Klemmer Shatters World 400-Meter Mark at AAU

PHILADELPHIA, June 30 (AP)—Coach Charley Hunter of the San Francisco Olympic club made two predictions before the national AAU senior track and field championships—and both panned out perfectly.

The veteran mentor forecast another victory for his squad. It came through brilliantly with 125 points yesterday at Franklin field to win the team title for the third straight year.

Hunter also singled out the 400-meter dash to provide the meet's sensation. It stole the show as 20-year-old Grover Klemmer of the Olympic club raced to a new world record in 46 seconds flat, barely beating a field that was almost perfectly matched.

Klemmer, University of California sophomore, nosed out Hubert Kerns and Cliff Bourland of the Southern California AA, both of whom were clocked in 46.1 which equalled the old

world record set in 1936 by Archie Williams at Chicago.

Steers Second

Three new meet records also went by the books.

Fred Wolcott of Rice institute raced over the 110-meter hurdles in 13.7 to equal the world make and clip two-tenths of a second off the senior AAU mark he established in 1940. Bill Stewart of Southern California AA and Les Steers of the Olympic club leaped 6 feet 91 inches in the high jump to equal the listed world mark and beat the AAU record of 6 feet 81 inches which Steers set last year. Stewart was awarded first place over Steers for having fewer misses.

Cornelius Warmerdam, the Olympic club star who pole vaulted 15 feet 51 inches earlier this year, won first place in that event with a mark of 15 feet.

New York AC with 851 points, was runner-up to the Olympic club for the senior team title with the Southern California AA third with 66 points.

Bud Ward, Betty Jameson Win Northwest Amateur Golf Titles

SPOKANE, Wash., June 30 (UP)—With a bagful of ammunition that even a steady drizzle couldn't dampen, Bud Ward shot a comfortable 7 and 6 victory over Mat Palacio Saturday in a final match of the Pacific Northwest Golf association championships over the Spokane Country club course.

Betty Jameson, national women's champion from San Antonio, Tex., defeated Sissy Green, Oregon state women's title-holder from Portland, by a margin of 6 and 5 for the women's championship.

When the Ward-Palacio match ended on the 30th hole, Ward was three under par while the smiling Spanish shot-maker from San Francisco was six over regulation figures. Ward shot 35's on each nine and was even on

the final nine when the match ended with a bogey half on the 30th hole.

The former national amateur king played his home course almost to perfection. Although occasionally wild with his woods, with which he had been having trouble all week, Ward's iron were superb. His crisp short game and deadly work on the greens saved him what seemed to be certain losing holes time and again.

Palacio seemed bothered by the soggy greens, result of the persistent, day-long drizzle. His short game was off considerably, and on the greens, he just couldn't get his putts down. Yesterday, in his semi-final match with Ken Black, Canadian national amateur finalist, he couldn't miss. Today, he did, and often, and it cost him the match.

Hanauska Hurls Seven Hitter for Loop Victory

Paced by the seven-hit pitching of husky Bill Hanauska who struck out 11 Elk batsmen, the Klamath Falls Pelicans posted their fifth Oregon State league victory in seven starts at the expense of the Bend nine, 6-4, Sunday afternoon at Recreation field before an audience of approximately 600 spectators.

Trailing by four runs in the last of the sixth the Bigbills poked out three straight hits off Pitcher Jim Farmer before Manager Clyde Stoke saw fit to replace him with Bill Hatch, the big southpaw hurler who didn't start the contest because of a sore arm. Paul Crapo promptly doubled off the relief pitcher to drive in the fourth run of the inning and tie the score, 4-4.

Hanauska opened the period by getting to first on an error. Lloyd doubled for his third hit of the day and Bishop and Eyestone followed up with singles that finished Farmer's tenure on the mound.

In the seventh inning Manager Ernie Bishop sent the other two markers across the plate with a single to right. Bernardo and Hanauska led off the frame with singles and Lloyd's infield out advanced them to scoring positions.

WASHINGTON, June 30—Already ranked among the greatest hitters in baseball annals, Joe DiMaggio resolved today to stretch his consecutive game clouting streak so far that it will stand even longer than the 19-year-old record he just shattered.

Joe connected in his 41st and 42nd straight contest to equal and surpass George Sisler's 1922 mark while the league-leading Yankees were taking a doubleheader from Washington here yesterday.

"Here's where the big test comes," DiMaggio said after receiving the congratulations of his Yankee teammates in the clubhouse. "It's going to be even tougher from now on, but I'd sure like to make it last a while."

Battle of Fools Slated For New Showing at Polo Grounds in New York

NEW YORK, June 30 (UP)—The manly art of modified mayhem is expected to attain a new peak of bawdy brawling at the Polo grounds Tuesday night when Welterweight Champion Fritz Zivic and Al (Bummy) Davis settle one of the bitterest feuds in ring history.

For more than three weeks the commission's potentes of punch have been warning "Bummy" and "Thumbby" to conduct themselves like perfect little gentlemen when they crawl through the ropes for their return 12-round non-title battle.

But everyone knows that these warnings will be forgotten or ignored when the opening gong sounds and that the ensuing melee is likely to be even more turbulent than their riotous first meeting at Madison Square Garden last Nov. 15.

On that historic night 17,100 fans witnessed the "most disgraceful" back-alley brawl ever staged in New York state—a tumultuous tilt that ended with Davis disqualified in the second round after blasting Zivic with a barrage of foul hooks to the groin. As Referee Billy Cavanagh stopped the bout, Davis—the Brooklyn "bad boy"—went loco. He broke away from his handlers and tore after Zivic again. A madhouse resulted with police, handlers and officials trying to halt the hurly-burly and with fans tossing anything at hand into the ring. Before Davis was quelled, he succeeded in kicking the referee in the thigh.

Davis was suspended indefinitely despite his howlings before the commission that Zivic had incited the near-riot by persistent fouling in the first round — thumbing him in the eyes, holding him while hitting and using the elbows. Zivic won the first round by a wide margin and had Bummy reeling about the ring.

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
