Men Over 40 Need Corsets, Says California Physician

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)—Dr. William J. Kerr of the University of California Medical School took all the kick out of the modern gag-man's stand-by today by prescribing corsets for men over 40.

Whereas the comedian subtly refers to his girdle, Dr. Williams called it a corset and offered it to delegates at the concluding session of the Pacific Northwest Medical association convention as an efficient means of preventing angina pectoris.

Men, said the physician, are often hoodwinked by their own torsos—they lose weight in arms, shoulders and legs while adding it to their stomachs. This concentrated obesity draws down on the diaphragm, which then can not contract and relax with normal freedom, prevents a sufficient amount of blood to circulate in the vessels of the heart and brings on angina pectoris.

So, Dr. Kerr advised, men should accept a lift from a corset. To punctuate, he added another pectoris was not found frequently in women.

Modern Armies Depend on Weatherman for Strategy

NEW YORK, June 30 (The Special News Service)—Hitler's weather forecasters have been doing very well in aiding his army's campaigns.

There is little doubt that he has several long-range forecasting systems, but they are no mystery to meteorologists.

All countries that maintain a modern weather service have long-range forecasting. But the best of them, over a period, have given only slightly more than 50-50 accuracy.

What Hitler has that other nations may lack is the same advantage he obtained in planes, tanks and guns—namely, the equipment for superior forecasting.

It was generally known among forecasters, at the beginning of the war, that Germany had a very large number of trained forecasters and a close network of upper air observations, all well coordinated.

Such an organization, aided by weather broadcasts picked up from other parts of the world, is in position to utilize its reports to the utmost.

Weather forecasting is more important in today's war than

ever before in military history, because so much more can be done.

Soon after General Pershing's arrival in France in 1917, he cabled a request for 250 meteorologists. At that time, in the entire United States, there were less than 100 forecasters.

Today, outside the military, this country has nearly 300 meteorologists, and in addition there is a large and increasing number in training.

These can tide the army over immediate emergencies. Meanwhile, beginning in May this year, 150 men are being trained for military forecasting.

Possibly no arm of the military service requires longer training. To make a good forecaster takes nearly as long as to make a competent doctor.

A college graduate, provided he has qualified in mathematics and physics, can become a weather map analyst in one year. He is then comparable to a new graduate in medicine. Several years more are needed to turn him into a competent forecaster.

This time can be shortened to one or two years by selecting gifted young men. That is what

the military forces now are trying.

A five per cent improvement in weather forecasting since the days of the world war is the very conservative estimate of Dr. James H. Kimball, New York City's famous forecaster. He was a weather man in the war, he gave Col. Charles A. Lindbergh the forecast for his Paris flight and he is an expert in the newer meteorology.
