IN THE FALL
Prospects, says the California Game commission, are better than average for good deer hunting when the 1941 season opens late this summer in our neighbor state.

A food and water abundance from last winter's heavy rains may cause the bucks to be well scattered and hard to find in heavy cover but a marked increase in the number of deer is expected to counterbalance this situation.

By counties it lines up at present with adult deer in Modoc appearing to be in good condition. No fawns have been seen as yet. Buck antlers are beginning to branch.

There's been a big fawn crop in the western portion of Siskiyou county and a very low winter loss. Feed conditions are satisfactory but a large increase of white oak brush and baby conifer may provide a definite drawback to good hunting.

Herds are large and the outlook good in Shasta county. The country has undergone several mild winters and many animals that could not have withstood a heavier season have come through in good shape.

Here's a portion of the latest Oregon State Game commission release:

"Rifles may not be used in hunting China pheasants and other upland birds in any part of the state during the fall bird season, according to gun regulations announced by the Oregon State Game commission.

"This regulation is designed to prevent injury to individuals from stray shots and also is expected to stop the illegal practice of use of rifles to shoot at birds from automobiles on or by the highways.

"All shotguns must be plugged down to three shots when hunting upland game birds during the hunting season. Shotguns loaded with buckshot or bird shot are barred from use in hunting for big game. Guns with less than 1700 foot-pound muzzle energy will not be allowed for antelope. Under the new regulations, guns used in hunting elk will not be allowed if smaller than 30 calibre except when using cartridges with bullets of not less than 1400 foot-pound energy at 100 yards distance or weighing not less than 150 grains."

35,000 Fans Will Watch Non-Title Go

NEW YORK, July 1 (U.P.)—The Hatfields and McCoys were gentle mountain boys compared to those flaming feudists Private Al "Bummy" Davis and Welterweight Champion Fritzie Zivic, who blaze away again tonight.

This return 12-round non-title battle was arranged by army officers, the boxing commission and Promoter Mike Jacobs to settle one of the bitterest feuds in ring history.

Because of the hatred shared by the two principals and the promise of another riotous melee, more than 35,000 fans are expected at the Giants' ball park.

Rarely has such genuine rancor fueled a fight as that which features this second meeting between the two "dead-end kids"—Davis, who became the toughest boy in Brownsville, Brooklyn's toughest bailiwick, and Zivic, who rose from the welter of fists in Pittsburgh's smoky streets.

Despite Bummy's promise to belt Zivic's brains out this time, Zivic is the 3-1 favorite—largely because of his excellent showing in the first round of their November encounter. Experts favor the champion because, at 27, he is far more experienced than 21-year-old Davis. Zivic has been fighting for 11 years, whereas Bummy is in his fifth professional year and has had only 44 fights. However, Davis is recognized as the hardest punches in the welterweight division. His deadly left hook has knocked 25 of his 44 opponents.

Since this is a non-title bout, both principals are expected to scale just over the 147-pound limit at the weigh-in at noon.

Snapp pounded out a decision for the chance. Johnston will hold a four-pound weight bulge but also a glass jaw, if outlying reports are true. He's won a number of amateur scraps in and around the county but was tagged once and recently in Chiloquin.

Opening bouts on each program will find Elton Owen, former University of Oregon athlete, matched with Billy McEwen on the grapple side, and Blackie Smith, facile little lightweight pitted against Frankie Hyde of Dorris.

Opportunity and the Brooklyn Dodgers came together at Ebbets field for 19 games—their longest home stay of the season—beginning Monday and if they fail to pass the St. Louis Cardinals in the National league pennant race during that time they probably never will.

The Dodgers opened this stretch with a 9-2 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies, prize "pickins" for Brooklyn this year, to register their eighth win in 10 starts.

Pete Reiser and Harry Lavagetto paced the Dodgers' 10-hit attack, Reiser carrying his batting streak through 13 games by hitting a homer—his seventh—and a triple. Lavagetto connected for three singles and drove home three runs.

The New York Giants pushed over three runs in the twelfth to defeat the Boston Bees, 3-0, behind Cliff Melton's six-hit hurling. Melton and Manuel Salvo duelled the entire distance, the

Giant pitcher beginning his own rally in the twelfth with a single.

In the American league Johnny Rigney gained his fifth victory when the Chicago White Sox scored twice in the ninth to defeat Detroit, 7-6.

The Tigers went ahead by one run in their half of the ninth when Rip Radcliff's single scored Pat Mullin but the Sox put together a walk, three singles and an error by Rudy York to win, Moose Solters' single with the bases loaded deciding the game.

Cleveland's pennant stock sagged to a new low when the St. Louis Browns hammered Bobby Feller from the mound for the second straight time to trounce the Indians, 12-6.

The Pittsburgh Pirates won their first victory of the season over the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-3, tonight to drop the Red Birds into a first-place tie with the Dodgers in the National league.

Ken Heintzelman gave up 12 hits to the Cards and was in trouble in every inning but managed to pull through to his third

win of the season and the Pirates' third consecutive victory.

Elmer Riddle won the eighth straight victory of his undefeated season by pitching the Cincinnati Reds to a 7-1 triumph over the Chicago Cubs. Riddle allowed seven hits and would have had a shutout except for Clyde McCullough's homer in the fourth.
