

OREGON DRIVE FOR ALUMINUM SET TO START

SALEM, June 27 (AP)—Machinery for a statewide drive to collect scrap aluminum to help the national defense effort was organized today by acting Governor Dean H. Walker and Jerrold Owen, state civilian defense coordinator.

Immediately after Owen received a telegram today from F. H. LaGuardia, national director of civilian defense, asking that the aluminum drive be started without delay, Owen asked all county defense councils to get busy at once.

Owen suggested that the actual campaigns be turned over to existing civic groups, such as chambers of commerce, veterans organizations, civic clubs, women's clubs, professional groups and Boy and Girl Scouts.

He said Dean William Schoenfeld of Oregon State college would be asked to organize county agents for collection of aluminum in rural areas.

The Progressive Business Men's club will sponsor the drive in Portland, while the chamber of commerce is ready to begin at Roseburg, Owen said.

Acting Governor Walker, who telegraphed LaGuardia today that "Oregon will cooperate in every way possible," said that Governor Sprague, before leaving for Boston Wednesday, had made the tentative plans for the aluminum drive.

Governor Sprague, however, held up the drive on advice of the federal office of production management, which said it would sponsor such a drive later on.

The bulk of the scrap aluminum to be collected is expected to be pots and pans contributed by housewives.

Yamhill Farmers Seek Closing of WPA Projects

MINNIVILLE, June 27 (AP)—Unless Yamhill county WPA projects are halted, farmers will shortly face a serious labor shortage, Guy Lang, state unemployment service office manager here, said yesterday.

Lang and Glen Macy, Yamhill county welfare committee chairman, said they had understood last week that seven projects would be closed and the eighth operated with a skeleton staff to free men for seasonal farm work. All projects were operating, however, they said, after closure for only two scheduled working days.

R. L. Devers, chief WPA resident engineer, said he assumed that some projects would be closed down but he had no direct information. He said there were 118 men employed by WPA in the county and if any were offered jobs by private employers they would be removed from WPA rolls. He said notice of any such offers had not been given to him.

Lang asserted that all workers on one project had rejected assignment slips for farm work. Unless the projects were shut down, he said, WPA workers would not take farm employment even though most farmers were offering more pay than that given by WPA. Continued operation was characterized by

him as evidence of WPA failure to cooperate with farmers.

NATIONAL INCOME ESTIMATED HIGHER

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Total national income of at least \$85,000,000,000 for 1941 was forecast today by agriculture department economists, or a minimum increase of \$11,000,000,000 over last year.

Looking beyond 1941, the economists said it was probable the 1942 income would reach \$92,000,000,000 and that the rate of industrial production would be 40 per cent greater than in the boom year of 1929.

These estimates were contained in a special report on the effect of the war and the defense program on agriculture, and most of the economists' findings concerned the outlook for the farmer, which was considered very good.

Given a continuation of favorable weather for the rest of the crop-growing season and a continuation of the war, the farmer may expect 1941 to surpass 1929 in prosperity, the experts said.

Their prediction was that 1941's cash farm income would be about \$10,600,000,000 — \$1,500,000,000 better than 1940.

California Gets Rush Order to Man Aircraft Defense

SACRAMENTO, June 27 (AP)—Creation of a statewide aircraft warning service to guard California and its vital defense industries from a surprise attack from the air in the event of war was designated today as the first major task confronting the newly created state defense council. The service has been given a rush order and will require the setting up of 3000 observation posts, nine filter centers in seven cities, and information centers in Los Angeles and San Francisco and the selection of 50,000 hand-picked volunteers to man them.

Its task, in the event of war, will be to blanket the state with spotlights both day and night to watch for and warn of the approach of enemy aircraft regardless of from what direction they come.

Defense council officials declare that California, with its huge aviation and shipbuilding areas, is considered one of the states in the most danger of early attack by air in the event of war.

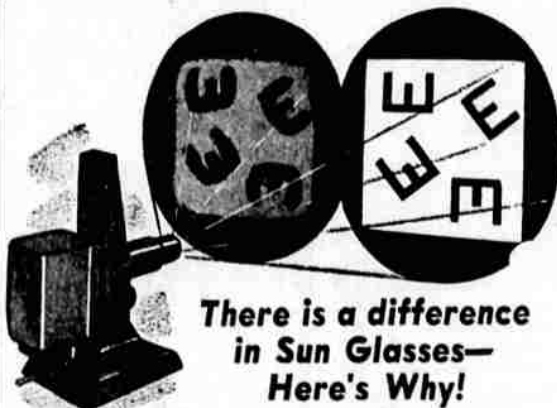
