PANZERS PUSH TOWARD MOSCOW

In The Day's News

TO date (about noon today) this is the fruit of the world-shaking battle of the type-writers:

The Germans claim: Surrounding of two Russian armies totaling about 400,000 men, and their imminent destruction.

Capture or destruction of 2233 Russian tanks, including 46 52-tonners.

Capture or destruction of 1297 Russian armored cars.

Forty thousand Russian prisoners and 600 big guns taken.

Destruction of 4107 Soviet planes. (The Germans candidly admit they lost 150 planes themselves.)

THE red army (calling the German claims "boastful humbug") gives its own figures as follows:

2500 German tanks destroyed, with losses of only 900 Russian tanks.

1500 German planes destroyed, with a loss of only 850 Russian planes.

30,000 German prisoners taken, with a loss of only 15,000 Russian prisoners.

THERE they are. Take your choice.

On the face of statistics so far available, one is forced to the conclusion that both sides are winning.

UP to the hour this is written, however, the Japs haven't jumped onto the Russians. Before going off the deep end, they seem to want more than statistics to go by.

AMID the clatter of the type-writers (in this preliminary phase of the fighting) keep these highly probable Hitler objectives in mind:

1. Defeat and destruction of Russian military power, so that there will be no threat in his rear when he gets ready to tackle England for blood.

2. Taking over of European Russia's resources for use in the long and world-wide war he foresees if he can't make peace after (or if) he smashes Russia.

A THOUGHT, however, at this point:

Review in your mind the progress of the war so far. You will be impressed by the fact that in his previous campaigns Hitler has done his fighting FIRST and his talking afterward.

In Poland, in France and in the Balkans, German claims in the early days of the fighting were restrained almost to the point of modesty. Optimistic stories came generally from the other side.

The Germans seemed invariably willing to let final results speak for themselves.

Now, suddenly, they are BOASTING AT THE START.

WHY?

This writer doesn't know—and doubts if anybody outside the German high command knows.

This sudden change of technique strikes one as a trifle odd.

THE point is that this sudden Russian onslaught, which is wholly contrary to the assurances that have been given to them, must strike the German people also as a trifle odd.

That may explain the loud beating of the propaganda drums.

32 ARRESTED IN FBI RAID ON SPY RING

Workers in Key Jobs Included in Big Roundup

NEW YORK, June 30 (AP)—Arrest of three additional persons on charges of conspiracy to engage in espionage activities against the United States was announced by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the federal bureau of investigation. The arrest brought the weekend total to 32.

The arrests were announced shortly after seven of those previously arrested pleaded guilty in federal court. Eighteen others, including two technicians described as having been associated closely with the manufacture of secret army bomb-sights, pleaded innocent.

Those arrested today were Conrad Otto Dold, a steward aboard the American export liner Excelsior; Adolf Henry August Walschewsky, a steward aboard the Moore-McCormack liner Uruguay, both of whom were taken into custody when their ships reached here today; and Heinrich Clausen, a cook on the Moore-McCormack liner Argentina, who was placed in the ship's brig at Santos, Brazil, Hoover said.

Bombing Inspector Twenty-five of the suspects were arraigned in Brooklyn federal court and were held for trial July 15 under bail totaling \$425,000.

Two suspects who pleaded innocent were Herman Lang, 40, German-born draftsman who was said to have worked since 1934 as a factory inspector of the Norden bombsight, and Everett Roeder, 47, New York City native. (Continued on Page Two)

YOUTHS NEWLY 21 Must Register for Draft Tuesday

As with all youths in the United States, every boy in Klamath county who has reached the age of 21 since October 16, 1940, must register Tuesday for the draft, the local selective service headquarters has announced.

Four registration places will be open in the county from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m.

Main point will be the selective service headquarters in the basement of the county courthouse but supplementary offices have been set up in the Beatty church, Klamath Agency headquarters, and Community club at Glenhurst for the convenience of residents of outlying districts.

A total of nearly 400 youths are expected to register in Klamath county.

AMERICANS ABOARD TORPEDOED VESSEL

No Death Mentioned By Navy in Note On Sinking

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Torpedoing of a foreign-flag steamer carrying American marines and Red Cross nurses to London was announced today by the navy which said eight marines had been rescued and, for the present, mentioned no loss of life.

The navy did not name the ship which an earlier authoritative source said was the Dutch steamer Maarsden, in the British service. The Red Cross said it had 17 nurses aboard the Maarsden and that all were reported safe, with six nurses already landed.

The source from which first information of the sinking was obtained had said 10 marines were aboard and that one was reported lost. If the figure 10 is correct, the navy announcement would indicate the loss of two marines.

The disclosure that the same vessel carrying marines had been aboard was made by Sumner Welles, acting secretary of state.

