

OIL COMPANY HEAD BOOSTS FREE PRESS

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP)—"Freedom of speech is the most important of the liberties guaranteed in the bill of rights. Therefore, says President Reese H. Taylor of the Union Oil Co.: "It is the duty of every factor of our economy to help maintain a free press, because in so doing they not only safeguard the rights of the people, but they insure their own right to continued existence."

Taylor's remarks were prepared for his keynote address today to the Pacific Advertising Clubs association convention. "Wars," Taylor said, "when stripped of their emotion, are economic. Our insistence is that Americans be enabled to go about their business when, where, and as they see fit. So we again stand beside England (as in 1916) with all our resources, and all our strength."

"Through its advertising dollars, business enables the press, the radio and other media of expression to remain solvent. And only through solvency can independence of the press—or any other medium—be maintained. "Maintenance of a free press not only requires a solvent one, but also a rigid adherence to the right of the people to receive truthful, fair and fearless reporting of the news. "Advertisers, or their agents, must recognize that they are purchasing newspaper space, and not the editorial policies of the paper."

WAGE CUT, LONG HOURS APPROVED

OAKLAND, Calif., July 2 (AP)—A group of AFL workers Tuesday voluntarily lengthened their hours and reduced their overtime pay rate to eliminate an industrial bottleneck.

In announcing the action taken by Local 88 of the AFL, Union and Metal lathers, business representative J. C. Reynolds of the Alameda County Building Trades council predicted other unions would take similar action. "This is our answer to Hitler and his methods," Reynolds said. "We will get out production if we have to work 24 hours a day to do it."

The lathers lengthened their work day from six to eight hours. The overtime rate was cut from double time to time and a half. The five day week and the \$1.60 an hour wage were continued. Three hundred men in Alameda county were affected.

Modern Bridges Heckle Engineers

The average motorist rolling along the superhighways of today does not realize that perhaps the greatest change from the outmoded highways of yesterday is the construction of the frequent bridges he is crossing, according to E. L. McDougal, director of the Oregon State Motor association.

Previously, modest structures separating the grades of the highways and railroad tracks, crossing at right angles and at physically favorable locations only, were constructed. Engineers then grew bolder and in order to preserve the desired alignment, designed their structures to cross the rivers and railroads at a considerable angle, or even on a curve.

The motor club director pointed out that the present practice of building bridges at a "skewed" angle so that there will be no sharp curves on approaches is largely a demand for a sharp angle of crossing over the river that the bridge engineer is hard put to decide when, if ever, he has reached the opposite bank and can stop his bridge. Furthermore, it is now often necessary to locate a crossing where the terrain is less favorable or the foundation material is less solid than it is at some other point nearby.

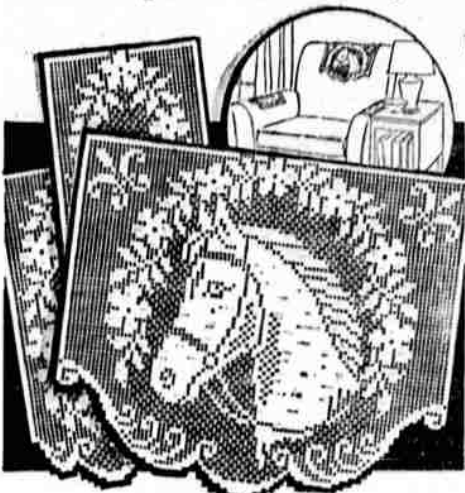
McDougal said that in modern highway construction bridges and the adjoining road can no longer be considered as separate structures. The finest engineering on each unit can be completely thwarted if the two structures aren't designed as a combination.

Start Week Off By Using Those Leftovers From Sunday Dinner

Leftovers from Sunday can get a new start on Monday. That's an economy rule for good eating.

MEAT SHORTCAKE FARM STYLE

Two cups cubed cooked veal, 1 cup cooked peas, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup milk, 4 slices crisp bacon, 1 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 recipe (2 cups flour) biscuit dough.

Combine butter and flour and add milk to make a cream sauce. Add the veal, peas and seasoning. Roll the biscuit dough and bake in two layers. Place one layer of biscuit on a platter and pour the meat mixture over. Top with the other layer of biscuit, and garnish the top with bacon, paprika, butter squares, and a tablespoon of cooked peas.

