GERMANS SMASH ACROSS ARCTIC

In The Day's News

NEWS from the Russian-German front is still confused. Don't get impatient. Picture to yourself a battle extending over an area longer than from Seattle to San Diego, scantily supplied with communication facilities, ALL of which are in the hands of the fighting forces. The fighting forces are much more concerned with the battle than with getting news of what is happening out to a waiting world.

EVEN without censorship, under such circumstances, news would be confused and misleading. Add rigid censorship and you get the present situation. Just wait. The outlines of the story will appear in time.

THIS brief statement from the German high command today is illuminating:

"Soviet armies surrounded between Bialystok and Minsk vainly made desperate attempts the entire day to break out of the vise. These attempts, although supported by heavy tanks, collapsed with unusually bloody losses."

The German attack is following its well-established pattern—panzer columns breaking through, followed by truck-borne infantry; getting in the enemy's rear, wrecking his communications and surrounding his armies. Ceaselessly the bombers pound not only the enemy's troops but his communication lines and the routes by which he must withdraw if beaten.

The purpose is to entrap and destroy the Russian armies. IT won't be enough to drive them out of European Russia. They must be destroyed so that they will not remain as a threat in the German rear when the German military machine again turns to the west.

TURN your eyes for a moment to the home front, where a remarkable thing has occurred. Oklahoma, \$39,000,000 in the hole, is just embarking on a hard-boiled pay-as-you-go policy. This policy was endorsed by the voters as a constitutional amendment last March. It seems to have teeth.

No salaries can be paid. NOTHING can be bought unless the CASH to pay for it is on hand. Officials who exceed the amounts budgeted to their departments become PERSONALLY liable and can be removed from office.

What an odd note in these days! THIS writer, incidentally, is so hopelessly old-fashioned as to believe that only in this manner—that is, by spending no more than there is cash on hand or in sight to pay for—will public debts ever be paid off.

There are halfhearted theories to the contrary, but so far their only result has been more debt. (WE must remember, of course, that in the fix we're in we can't spend much time thinking about paying off the federal debt. We're like a man in a canoe drifting down a current that is too swift and too violent to be peddled against. About all we can do is to go on drifting.)

IN the light of the German attack on Russia, the Hess mystery becomes less mystifying. It seems more and more probable that he is a German agent.

July 1, 1918—Great allied offensive on the Somme begins.

Indian Boy, With Jaw In Cast, Slated to Go to Portland

Battered Boyd Jackson Jr., was scheduled to leave Tuesday for Medford and Portland, to face charges of the first degree murder of his brother, Nathaniel. Young Jackson's head was swathed in bandages and a fractured jaw was in a cast when he appeared in U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas' court for arraignment. He waived preliminary examination.

Father Tells Story
The injuries to Boyd's head were inflicted by his younger brother, Jonathan, after the alleged attack at Sprague River early Monday in which a third brother, Nathaniel, was shot and killed.

Drivers Asked To Assist in Traffic Plan

The city police ask the cooperation of the motoring public in placing in effect the traffic plans for one-way traffic, two lanes wide, on South Sixth street immediately following the parade each day of the celebration, July 4, 5 and 6.

The parade will start at 10:30 a. m. each day and as soon as the parade is over, South Sixth street will become a one-way street carrying two lanes of traffic from Main street as far as the rodeo grounds.

This means that all those who wish to go to the rodeo may do so by falling in line with the traffic on South Sixth street, while those who wish to go uptown are asked to avoid South Sixth street and use one of the adjacent streets. The one-way traffic will remain in effect until the rodeo starts at 1:30 p. m.

As soon as the rodeo is over, the plan will be reversed and South Sixth street will become a one-way street for both lanes of traffic returning to town.

All traffic coming into Klamath Falls from the south will be permitted to enter the rodeo grounds while those drivers who wish to go uptown will be directed onto Crest avenue which is just east of the rodeo grounds, and they are asked to use this street. This movement of traffic will enter Shasta way and thence onto Division street and onto East Main street where it will be possible for them to go uptown into the business district.

"By cutting this map out of the paper as well as this article and putting it in your car where it will be available to look over during the celebration days, you will be spared many inconveniences and suffer less traffic nerves than have been caused in the past from the heavy traffic congestion on the way to and from the rodeo," said Chief of Police Frank Hamm.

EIGHT BODIES WASH ASHORE; OTHERS SOUGHT

Fog Shrouds Mystery Of Cruiser With 36 Aboard

HARPSWELL, Me., July 1 (AP)—The discovery of eight bodies—one of them badly burned—led searchers to believe today that all of the 36 members of a gay picnic party which set out Sunday on the 44-foot cabin cruiser Don Might have perished after fire swept the boat.

The tragedy, the worst in the memory of residents of this rocky coast, apparently occurred in the fog-enshrouded waters of lower Casco bay while the party of Rumford, Me., residents was returning from Monhegan island, 40 miles from here in the open Atlantic.

Explosion Theory
Coast Guard Lieutenant Thomas Sampson, in charge of the search, said he believed the cruiser had exploded, probably while homeward bound.

Wreckage was found as the day wore on, including a life preserver, a bathhook, and a piece of green painted wood. Carlton Smith, one of the many searchers, said that "undoubtedly" there had been an explosion aboard the heavily loaded Don.

He spoke after bringing ashore a body identified as that of Miss Elizabeth Howard, a Rumford bank employee. She had suffered bad burns on her legs and one hip.

Boy Scouts patrolling beaches to aid the search, found a piece of green-painted wood and some scorched cloth—apparently part of a trouser leg. The Don had green woodwork trimmings.

