

USO RECEIVES QUOTAS FROM COAST AREAS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27 (Special) — Over the top, but pressing onward toward total victory.

That is the boast of many communities in the eighth region of United Service Organizations. From counties, cities and towns in California, Nevada, Oregon, Idaho and Washington, came reports to regional headquarters here of gratifying support for the USO program of recreational, educational, spiritual and social benefits for the nation's defenders.

Santa Barbara, Calif., with a quota of \$9000, raised \$11,000 in one week and is "still going strong," to quote USO leaders there. Other California communities surpassing their goals thus far include Napa — total raised \$1480 or \$80 over its quota; Vallejo, \$5000 and \$1700; Calistoga, \$200 and \$20; Le-moore, \$600 and \$200; Arcata, \$500 and \$50; also Redlands, \$2500; San Clemente, \$220; Monterey, \$2158; Pomona, \$3050.

Shoshone county, Idaho, has exceeded its quota of \$1200. Butte county in the same state doubled its \$250 quota and is still working on an "all-out" basis.

Two Washington counties — Wahkiakum and Skamania — passed their \$100 quotas and kept right on going.

Lake county, Oregon, was one of the first counties in the nation to exceed its quota of \$300. Other Oregon counties now over include Deschutes, \$700; Jackson, \$1500; Jefferson, \$150; Sherman, \$100; Wallowa, \$250; and Yamhill, \$1500.

As these figures were being compiled, word came from New York the Rockefeller family has contributed another \$15,000 to USO. John D. Rockefeller Jr., personally gave \$100,000, and today the Rockefeller Brothers Fund, Inc. announced a gift of \$15,000 as coming from John D. Rockefeller 3rd, Nelson A. Rockefeller, S. Winthrop and David Rockefeller. A donation of \$10,000 has been received from Mrs. John D. Rockefeller Jr.; \$5000 from Mrs. David M. Milton, the former Abby Rockefeller; and \$750 from Mrs. Laurence S. Rockefeller.

Large gifts to USO in New York City to date include: American Telephone and Telegraph Co., \$100,000; International Business Machine Corp., \$50,000; Chase National Bank, \$25,000; National City Bank of New York, \$20,000; Guaranty Trust Co., \$20,000; Bankers Trust Co., \$15,000 and Commercial Investment Trust Co., \$10,000.

The United Service Organizations was incorporated, at the request of the government, by The Salvation Army, YMCA, YWCA, National Catholic Community Service, National Jewish Welfare board and National Travelers' Aid association. The government has appropriated

Find at Least One Special As Treat for Sunday Breakfast



For breakfast or tea . . . coconut whirles.

Sunday breakfast should have at least one special. Try these remarkable coconut whirles. They are expensive but nutritious.

Coconut Whirles (12 fairly large biscuits)
Two cups flour, three teaspoons baking powder, one teaspoon salt, four tablespoons butter (or other shortening), two-thirds cup milk.

FILLING: Four tablespoons butter, three-fourths cup dark brown sugar, three-fourths cup coconut.

Sift flour, baking powder, and salt together. Cut in four tablespoons shortening with two knives or a pastry blender until the mixture resembles coarse corn meal. Pour all the milk into a hollow in the center of the flour mixture, and with a fork toss the flour into the milk. When the mixture sticks together, turn onto a lightly floured board. Roll the dough into a sheet about 8 by 12 inches. Spread with filling of four tablespoons melted butter, brown sugar, and coconut. Roll dough as for jelly roll. Cut off 1-inch slices and place close together, cut side down, in greased layer cake dish. Bake in a hot oven (415 degrees F.) for about 20 minutes. Serve immediately.