The eight marines named by the navy as rescued were: Major Walter J. Jordan, Virginia Beach, Va.; Sergeant George V. Clark, Newfield, N. J.; (Continued on Page Two)

Three Dead, Three Missing in Blast At Indiana Mine

INDIANA, Pa., June 30 (AP)—Three miners are known dead and three are missing from the blast-shaken Kent No. 2 mine of the Rochester and Pittsburgh coal company, its President Heath Clark reported today.

"The other 28 in the pit at the time of the explosion are safe," said Clark. "At least two of them walked out unaided and there is some possibility the three missing men may have done so. We can't tell now."

Rescue crews were advancing slowly into the area shaken by the blast. It is about two miles from the entrance and due to difficulty in forcing in fresh air, Clark said that so far as he knew there was no debris blocking passageways and that coal dust rather than gas caused the explosion.

Jackson Approved For Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, June 30 —The senate judiciary committee approved unanimously today the nomination of Attorney General Robert H. Jackson to be an associate justice of the supreme court.

The committee acted after Senator Tydings (D-Md.) had testified that the attorney general was unfitted for service on the court "by character, philosophy and judicial temperament."

Seven Injured In Collision Early Sunday

Seven persons were injured in a head-on collision about 2 o'clock Sunday morning on the Keno highway, four miles southwest of Klamath Falls, the third serious accident to occur in that vicinity in as many weeks.

Thomas Greene, driver of one car, suffered cuts and bruises as did his three passengers, William Dingler, Route 1, box 802, owner of the machine, Leland Cheyne, city, and Marjorie Botens, Keno route. Miss Botens was the least seriously injured.

Driver of the second car was Lloyd Luke Lotches, 25, Chilquin. He was uninjured, but badly hurt were the three passengers, Mrs. Esther Lotches, his wife; Lyman Warren, 29, white, 133 North Tenth street, and Jack Nichols.

Dingler and Warren are in Hillside hospital, Mrs. Lotches, Greene, and Nichols in Klamath Valley. State police said Nichols was the most seriously injured of the seven. It is thought he has a fractured hip. Of the eight involved in the crash, only Lloyd Lotches escaped without injury.

Senate Votes For Reclamation Project Guards

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—A \$410,000 appropriation to provide a force of about 250 armed guards to protect western irrigation projects, dams and power plants from possible sabotage was voted today by the senate.

It included the amount in a \$1,000,000 deficiency appropriation bill, which must go back to the house for action on the protection item and other amendments.

Reclamation Commissioner John C. Page, in urging the \$410,000 appropriation, had told senators that about 60 dams and other structures in the west were of such importance "that they should be guarded."

Earlier this session, when congress voted \$50,000 for flood lights and other protective installations at power and dam sites, Page estimated at least 235 guards were required. Requirements by projects he listed then included:

California—Central Valley projects, Shasta dam 6 and Delta and other divisions 6; Orland 4. Oregon—Deschutes 2; Umatilla 2; Vale 4.

Oregon-California—Klamath 4.

BROTHER HELD AFTER EARLY MORNING ROW

Nathaniel Jackson, Delegate's Son, Slain Monday

Nathaniel Jackson, 32, is dead, and his brother, Boyd Jr., 22, is in the Klamath county jail, as the result of a bitter quarrel early Monday morning on Nathaniel's ranch five miles north of Sprague River near the Sprague River-Chiloquin road.

Boyd Jackson Sr., well known Klamath Indian and tribal delegate to Washington, witnessed the shooting which occurred about 3 o'clock in the morning in the yard close to Nathaniel's home.

Indian officers said the two brothers had returned from a trip to Reno late Sunday night. They had not gone to bed, but were sitting in the house when they became involved in a heated argument. Officers said the shooting was done with a rifle, but did not know the calibre.

The father told investigating officers he struck young Boyd after he had shot his brother, then placed Nathaniel in his car and drove to Klamath Agency hospital. The young man was dead on arrival at the agency, a bullet wound through his stomach and another through his side.

No Charge Filed No formal charge had been filed against Boyd Jr., according to Special Indian Officer John Arkell, the action pending word from federal officers in Portland.

Boyd Jr. was brought to the Klamath county jail by Constable Clino Roper of Sprague River. His face was bandaged and it is understood he has a fractured jaw.

Nathaniel John Jackson lived near Sprague River for two years. He was a native of Phoenix, Ariz., and said to be a Klamath and Modoc Indian. The young Indian's father, Boyd Jackson Sr., Monday was named a member of the Klamath tribal revolving loan board by Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes. He has long been active in tribal affairs on the Klamath reservation.

Funeral services will be announced later by Ward's Klamath funeral home.

Wheeler Asks Probe Of Naval Action

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) proposed today that the senate investigate whether the American navy has "begun shooting" in carrying out its patrol activities.

Saying that Secretary Knox had declined to affirm or deny rumors that an American warship had sunk a German submarine, Wheeler added in a statement that "it is the duty of congress to determine the facts."

Draft to Call 50,000 Monthly Rest of Year

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—The army probably will call up about 50,000 selective service trainees a month during the last half of this year, and a big percentage of them will come from the ranks of the 750,000 men of 21 who must register tomorrow.

