

SPRAGUE SEES LOSS IF JAPS STRIKE SOUTH

BOSTON, Mass., July 2 (AP) Governor Charles A. Sprague of Oregon said today that if the United States permits "Japan to consummate its southward thrust," America would be deprived of such essentials as rubber, chromite, tin, tungsten and hemp.

In an address prepared for the National Conference of Governors, Governor Sprague said: "I do not mean for this statement to be provocative as against Japan. There should be no appeasement with Japan; there should be continued and expended aid to China; there should be no precipitate action on our part to provoke warfare with Japan."

The Oregon governor said he was confident that China, "which has been ruthlessly set upon by Japan as aggressor," "would ultimately be victorious," asserting that in the past two years Japan has made no important gains against China.

"We of the Pacific coast," he said, "would hate to see an interruption of the long friendly commercial and cultural relations we have enjoyed with Japan. But in the present impasse our sympathies lie strongly with China. We should be ready in Asia, as in Europe, to make history record that the way of the aggressor is hard."

Governor Sprague said that "Japan, in desperation, may gamble for the high stake of power in the Far East," and that the Russo-German war might end up with Germany or Japan, or both, opposite Alaska. This, he said, would "jeopardize our Pacific security."

America's policy in the Pacific is "informed, definite and I believe will be vigorous. The prime need is for popular understanding of the problems of the Pacific, so there may be, on the part of the government, neither lethargy nor hesitancy through fear if a time for action arrives."

Ice Cream Isn't Just An Extra --It's a Real Food on Menu



For a surprise treat... home-made ice cream.

Home-made ice cream is an ideal hot weather dish. Remember that it's a food. If you include ice cream in your menu, consider it an integral part of the diet, not just something extra.

Apricot Ice Cream
(Makes 2 quart)
One-half package (scant 1/3 cup) vanilla ice cream powder, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 cup milk, 1 cup cream, whipped, 1 cup dried apricots, cut in thin strips.

Combine ice cream powder and sugar. Add milk very gradually, stirring until dissolved. Fold in whipped cream. Turn into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator, setting control for coldest freezing temperature. Stir when frozen 1 inch thick on sides and twice more at 20-minute intervals, adding apricots with third stirring. Freezing time: about 3 hours.

Peach Ice Cream
One-half cup peach jam, 1 cup undiluted evaporated milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 3 or 4 drops almond extract, 2 cup heavy cream, whipped to a custard-like consistency.

Add evaporated milk to peach jam and stir until blended, add salt and almond extract, then fold in the heavy cream whipped to a custard-like consistency. Freeze in refrigerator tray until mushy; remove from refrigerator, scrape bottom and sides, then beat until smooth.

Return to refrigerator and freeze for 34 hours. (This is a very economical method.)

Here is a delicious raspberry sherbet that can be made in an ordinary crank freezer. The recipe may be halved, if necessary.

Raspberry Sherbet
(8 to 10 Portions)
Two pint boxes red raspberries, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup water, pinch of salt, juice of 1 orange, 2 egg whites.

Wash berries, crush and cover with sugar and water. Allow to stand a few minutes. Heat to boiling and strain through fine cloth. Chill. Add salt, orange juice, and egg white. Freeze in crank freezer. One part rock salt to eight parts crushed ice is good proportion for sherbet. Turn slowly to produce fine texture, increasing the speed the last few minutes to increase bulk.

Motorists and Pedestrians Given Timely Warning

Practically every motor vehicle accident involves at least one violation of traffic regulations. Dr. E. B. McDaniel, president of the Oregon State Motor association, declared today in urging both motorists and pedestrians to drive and walk cautiously as Oregon enters the period of the year when automobile accidents begin to soar with increased travel.

"Accident statistics show conclusively that improper driving and walking acts make accidents happen," Dr. McDaniel said. "As a matter of fact, three out of five fatal accidents involving car crashes can be attributed to driving faults, including speeding and other types of unsafe car operation."

"This relationship between violations or improper practices and accidents is not confined only to motorists, but shows up when accidents involving pedestrians killed by motor vehicles

either violated a traffic rule, or acted in a careless manner. Reports to the American Automobile association, with which the Oregon State Motor association is affiliated, show that thousands of pedestrians are injured because they cross streets against red traffic lights, cross in the middle of the block, cross from behind parked cars, or fail to face traffic when walking on rural roads.

TIGHT FAN BELT
One of the most common causes of a mysterious humming noise in the engine is a fan belt that is too tight, according to the Emergency Road Service of the Oregon State Motor association. Not enough slack will put extra pressure on the fan bearing, causing the hum. In time such a condition may damage the bearing.
