

DEDICATION OF NEW S. A. HOME BEING PLANNED

Tentative plans for the dedication of the Salvation Army's new home at Fourth street and Klamath avenue, to be held on July 27, were shaped at a meeting of the advisory board at the chamber of commerce Tuesday noon.

Commissioner D. McMillan, who heads the Salvation Army work in 11 western states, will be here for the ceremonies.

A concert will be held in the army hall on Saturday evening prior to dedication day. The dedication ceremonies will probably take place in the afternoon, and will include the placing of pictures, newspapers and other material in the building cornerstone.

The Eagles, Elks, American Legion and other groups plan to participate in the services.

Adjutant Norman Bowyer reported to the advisory board that the building plans are moving rapidly toward completion. The army has acquired and completely remodeled the former transfer service building at Third and Klamath, a structure of concrete and brick. Entire cost of the new home will be a little more than \$10,000.

John Johnston presided at the Tuesday noon meeting. A special tribute was paid the late George Walton, a member of the board.
