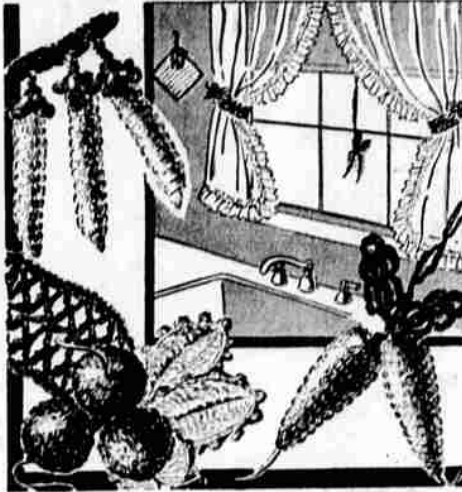

French Motorship Taken by British

NEW YORK, July 1 (AP)—The fast French motorship passenger liner Oregon, well-known in the pre-war Pacific coast-French trade, has been captured by British warships in the South Atlantic in a continuing series of hostilities between the former allies, maritime circles said today.

The 7706-ton ship was reported taken to the British naval base at Freetown, Sierra Leone, West Africa.

Capture by the British of two French trawlers, the 580-ton L'Orage and the Avant Garde,

780 tons, also was disclosed. They were taken to Gibraltar.

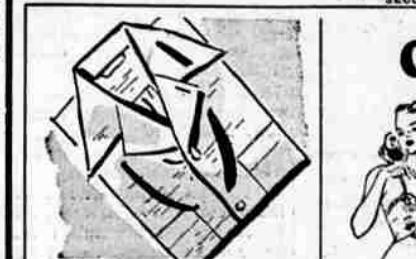

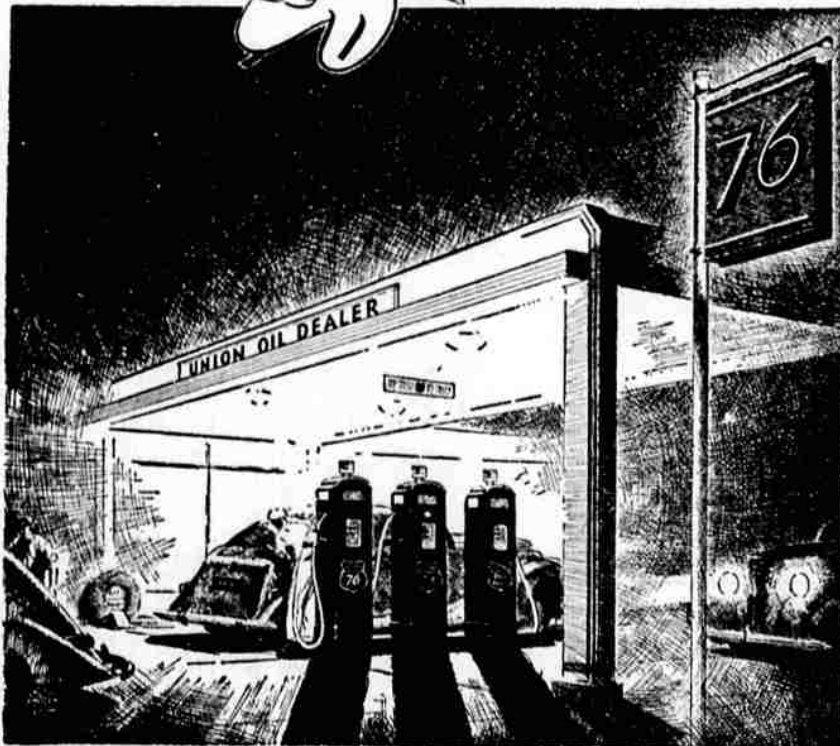
