

PARALYTIC KILLED IN VANCOUVER FIRE

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 27 (CP) — A 59-year-old paralytic died of suffocation and several others were rescued from third story windows at midnight last night when fire broke out in a three-story Dominion hotel in the heart of old downtown Vancouver, forcing 50 hastily-attired guests into the streets.

William Partington was trapped in his room on the first floor of the hotel. Firemen rushed him to a waiting ambulance but he was dead on arrival at the hospital.

The fire started in a small storeroom on the main floor of the hotel adjacent to the lobby. First intimation of the blaze was when the proprietor, John McIntyre, saw smoke pouring from under the door of the room when he was about to lock up the beer parlor shortly after 11:30 p. m.

The blaze was not extensive but smoke filled the hotel. Firemen entered the building and guided several of the guests to windows on the third story where they escaped by ladders.

Only the one room in the hotel was damaged to any extent and total loss was believed to be small.

Cause of the outbreak was not ascertained immediately, nor was there any estimate of damage.

Citrus Fruits Advised to Help Keep Human System Up to Par

Full production for defense! But a man or woman can't work efficiently if he or she is physically below par. Oranges and other citrus fruits play a vital role in keeping the human system up to par.

Oranges are a foremost source of vitamin C, a good source of vitamins A and B, and a fair source of vitamin G. Some of that "tired feeling," often experienced during hot weather, has been definitely traced to a lack of vitamin C.

When a body is exposed to high temperatures, we find a loss of this vitamin from the body tissues. Since vitamin C cannot be stored in the body and is necessary for well-being, oranges or orange juice, or other citrus fruits, should be included in the diet daily.

Buy Oranges Carefully From May through November, the thinner-skinned, softer, juicier California oranges come to market. They contain from one to eight seeds. When buying oranges, steer clear of puffy fruit, creased fruit, excessively light fruit (light in weight), fruit that looks water-soaked, moldy fruit, or fruit that is wilted, shriveled, or flabby.

Don't be alarmed by slight scars, scratches, or discoloration. Rusty discolorations or greenness ordinarily do not affect the quality of the fruit.

Best buys in oranges will be firm, heavy, and will have fine-textured skins. Juiciest grapefruits are thin-skinned and heavy.

Color Guide to Lemons Deep yellow-colored lemons appeal to your eye, but if it's acid quality you want, select the

lighter-colored varieties or the greenish-yellow kind. The deeply colored lemons are likely to have more juice, but less acidity.

Look for fine-textured skins in lemons, and heaviness. Coarse-skinned lightweight lemons are less desirable.

About the same principles apply to limes. The greener limes are more acid than the yellow ones, the heavier ones are juicier than the light ones, and light, shriveled, hard-skinned, or soft limes are likely to be worthless.

Limes and lemons, incidentally, keep better in the home if you store them submerged in a jar of water. They are less likely to dry out or rot that way.

Weekend Fishing Prospects

PORTLAND, June 27 (AP) — The state game commission in its bulletin today said that clear weather this weekend would make fishing good in almost every part of the state.

The report by counties included:

MARION—Santiam river is the best stream at present. Lakes have been fair. The lakes in Olallie and Breitenbush areas now open to trout fishing.

LANE—The McKenzie river yielding good catches of rainbow trout with the best catches made in the upper river. Best catches of trout on the Willamette above Oakridge. Some fair catches from lakes in the eastern part with extra good catches from Gold lake. Siuslaw river and Lake creek fair for trout. A few salmon entering the bay. Ten Mile, Big, Deadwood and Indian creeks fair. Some good catches of trout, bass, blue gills and perch taken from Mercer, Munsell, Siltcoos and Sutton lakes.

DOUGLAS—Fishing only fair at Diamond lake but if weather clears should be at its best for the year. All streams north of Diamond lake are good. Streams in Roseburg district are high and roily, fishing rather poor.

JACKSON — Salmon taken daily from Rogue river from Gold Hill to Trail. Trout fishing in Rogue also good. Applegate and tributaries fair for flies. Hyatt lake fair for bass and cat fishing.

KLAMATH — Upper Klamath lake good to trolling at many points. North and South Forks of Sprague river and Little Deschutes river good to bait and fair to flies in the evening. Odell and Crescent lakes good to trolling in day, flies in late afternoon. Davis lake fair to fly fishing. Wood river and Seven Mile creek fair.

Man Killed by Rolling Wheels From Big Truck

SALINAS, Calif., June 27 (UP) Sidney Beavers, 35, Turlock, was killed instantly today when dual wheels broke off a big oil truck, rolled 330 feet down the highway and struck him in the back. The accident occurred a quarter of a mile south of Gonzales. David S. Golden, 32, Santa Maria, driver of the truck, said the wheels came loose when the axle of his truck broke. He was not held.

COLUMBUS, O., June 27 (UP) Golfers from Stanford, Princeton, Louisiana State and Baltimore Thursday came through the quarter-finals of the 44th annual national collegiate championships over the Ohio State university golf course.

Medalist Earl Stewagt of Louisiana State, who won the Texas open when he was only 17, defeated Ed Gravely, of Yale, three and one in the morning 18-hole round and came back in the afternoon to eliminate Robert Brownell, of Duke, five and four. Brownell had defeated the Kentucky open champion, Carey Middlecott, of Mississippi, one up in the morning round.