Selective service headquarters, it was learned today, has worked out a system of interspersing the newest registrants in the list of those who enrolled last October.

College Incomes Falling, Claims Board Secretary

EUGENE, June 30 (AP)—Financial troubles of colleges will increase in the next few years, Secretary Charles D. Byrne of the Oregon Higher Education board, warned Saturday.

He said at the closing session of the annual northwest summer conference on higher education that new forms of income—possibly gifts or land grant endowments—must be found to replace declining public assistance.

Student fees have been increased to the "breaking point," Byrne said.

President Charles C. Miltner of the University of Portland said the fundamental aim of liberal arts colleges should be to produce leaders. Failure to do that has restricted the influence of colleges, he added.

Paderewski, Famed Pianist and First Polish President, Dies

NEW YORK, June 30 (AP)—Ignace Jan Paderewski, 80, who ruled a piano for 60 years and a nation for one, died last night.

Pneumonia struck down the first president of the Polish republic and one of the greatest musicians of all time after a two-day illness.

By his side in the Hotel Buckingham were his sister, Mme. Antonia Wilkonska; his doctor, Dr. Asa L. Lincoln, and his aide, Sylvian Starackacz.

The white-haired patriot was stricken with a cold last week and, ignoring his doctor's orders, made one of his many recent public appearances to help raise funds for his starving countrymen.

Three days ago he became gravely ill and yesterday afternoon he was placed in an oxygen tent, only to breathe his last just before midnight.

RAF REPORTS NO GERMAN DEFENSE

British Aircraft Hit Kiel Naval Base By Daylight

LONDON, June 30 (AP)—British RAF bombers resumed operations against French bases across the English Channel tonight, raiding the French coast between Boulogne and Calais for more than half an hour.

Heavy bomb explosions echoed across the misty channel.

Formations of bombers were protected by layers of fighters ready to meet a German challenge, but there was no indication of any fighter opposition to the thrust.

The night attack followed an air ministry announcement of daylight offensive sweeps against the northwest German cities of Bremen and Oldenburg, German shipping and a German island base off the Netherlands.

Kiel, German naval base, was listed as another target of daylight raiders and it was authoritatively reported that one British plane was missing from that operation across the North Sea. (D.N.B., official German news agency, said the British lost nine planes in the thrust at Kiel.)

Three German fighters, it was said, were destroyed in the sweep by bomber-fighter forces over northern France this evening.

SOVIET CLAIMS GERMAN FORCE BEING STOPPED

Berlin Says Russian Front Crumbling In North

BERLIN, June 30 (AP)—Germany claimed tonight that Nazi troops had driven almost half way along the 450-mile road to Moscow, capturing the White Russian Capital of Minsk en route, and asserted that Russia's red army defenses further north were crumbling so badly that a proper front no longer exists.

On the northern front, it was said, German columns were pounding in pursuit of the retreating Russians. Presumably this referred to operations along the Baltic, in Latvia.

A German military spokesman asserted Minsk was in German hands shortly after the high command reported capture of Lwow, on the lower Polish front, and Libau, Latvian port on the Baltic sea.

The spokesman intimated German troops were in sight of Smolensk, 200 miles east of Minsk. A big pocket was being formed around Russian troops in the Smolensk region, he said.

The German armored divisions making these swift jobs farthest east admittedly have left many Russians behind them, to the west, and it was acknowledged that the country across which they have sped cannot be regarded as German-occupied.

Smolensk is nearly 400 miles from the nearest point in the German-Russian border established after the partition of Poland in 1939. It is about 250 miles from Dvinsk, in Latvia, which the German high command (Continued on Page Two)

France Severs Relations With Soviet Russia

VICHY, Unoccupied France, June 30 (AP)—France severed relations with Soviet Russia today and it was learned that at least 200 persons accredited to Russian diplomatic and consular services have been held for questioning.

Russian men and women who were held were concentrated in the stadium outside Vichy where only yesterday Chief of State Marshal Petain gave a flag to the French youth labor camps.

For 24 hours before the decision to break relations with Moscow, all roads leading to and from Vichy were heavily guarded.

As soon as the break became known, the Russians informed the United States embassy. It was not yet known who will take over Russian interests in France but it was expected to be Sweden.

The break in Russian-French relations followed weekend negotiations between Petain and Soviet Ambassador A. E. Bogomolov.

O'Daniel Behind In Texas Election

DALLAS, Tex., June 30 (AP)—It seemed today only a miracle could save miracle-man W. Lee O'Daniel from his first election defeat. A 32-year-old friend of the president, Lyndon Johnson, was all but elected Texas' next U. S. senator.

As counting of Saturday's ballots was resumed this morning, Rep. Johnson, who campaigned on a "Roosevelt and unity" platform, had a lead of 4,561 ballots over the 51-year-old O'Daniel who twice became Texas' governor to the tune of hillbilly music, homey poetry and a smooth radio voice.
