



KANGAROO

Joe DiMaggio poled a single and a home run today to prolong his sensational hitting streak and maintain the New York Yankees' home run hitting record.

DiMaggio's hitting did not keep the Yankees from losing, but it was the feature of an abbreviated major league matinee program, which embraced only three daylight games and left four to be played under the arc lights.

The Yankees were nosed out 7-6 by the Philadelphia Athletics, who produced the winning run in the ninth after the New Yorkers had come from behind to score twice and tie it up in their final frame. Bob Johnson's single and Dick Siebert's double off Red Branch were the blows that broke a four-game winning streak.

Homer Record
When Joe singled the first time at bat he ran his hitting streak to 39 straight games to come within two games of George Sisler's 19-year-old major league record. His home run in the seventh ran the steadily increasing Yank homer record to 36 in 22 straight games.

The Detroit Tigers suffered their second shutout of the season when Bob Harris of the St. Louis Browns doled out four hits for a 9-0 decision.
The Pirates beat the Cubs 4-2 behind Banks Sewell's six-hit flinging. After single tallies in the second and fourth by the Cubs, the Pirates locked it up with a pair of runs in the sixth and the issue was decided in the ninth on four hits—two of them

Bambino Buys Putter, Edges Ty Cobb 1 Up

FLUSHING, N. Y., June 28 (UP)—Babe Ruth bought himself a new putter Friday and used it to square accounts with his old-time foe of the baseball diamond, Tyrus Raymond Cobb.

Playing the second of their charity matches for the United Service organization, the two men battled 19 holes over the Fresh Meadow Country club course before Ruth could gain the one-up victory. Cobb won the first match in Boston late Wednesday, three up and two to play.

Some time late this summer they will play again, probably in Detroit, for both of them Friday showed all the competitive fire that made them stars of baseball years ago. Neither man shot particularly good golf, but a gallery of less than 300 followed them all the way, watching the clash of temperament as much as the shots they made.

Ruth had a 43 on the first nine and a 42 on the second, giving him an 18-hole total of 85. Cobb had an approximate 84, 85 or 86, depending on how much you wanted to give him on the second hole where he picked up after dubbing a shot from behind a tree.

Putting lost the match for Ruth in Boston and Friday he came out with a new club.
"I'm counting on this babe to help me," he said as he hauled the putter from his bag for a few practice shots.

Babe started out as though he was going to sweep Cobb off the course. He won the first two holes, halved the next two and seemed to have his home-run swing in the groove.

When they went out for a sudden-death hole—No. 1 at Fresh Meadow—Cobb hooked his drive, hooked his second and played his third 35 feet to the left of the pin. Then he hooked up six feet from the cup. Ruth, on in three, got down in two putts for a five, Cobb had to sink his six-footer to keep the match alive.

He lined up the putt, bent over the ball and then straightened up again. Once more he lined up the putt and then tapped it.