TURKISH BEEF STEW

Dice cold cooked beef. Brown in butter. Add 4 tablespoons of tomato catsup, 1 chopped onion and 1 green pepper which have been cooked until tender, but not brown, in butter. Season with salt and black pepper. Add enough stock or gravy to moisten. Heat thoroughly and serve in a border of fluffy boiled rice.

BEEF LIVER BALLS AND SPAGHETTI

One and one-half pounds liver, 2 cups cracker crumbs, 1 grated onion, 4 tablespoons lard, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon marjoram, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 3 tablespoons lard, 1 small onion, 1 cup tomatoes, 1 package spaghetti.
Parboil liver and put through meat chopper. Mix thoroughly with other ingredients, adding enough liquid in which liver was cooked to moisten. Shape into balls.

Brown 1 small onion in 3 tablespoons lard. Add tomatoes and simmer 20 minutes. Cook spaghetti in boiling water until tender. Mix with tomato sauce

and place in a greased casserole. Place liver balls on top and brown in a hot oven.

HAM CASSEROLE (Serves 6)

One and one-half cups cooked ham, diced, 1 cup cooked carrots, diced, 1/2 cups boiled potatoes, sliced, 2 cups cream of mushroom soup or 2 cups medium white sauce, 1 cup bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons butter.

Arrange ham, ground or diced, and sliced potatoes and carrots in layers in a buttered casserole.

MENU

BREAKFAST: Honeyball melon, scrambled eggs, hot muffins, apricot preserves, coffee, milk.

LUNCHEON: Cream of tomato soup, hot biscuits, preserves, tea, milk.

DINNER: Turkish beef stew, lettuce salad, enriched bread, butter, apple Brown Betty, coffee, milk.

Pour over each layer cream of mushroom soup or sauce. (Note: If cream of mushroom soup is condensed, thin with milk or cream.) Cover with crumbs dotted with butter. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 30 to 40 minutes.

CHURCHILL UNSURE OF WAR DURATION

LONDON, July 2 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill told a group of Canadian officials who landed in England Tuesday that "the day may be far off—we can not tell."

The premier received from Canadian Air Minister G. C. Power, who made the flight, a "victory torch"—Canadian symbol of faith in the ultimate defeat of the axis, and thanked Canada for assurance that it would "continue to the end."

When that end might come, he said, depends upon Britain's energy.

"How long he will resist we can not tell. How long that wicked man will torture and afflict nations or how often or in what direction he will set his murder machine in motion we can not tell," he said.

"One thing we are assured of. He and his villainous crew will be delivered to the doom and shame which is their due and we ourselves shall have the honor of having had something to do with it."

Power landed in England today and immediately flew to London.

He came to Britain with Air Vice Marshal Broadner, Air Commodore Harold Edwards, several other Canadian airmen and his secretary.

It was understood he made the flight to dispose of a number of administrative questions it was felt could be settled only by direct contact with the air ministry.

Waters Searched For Missing Man

OLYMPIA, July 2 (AP)—Waters of Budd's inlet were being searched early today for the body of Homer L. Wolf Jr., Olympia automobile dealer, believed to have been drowned sometime during the night, police reported.

Wolf is believed to have fallen into the water during a trip from the Olympia Yacht club to the Country and Golf club dock where his wife waited for him until after midnight.

Police said that Wolf apparently attempted to tow his 30-foot launch with the dinghy after motor trouble developed. The larger boat was found off the log booms beyond the port dock, the dinghy alongside with the anchor and rope fastened as though for towing. The hood to the motor compartment of the small cruiser was open, police said, indicating motor trouble had developed.

Wolf is the son of Homer L. Wolf, pioneer Yelm farm equipment and general merchandise dealer.

'NO GRAVY' POLICY OF PUBLIC WORKS

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—A "no gravy" policy for the \$150,000,000 defense public works program was announced Tuesday by John M. Carmody, federal works administrator, as he set up operating machinery to aid in building health, water, school and other essential facilities in communities facing phenomenal growth because of defense activity.

Warning against any effort from any source to derive private profit from the program, Carmody said "this money must go as far as possible. There is no gravy in for any contractors, none for promoters. The quickest way to slow down a project will be to pay somebody a handsome fee."

The program recently was authorized by congress. Carmody created 11 regional offices.
