

CHILOQUIN USO DRIVE EXCEEDS QUOTA BY \$100

Chiloquin exceeded its quota in the United Service organization drive by more than \$100, it was announced Wednesday by L. K. Johnson, drive chairman. Chiloquin's quota was \$75. The community contributions totaled \$180. Mrs. Arthur Blocklinger was local chairman of the USO campaign at Chiloquin.

Campaign officials expressed confidence Wednesday that Klamath county's quota will be reached in a day or two, if it has not already been passed but not fully reported.

Total cash on hand Wednesday noon was \$1905.53.

Several outside points and mill teams had not been heard from, and it was believed the funds collected by these groups may already have put the drive over the top.

Fats Waller's 'Beginnings' In Music Career Revealed

"Fats" Waller, famous radio and recording star, will be on hand, (with his noted broadcasting orchestra) on Wednesday, July 9, at the Klamath armory.

Songwriter, virtuoso of the piano, organ and violin, and master-of-ceremonies extraordinary, Thomas "Fats" Waller was born in New York on May 21, 1904, the son of a minister. "Fats" played the organ and sang in the choir of the Abyssinian Baptist church in Harlem, where his father preached, until his 15th year. Then, over parental protests, he accepted an offer to sing and play at Lefty Wilkin's cabaret. Here he remained until 1924, doubling occasionally as a theatre organist and making "piano rolls" for the Q-R-S company.

The next year Waller appeared in vaudeville with the famous blues singer, Bessie Smith; later, wrote the music for the show, "Keep Shufflin'," and, next, toured the Public theatres as organist. In 1930 he wrote the lyrics for the musical comedy, "Hot Chocolates," and at the close of this show went abroad where he sang and played in the leading night clubs of London, Paris, Berlin and Vienna. On his return to the United States he

joined WLW in Cincinnati, and in March, 1933 made his debut from WABC over the Columbia network. During the past four years he has been heard regularly over NBC and CBS on his own sustaining spots and as guest star on other leading programs. He has also recorded extensively for Victor and has been featured in the RKO picture, "Hooray For Love" and 20th Century-Fox production "King of Burlesque." More recently the colored star has been touring, with sensational success, at the head of his own dance orchestra.

State Court Denies Fehl Appeal to U. S. Supreme Court

SALEM, July 2 (AP)—The state supreme court refused Tuesday to permit Earl H. Fehl, former Jackson county judge who was paroled several days ago from the state hospital, to appeal to the United States supreme court in his fight to have invalidated the proceedings in which he was committed four years ago to the state hospital.

The decision today was announced orally by Chief Justice Percy J. Kelly.

Circuit Judge Carl Hendricks of Fossil ruled that Fehl's insanity proceedings were regular, and the state supreme court upheld the United States supreme court.

Fehl wanted outright release from the hospital, rather than a parole. He said a few days ago that he would appeal to the U. S. supreme court for the outright release.

S. P. REESTABLISHES SHASTA DIVISION

Southern Pacific's Shasta division, which was merged with the Sacramento division in 1932, was reestablished Tuesday according to announcement by L. B. McDonald, general manager of the railroad.

E. F. Nassoly, district superintendent in the Shasta area of the present Sacramento division, will become superintendent of the Shasta division, McDonald said. Nassoly's headquarters will be in Dunsmuir, where the district office has been maintained.

The limits of the reestablished Shasta division will be practically identical with those in effect before the merger with the Sacramento division, it was stated. Beginning at Gerber, on the south, they will extend north to include Ashland on the Siskiyou line and to run as far as Crescent Lake on the Cascade line to Portland.

From Klamath Falls, the Shasta division will also extend southeast to and including Alturas on the line which ties in with the overland route at Ferry, Nev.; and from Alturas will include the Lakeview branch which runs north to Lakeview, Ore.

The limits of the Sacramento division, one of the largest and most heavily traveled of the company's units, will be correspondingly reduced in the interest of operating efficiency.

Expedition of national defense

traffic and the handling of greatly increased freight and passenger business of all kinds over the Shasta route were given as the reasons for reestablishment of the Shasta division at this time. T. F. Custer has been appointed assistant superintendent of the new division with headquarters at Dunsmuir. He was promoted from the position of chief dispatcher.

NEW FREIGHT CARS ORDERED BY S. P.

Orders for 4,000 new freight cars, to cost approximately \$12,700,000, have just been placed by the Southern Pacific company, according to word received by local representatives of the railroad.

The order calls for 2100 box cars of 40-foot-6-inch length, 500 box cars of 50-foot-6-inch length, 700 gondola cars, 150 hopper cars, 300 flat cars, 200 tank cars of 12,500-gallon capacity and 50 tank cars of 8,000-gallon capacity.

Deliveries are scheduled to start in January, 1942, it was stated.

FINLAND APPROVES HOOVER'S SPEECH

HELSINKI, Finland, July 2 (AP)—The Finnish press and public expressed approval Tuesday of a Sunday speech by former President Herbert Hoover in which he declared "the idealized war to bring freedoms to the world died spiritually when

we made that promise" to aid soviet Russia.

The Helsinki newspaper Sanomat summed up:

"It is sure that Hoover's voice is not alone in America and that it will find echoes around the civilized world."

Recalling American aid to Finland during the soviet winter invasion of 1939-40, the paper added: "It seems an unnatural impossibility that civilized, liberty-loving America can support mankind's worst enemy, who has attacked us for the second time within two years."

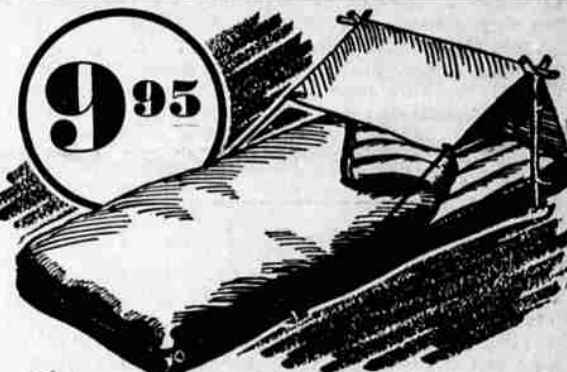

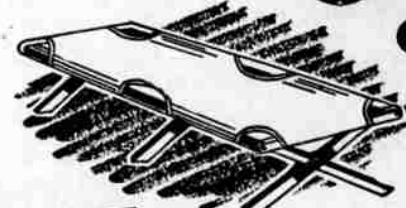
