DR. ROZENDAL NAMED FIRST AID CHAIRMAN

Dr. Peter Rozendal has been appointed chairman of first aid by Earl B. Redman, chairman of the Klamath county chapter of the American Red Cross to take the place of Howard Boyd, who resigned from this chairmanship, due to his transfer to Portland.

The local chapter board feels very fortunate in having Dr. Rozendal accept this very essential appointment, due to the fact he has been interested in the first aid program, and has been the medical adviser on the local first aid chapter. Dr. Rozendal is also a special instructor and has the authority to teach and appoint instructors.

Klamath county is one of the four chapters in the state which has a special instructor appointed by the national organization. One of Dr. Rozendal's first duties will be the setting up of a first aid tent manned by the first aiders to assist local physicians in taking care of any emergencies that might arise during the three-day round up, held at the fairgrounds, July 4, 5 and 6.

Due to the national defense program, the American Red Cross has added responsibility in training all defense workers, industrial groups and the general public in first aid, so that people may be prepared to take care of any emergencies that might arise.

HUGE POCKET PREPARED FOR RUSSIAN ARMY

While the Germans add up their preliminary returns from the Russian campaign, it is possible to envisage, from those reports which are substantiated by the nature of this tremendous military movement.

Along the whole Baltic-Black sea front, the principal danger to the red army appears to be the wedge which the German army is pounding toward the Minsk area of White Russia—a wedge preceded by the groping arms of panzer divisions, and protected on the south flank by the dark morass of the Priwet marshes of East Poland.

This movement, and the corollary pincers which are biting into the Baltic states to the north, are designed to encircle and destroy the whole red army of the west Russian, perhaps a million men. There are indications that the panzers which are feeling the way for the main mass of German soldiery have broken the defenses of the Niemen and are crawling within striking distance of Minsk. This means an advance of well over 100 miles from the East Prussian border, through the undulating plain of East Poland.

Minsk, strongly defended, is an important rail center just inside pre-war Russia, 465 miles by rail from Moscow. For purposes of comparison it might be called the Sedan of the Russian campaign, since it may mark the lower corner of the pocket which the Germans have designed for the reds in the soviet northwest.

The great successes which the German communiques, up to today, have anticipated in glowing generalities may be predicted on the high command's confidence that the fall of Minsk is imminent. The delay in announcing details, however, creates the impression that Russian resistance has at least slowed down the time-table.

Three Die, Three Hurt in Los Angeles Apartment Blaze

LOS ANGELES, June 27 (AP)—Two women and a man, burned almost beyond recognition, died, and three persons were injured seriously as fire raged through the Burton Arms apartment early today.

The dead tentatively were identified as Mr. and Mrs. Goldsberg, also known as Harris, and Miss Alma Vosback. Burned so severely she could not hold on longer, the woman identified as Mrs. Goldsberg slipped from a fourth floor window ledge and fell dead as firemen arrived. The man's body was found in the Goldsberg kitchen and the third body in a fourth floor hallway.

Tenants said they heard an explosion and almost instantly the fourth floor was in flames. Firemen speculated that gas had accumulated and become ignited.

Most seriously injured was Carl G. Wallerstedt, 63. Doctors said his burns might be fatal.

ROADS MUDDY IN PARTS OF BIG FOREST

Muddy and rough roads in many parts of the Fremont national forest were indicated on the forest's road and fishing chart received here from the Lakeview offices Friday.

The trunk road from Lakeview to Dairy creek is muddy, with fishing in Dairy creek reported fair. Stoves and tables are available at Happy Forest camp on Dairy creek.

Deep creek fishing is poor because of recent rains and high water. The road from Warner canyon to Bull's prairie is good. Honey creek-White Pine marsh road is damp, but Mud creek fishing is fair.

Camas creek fishing is also fair, and the road from the state highway to Bull's prairie is fair. Cottonwood fishing is good, but the road from Cottonwood reservoir to Cottonwood meadows is damp.

The road into Dog lake is wet, with fishing in Dog lake fair. The Bly-Dairy creek road is rough. Bly-Barnes valley is also rough.

Fishing in Buck creek in the Silver lake country was reported poor. The forest rated other streams for fishing as follows: Chewaucan river, good; Elder creek, good; Syman river, fair; Thompson reservoir, poor; North Fork Sprague River, good.
