British Counsellor Injured in Jap Raid on Chungking

CHUNGKING, June 30 (AP)—Sir Arthur Blackburn, counsellor for the British embassy, was injured during a four-hour, two-wave attack on this provisional Chinese capital yesterday by 63 Japanese bombers.

The British counsellor's jaw was injured and he was pulled from the debris of the embassy dugout and taken to a hospital. Three other Britons were injured.

Property of the American Methodist Mission, already scarce from four previous raids, was damaged further. One bomb smashed into the Mission hospital, wrecking equipment and supplies of medicine.

Another bomb struck the gatehouse of the residence of The Rev. W. A. McCurdy, of Glen Falls, N. Y., who had left for the United States by plane a few hours earlier. His 13-year-old daughter, who remained in bomb-wracked Chungking, was unhurt.

Vernon Puckett Fractures Leg

Vernon Puckett, about 50, well known Keno resident, is in Klamath Valley hospital suffering from a fractured leg which he received early Sunday afternoon. It is understood Puckett was riding horseback at the time of the accident.

Another riding accident sent Harry Brown of Beatty to Klamath Valley hospital with a badly broken leg, received Saturday night when he was kicked by his horse.

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THREE PARADES ORGANIZED FOR BUCKAROO DAYS

Fehl Plans To File Forcible Entry Case at Medford

MEDFORD, June 30 (AP)—Earl H. Fehl, former county judge of Jackson county, recently paroled from the Oregon State hospital as "mentally capable," accompanied by Attorney Ray R. Hewitt of Salem visited here last Saturday, and announced their intention of instituting forcible entry and retainer proceedings, involving the Pacific Record-Herald property, formerly owned by Fehl.

Tentative date for the hearing on the proposed action has been set for Friday, July 11, before Circuit Judge Carl Hendricks of Fossil. Attorney Hewitt said previous business would not permit him to be present at an earlier date.

The Pacific Record-Herald building, now occupied by a cleaning establishment, has been involved in litigation the past six years. The proposed latest suit stems from a tax foreclosure sale.
