Welcome the Army

BEGINNING Thursday, the army convoys will return to Klamath Falls, with hundreds of young men thronging the city as they did a few weeks ago when the troops moved south. Presence of troops in the city in the holiday period of the coming weekend should add much to the gala atmosphere and it looks like a big weekend.

Klamath's record as host to the troops on their southward movement was excellent. Now, with that experience to help, it should do an even better job of entertaining the soldiers. Careful plans have been laid by a chamber of commerce committee, and all that is needed to assure success is public cooperation. On the basis of the previous experience, no one doubts that cooperation is forthcoming.

The troops will use the same bivouac facilities, west of town on the Kesterson mill road. These grounds were generally praised by both men and officers, and were declared far superior to some of the camping spots in other communities. The grounds are about five miles from town, and townfolk who want to help play host to the visitors will find the lads most happy to get lifts to and from the campsite.

Over the Willamette

ON the northbound trek to Fort Lewis from Hunter Liggett reservation, the army columns using the east route will go by way of the Willamette highway after passing through Klamath Falls. When the columns went south, they came over Wapinitia and the northern stretches of The Dalles-California highway.

An interesting angle on the army's use of the Willamette is that a military road through the Willamette pass country was surveyed in the early days. The name "Military Crossing" at Mowich came from that source. Many old-time wagon roads were of more significance for the land grants that went with them than for traffic they carried, and it is very probable that the forthcoming military use of the Willamette highway will be far greater than any ever made of the old "military route."

People interested in the Willamette highway will be gratified at the recognition of this route in selection for the troop movement.

Finland's Choice

FOR those who insist on being strong for one side or another in every row that starts, it may be a little difficult to make up one's mind about Finland.

Everybody in the United States was pulling for little Finland when it was attacked by big Russia, and Russia was then recognized as a totalitarian aggressor. Germans, who had helped Finns in an earlier day win away from Russia and communism, sat by this time and let the Finns take it on the chin. Now, in a new phase of the war, the Finns are again fighting Russia, and the United States is preparing to give what aid it can to the Reds. The Germans, who wouldn't help the Finns two years ago, now have lined them up on their side of the new Nazi-Soviet battle.

Looking at it realistically, the Finns had no other choice than that they have made. It is unfortunate that Americans, who like Finland, find it lined up on the other side of the crazy international set-up. The best we can do is to hope that Finland, somehow, comes out of the fracas free of both of its big, brutal, unpleasant neighbors.

ON SMOKES AND DRINKS

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (To the Editor)—I mentioned in a previous article how the liquor interests are taking advantage of the concentration of our young men in training camp to further their own interests, and that a determined effort is being put forth to check them.

The liquor and tobacco interests never learn by past experience. I mentioned the two together because they have much in common. Horace Greeley once said, "Show me a drunkard who does not use tobacco and I will show you a white blackbird."

The gaudy billboards and other advertising, on which this and that brand of liquor or tobacco are displayed, as though one has to use them or be old-fashioned, are an insult to the intelligence of the American people, for they are lying and we all know it.

During the last seven years of repeal, 15,000 local option elections have been held, over 11,000 of which have gone dry. In fact, over three fourths of several states are already dry, and over 800 wet newspapers have gone dry, and many of our large newspapers are refusing to accept liquor advertisements.

The congressmen who sponsor the repeal amendment now realize that they made a mistake and frankly admit it. Senator David I. Walsh recently denounced the repeal measure as a "hopeless and intolerable failure, and much worse than national prohibition."

Congressman O'Connor of New York, an ardent repealer, recently said on the floor of congress: "If the condition that exists today is what we must have as a result of repeal, give me prohibition."

Another repealer, Congressman Fitzpatrick expressed himself on the floor of congress in this way: "The bootleggers before the repeal of prohibition were mere pickers as compared

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, July 1—That bleak report from the house military affairs committee criticizing the defense program for "confusion," "failures" and "unwarranted delays," came out only over the flattened frames of administration leaders. Speaker Rayburn and House Director McCormack worked on the full committee hard and long to keep it from adopting the critical viewpoint of its subcommittee.

At one time they mustered ten votes against the report in executive session, but there were eleven in favor of caustic publicity.

Behind the report was one man, Representative Charles I. Faddis, lieutenant colonel overseas in the last war and a soldier who knows the business. He was chairman of the investigating sub-committee. Faddis is 100 per cent for the Roosevelt foreign policy, but the best friend and severest critic of the war department. Tall, slender, with military bearing, around 50 years old, he was the dynamo who started the promotion of raw material stock piles, the first move toward preparedness.

When he started his investigation he announced there would be no sensationalism but also no whitewashing. He kept his promise.

MORE DRAFTS

Mr. Roosevelt will call up 900,000 more draftees and implied this would require release of the training 650,000 at the end of their year—but don't plan your life in expectation that it will work out that way.

The unnoted facts are these: The draftees will not have enough training to be a match for a good military school. Their service expiration dates will start in December. There is plenty of time remaining in which everyone can change his mind. War department frankly concedes no one will be released if war comes before December.

The army is planning its housing arrangements, however, only to accommodate 900,000 at a time, so there will be a critical housing shortage if many current trainees stay on.

What would be ideal in army

opinion would be release of older draftees, over 28 years of age, and induction or retention of the able-bodied youngsters. That is the way it is likely to turn.

STALIN'S PLAN

If Stalin's army is routed, there is reason here to believe his plans call for a retreat of his government to the far east. He will probably take control of the strong autonomous red army of Siberia. This would be if he alone escapes. He even is in a position to maintain the international communist organization and a communist state. With this strong force he could also work for the future, with his friends in China.

Consequently no one expects him to try to get out through Persia and seek refuge in England or Mexico.

PLAN FOR RUSSIA

Hitler's plans for Russia, in expectation of victory, are believed to include the inauguration of two formidable new states, one grouping the Baltic nations and the other for the Ukraine, under his own domination, of course. His program for the remainder of European Russia is not understood here except through some vague information from Berlin, suggesting he wants "a lot of little states."

Hitler troubles in Russia will not be over even if he exterminates the red army. His experience with the peasants in Poland was only a mild forerunner of what he can expect. They will not relish turning over their products to the nazis, and are adept at passive resistances.

The Russian railroads are bad and the highways worse. The Russian track is six inches wider than German tracks, and therefore cannot be readily converted to German use. He may be kept busy in Russia for a long time.
