small democracies, France, England and now the United States. The Hitler program, he said, is based on six points, each described by one word. These are:

- Immobilize.
- Isolate.
- Surround.
- Disunite.
- Blitz.
- Enslave.

He described the application of these methods on the countries which have fallen victim to the German offensive.

After discussing what has happened in Europe, Dr. Munk turned to the opportunities he sees in the world situation.

"What a magnificent peace we could build if we devoted to it all the energy and ingenuity that

is going into war," said the speaker.

Two nations, he said, can decide the world destiny—Germany and the United States. After the war, he said, the United States will control over one-half the world resources, and either it will collaborate in the next peace or there will be no peace.

Recalling his own experiences in Czechoslovakia after the German conquest, Dr. Munk remarked that "unless you have seen darkness you do not appreciate light." He described the oppression and slavery among conquered peoples of Europe, and ended on an eloquent note when he declared:

"Black as the night may be, they still see stars—the 48 stars of the American flag."

Dr. Munk was introduced by Mrs. Harlan Bosworth and Mrs. Fred Heilbronner closed the meeting.

By supervising their departure in one group, it was explained the United States government can assure fulfillment of all courtesies and obligations under international law, and also see that no hitch occurs in the return of American vessels and their families.

On the return voyage from Lisbon, the vessel will transport the 87 consular officials, and an undetermined number of consular employees and their families who are to leave Germany, Italy and axis conquered or dominated countries in Europe by order of Reichsfuehrer Hitler and II Duce Mussolini.

The American consuls and vice consuls to return here include 37 from Germany, 17 from Italy, 10 from occupied France, six from Belgium, two from Greece, one from Luxembourg, six from the Netherlands, five from Norway and three from Yugoslavia.

war's most decisive battles—in the Atlantic ocean," it was declared here today.

Extended American naval patrols have aided the British, but a source here said the real credit for reducing British tonnage losses goes to the Catalina planes and sturdy corvettes because they now are scouting sea areas the Germans formerly considered safe for submarine operations.

One result of what were called "unspectacular but emphatic triumphs" has been to force the Germans to forego their tactics of submarine rendezvous in mid-Atlantic with supply ships, it was asserted. "Scouting flights have driven the U-boats below the surface."

this source said. "They no longer are able to hunt in packs and lie in wait on the surface for convoys."

Another function of the Catalinas has been to keep German long-range Fockewulf bombers away from convoys because these Catalina boats give them a fierce fight and are said to be death on German Dornier "flying pencils."

The ugly and menacing Corvettes have borne the main blows in the Atlantic battle. These craft look like a whaler but carry guns enough to down a destroyer and depth charges sufficient to destroy a flotilla of submarines. They have been turned out steadily since July, 1940.
