

Brooklyn Awarded Six Places on National League All-Star; Brilliant Pitching Headlines American

CHICAGO, July 1 (AP) — A lineup in which a brilliant, youthful pitching staff will be backed up by a crew of distance sluggers will represent the American league in the ninth annual all-star battle with the National leagueers July 8 in Briggs stadium, Detroit.

The American league squad of 25, named by the eight circuit managers, was announced today by League President Will Harridge. On it are six players from the high-stepping New York Yankees; five from the Boston Red Sox; four from Cleveland; three each from Chicago and Detroit; two from Washington and one each from Philadelphia and St. Louis.

Del Baker of Detroit's American league champions, who will manage the junior circuit squad, may have trouble picking his starters for he'll have an abundance of stars for each position. Bob Feller of Cleveland likely will get the starting job on the hill on his 16 won, 3 lost record through June 29.

Should the 22-year-old Feller need help, Manager Baker will be able to signal the bull pen and get moundsmen with everything—youth, experience, ability. There'll be Charley Ruffing, at 37, the dean of the staff, and Thornton Lee, 33, waiting alongside such younger aces as Sid Hudson, Edgar Smith, Al Benton and Marius Russo.

NEW YORK, July 1 (AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers have been awarded six places on the 25-man National league squad for the all-star game next Tuesday at Detroit, but it appeared today the Dodgers would have only five men ready for duty, for Catcher Mickey Owen was in Caledonian hospital with a six-stitch cut over

his left eye. Owen was hurt in the second inning of yesterday's contest with the Phillies, when he was hit by a ball pitched by John Podgajny.

Illness and injury already had taken two of the original nominees, chosen by Manager Bill McKeehan of the World Champion Cincinnati Reds with aid of the other league pilots. Outfielder Joe Medwick of the Dodgers was picked to replace Hank Leiber of the Chicago Cubs, and First Baseman Frank McCormick of the Reds, the league's most valuable player in 1940, to supplant Dolph Camilli of the Dodgers.

Fifteen members of the winning 1940 team are on the roster. Mel Ott of the New York Giants and Billy Herman of the Dodgers have missed only once in the nine-year history of the game.

POSITIONS OPEN IN SIGNAL CORPS

Word was received Tuesday by Lt. Col. B. H. Hensley, district army recruiting officer for the state of Oregon, from the war department that vacancies exist for the immediate appointment of approximately 500 second lieutenants in the Signal Corps reserve under the following conditions.

Applicants must have a college degree, or its practical equivalent, in electrical engineering and have specialized in radio communication, or be electronic physicists. Applicants may be enlisted men in any component of the army, civilians, or commissioned personnel either active or inactive status. He must also be unmarried, without dependents and between the ages of 21 and 35, and be able to meet physical standards prescribed for appointment as reserve officers.

Colonel Hensley states that any man who has the above qualifications should make his

application by informal letter direct to the chief signal officer, Washington, D. C., giving name, address, age, military status, if any, and an outline of technical qualifications and experience.

Russian Trade Boosts Portland Export Reports

PORTLAND, July 1 (AP) — Shipments to Russia boosted Portland exports to \$16,600,000 for the first six months of this year, compared with \$9,548,000 in 1940 and \$13,488,880 two years ago.
Approximately \$8,000,000 of the total was shipped to the Soviet, the merchants' exchange said. A large proportion of June's \$3,473,699 exports went to Russia, and shippers predicted the trade would continue if Russia held off the German army. Customs receipts were \$1,055,412 for the fiscal year, the fourth consecutive year of decline, but imports for the first six months of this year totaled \$635,000, compared with \$559,557 in the first half of 1940.