The first five bodies found were those of women. They were identified as those of Miss Howard, Miss Ruth Hemingway, Rumford housekeeper, Miss Bessie Stroppe, Rumford bank clerk, Miss Anne Stasulis, also a bank employee and Miss Arlene Sko. (Continued on Page Two)

(In the past, such Nazi charges have frequently been the forerunner of moves to "protect" the allegedly threatened nations.)

House Considers Taxes on Coin Devices, Instruments

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—The house ways and means committee voted tentatively today to recommend excise taxes on slot machines, office and store machines, and optical instruments, other than eye glasses, in an effort to raise \$3,500,000,000 additional revenue to finance the defense program.

Representative Cooper (D-Tenn.), a member, announced that the committee had agreed tentatively on a \$25 annual use tax on coin-operated devices that pay cash or tokens redeemable in cash or merchandise and a \$5 tax on each machine vending merchandise, such as cigarette machines.

No Estimate
The committee had no estimate of the amount these levies would produce, Cooper said. A 10 per cent manufacturer's

excise tax was approved for optical instruments other than eye glasses and was estimated to yield \$1,400,000.

A similar tax on office and store machines, such as adding and calculating machines and typewriters, would produce an estimated \$18,500,000.

If the house ways and means committee has its way, every privately owned automobile in the United States will be wearing a \$5 federal tax sticker to help raise the desired \$3,500,000,000 of new revenue to finance the defense program.

The committee recommended the new annual levy late yesterday along with a lot of other excise taxes designed to produce about \$733,000,000 of that additional revenue and Chairman Doughton (D-N.C.) suggested that (Continued on Page Two)

O'Daniel Edges Into Lead for Senate Post

DALLAS, July 1 (AP)—Governor W. Lee O'Daniel was leading Congressman Lyndon Johnson by approximately 500 votes in complete returns for all but one county this afternoon in the race for United States senator, the Texas election bureau reported.

The bureau did not announce complete totals but said the margin was around 500 votes and that the ballot in the remaining county would not change the final result.

The only county not reporting was Liberty and the bureau expected to obtain the vote there shortly.

There will be no further report on the result until the tabulation is complete.

Axis Recognizes Jap Puppet State Of Wang Ching-Wei

TOKYO, July 1 (AP)—Germany, Italy and Spain today accorded formal recognition to the Japanese-sponsored Nanking government of Wang Ching-Wei, thereby giving fresh support to the ambitions of their ally, Japan, to dominate East Asia.

Several minor adherents to the three-power alliance of Berlin followed suit. The government's information board announced that Rumania, Slovakia and Croatia had recognized the Wang regime as the national government of China (and in Berlin an authorized spokesman said Hungary and Spain also had notified the axis of their intention to do the same).

GERMANS RETURN TO BOMB BRITAIN

Nazis Report Drives Deep in Ukraine, Along Baltic

BERLIN, July 1 (AP)—Cardiff, Wales, and Hull and Lowestoft, England, were bombed last night by the Luftwaffe with considerable success, informed Germans declared today.

They said a 5000-ton ship was damaged by bombs at the mouth of the Humber river.

Raiders by British bombers against Cologne and the Westphalian industrial area of western Germany were said to have cost the British three planes.

LONDON, July 1 (AP)—"Many squadrons" of RAF fighters made a wide offensive sweep over northern France tonight, the air ministry announced, but sighted very few German planes. There were no casualties on either side.

LONDON, July 1 (AP)—The RAF renewed its daylight raids on Germany proper this afternoon, setting a large fire in a railway yard south of Oldenburg, and a few hours later sent wave on wave of bombers and fighters across the channel to blast at the Nazi-held French coast.

FIGHT POSTPONED

NEW YORK, July 1 (AP)—The 12-round non-title fight between Welterweight Champion Fritz Zivic and Al Davis, scheduled for the Polo Grounds tonight, was postponed until tomorrow night because of rain.

SOVIET ADMITS REVERSES BUT DENIES CLAIM

Heavy Squadrons of British Continue Channel Raids

LONDON, Wednesday, July 2 (AP)—General Sir Archibald P. Wavell, commander-in-chief of British forces in the middle east, was transferred today to the post of commander-in-chief in India, trading places with General Sir Claude Auchinleck.

The Germans penetrated the Russian center today with a thrust by advanced units that carried to 90 miles southeast of Minsk to the region of Bobruisk on the road to Moscow, and pushed back the extreme Russian right in the Arctic front before Murmansk.

Moreover, Berlin claimed that far to the south, on the Polish front, the Russians were in disorderly and costly flight from the Lwow region, and that the river Dvina had been crossed by Nazi troops between Dvinsk and Riga, the Soviet naval base in old Latvia.

Acknowledged
Moscow acknowledged initial reverses in the Bobruisk vicinity and in the far north, but claimed that in both cases a steadfast Russian resistance had defeated all German efforts to further these advances.

The German air force was reported ranging far ahead of the land columns, smashing Russian communication lines in the Smolensk and Odessa regions and dealing punishing blows at Murmansk, on the Arctic Sea.

Klamath Youths Flock to Sign Up for Draft

Klamath youths who have reached the age of 21 since October 16, 1940, flocked to four county registration places today to register for possible military service under terms of the selective service act.

By 2 p. m. 130 of them had signed up at selective service headquarters in the courthouse. They were also coming in to the Beatty church, Klamath agency headquarters, and the Gilchrist community club, supplementary points established through the area for the convenience of up-county residents.

400 Expected
Nearly 400 were expected to register in the county before the 9 p. m. closing hour.

Indications were that a good many of them would be called within the next twelve months to fill the 900,000 quota set by President Roosevelt. They're regarded as far better soldier material on the average than the 8000 men who signed up last fall in the first draft registration. Fewer will be disqualified for physical defects or granted deferment for defense job and dependent reasons.

The national selective service headquarters has as yet given no indication how order numbers of the new "recruits" will be distributed among the present draft list.
