enemy, guerilla units, mounted and foot, must be formed, diversionist groups must be organized to combat enemy troops, to form guerilla warfare everywhere, to blow up bridges, roads, damage telephone and telegraph lines and to set fire to forests, stores and transports.

"In occupied regions conditions must be made unbearable for the enemy and all his accomplices. They must be hounded and annihilated at every step and all their measures frustrated."

Silence Broken
The speech, broadcast at 6 a. m. (7 p. m. Wednesday PST) and repeated at intervals during the day on public loud-speaker systems and on house radios, marked the first time the Russian people had heard Stalin's voice since 1936 when he announced the constitution.

Pravda, Izvestia and other morning newspapers devoted their entire front pages to the text of the half-hour speech together with portraits of Stalin.

Peoples' Armies
Asserting that "millions of the masses of our people will rise," Stalin, speaking in measured tones, announced that workers in Leningrad and Moscow already had started the organization of thousands into peoples' armies to support the red army and urged similar action in "every city under threat of invasion."

The Moscow radio announced mass meetings of workers were being held in factories and plants to take action on Stalin's appeal.

Copies of the text of the premier's speech were pasted on walls throughout the capital by youths in uniforms of the state labor reserve corps.

Gratitude
He expressed gratitude to Britain and to the United States and referred to the people of Europe and America as "loyal allies."

"Our war for the freedom of our country," he said, "will merge with the struggle of the peoples of Europe and America for their independence, for democratic liberties."

"In this connection, the historic utterance of British Prime Minister Churchill regarding aid to the soviet union and the declaration of the USA government, which can only evoke a feeling of gratitude in the hearts of the peoples of the soviet union, are fully comprehensible and sympathetic."

BERLIN, July 3 (AP)—Questioned about Josef Stalin's appeal to the Russian people to lay waste their country before the advancing Germans, a spokesman said tonight that "the German armed forces are prepared for that."

WHEELS MUST KEEP MOVING DECLARES F. R.

HYDE PARK, N. Y., July 3 (UP)— President Roosevelt served notice on labor and industry last night that he will not hesitate to use full force of the federal government, including plant seizure, if necessary, to keep the wheels of America's defense industry going.

The notice came as a formal statement of policy as Mr. Roosevelt successfully terminated the most drastic measure thus far invoked to keep industrial wheels rolling—army seizure of the Northwood, Calif., plant of the New American Aviation, Inc.

The president, by executive order, ended army control of the plant and turned it back to its private operators. It had been in military possession since the morning of June 9, when troops from Camp Hunter Liggett moved in with fixed bayonets and promised protection for a back-to-work movement and broke the crucial strike.

In turning back the plant, capable of turning out 10 planes a day and with a \$198,000,000 backlog of plane orders for Britain and this country, Mr. Roosevelt said he would hold labor and management strictly accountable for continued operation of the industry at peak. He broadened this injunction with the statement that he will not hesitate to act in future defense strikes which interfere with production of arms for the defense of America.

No Hesitation
"Should efforts be made again to interfere with this essential production, I will not hesitate to take whatever steps may hereafter be necessary to assure its continuance," he said.

His instructions to labor and management were explicit after he had explained that he decided to turn the plant back to its private owners after issues which led to the strike were settled by mediation.

"Both the workers and their employers cooperated to attain this result," the president said. "With their continued cooperation and willingness to subordinate personal differences to the urgent need of their country, it is my belief and expectation that they will fulfill their important responsibilities without further interruption."

BERLIN REPORT FOLLOWS WORD SOVIET BEATEN

operating on the ground and in the air.

MOSCOW, July 3 (AP)—The vanguard of Moscow-bound German invaders was reported by the Russian high command today to have been thrown back in repeated attempts to cross the Berezina river where in 1812 the waters were reddened by the blood of Napoleon's men under harassed retreat from the Russian capital.

Nearly 300 miles to the south of Borisov, the red army also was reported to have halted in "a heavy defeat" a mechanized advance toward Shepetovka, some 20 miles inside the old border of the Ukraine on the road to Kiev.

Other parts of the Ukraine invasion force were said to have attempted a break-through to the south toward Tarnopol, east of Lwow and south of Luck, still in the Ukraine's Polish buffer zone. These forces apparently had veered southward from Luck.

"Throughout the whole night our troops in heavy fighting stemmed the advance of enemy troops," a communique said.

"Fighting continued by our air force, which shot down 61 enemy planes in air combats through July 2. We lost 228 aircraft."

LONDON, July 3 (AP)—Russia can lose the war or lay the foundations of eventual German defeat in the next 48 hours, informed military sources said today.

If the German armies are given time to consolidate their gains of the first 10 days of fighting and launch new and more intensive drives on Leningrad, Kiev and Moscow the soviets will lose "these cities within a week, maybe less," these persons declared.

The Russians have an opportunity to halt the invasion in the tracks of its crawling panzer divisions but "the chance is a long one and if taken must be taken immediately," one source said.

While the German advances north and south of the Minsk marches pause, he added, "the Russians must gather all armored units and supporting aircraft and attack at all vital areas."

B-19 Makes Second Successful Flight

MARCH FIELD, Calif., July 3 (UP)—Ma. Stanley Umstead, chief army test pilot, lately flew the Douglas B-19 bomber on its second test flight and reported the world's largest plane was even easier to handle than during the initial flight last week.

The 50,000-ton plane was taken aloft at 2:25 p. m. (PST.), and remained in the air for approximately an hour and a half before Maj. Umstead and the crew of six men brought it back on the runways here.

The big ship required only 1500 feet for the landing and came down without a single bounce, observers reported. On its first flight last week the huge ship bounced slightly on the landing.

Small sailor hats, snugly pinned with a large hat pin, starched white shirt waists, high collars, full black skirts to hide their high black shoes, in contrast to the riding trousers Miss 1941 wears on all sports occasions.

indications of the suddenness with which armed conflict can spread to areas hitherto considered free from attack.

"There are," he added, "legal restrictions on the use of the armed forces which should be removed without delay."

"It is urgently recommended that the war department be given authority to extend the period of service of the selective service men, the officers of the reserve corps and the units of the national guard."

The selective service act called for a maximum of one year of military training for these groups. The act also stipulated that these groups could not be used outside the western hemisphere.

"When and where these forces are to serve are questions to be determined by their commander-in-chief and the congress, and should not be confused with the problem of their readiness for service," Marshall told Simson.

"All, it is believed, will admit that the time factor has been of dominant importance in the march of events since September, 1939, in the availability of material, in the effect of the complete readiness of huge, highly trained units for employment in chosen theatres."

The chief of staff also strongly urged immediate congressional action on legislation already before congress designed to vitalize the army leadership. He said the purpose was removal from active duty of "a few officers who slow down the development of our emergency army through lack of qualities of vigor and intelligent aggressive leadership."

"It is urgently recommended that the war department be given authority to extend the period of service of the selective service men, the officers of the reserve corps and the units of the national guard."

The selective service act called for a maximum of one year of military training for these groups. The act also stipulated that these groups could not be used outside the western hemisphere.

"When and where these forces are to serve are questions to be determined by their commander-in-chief and the congress, and should not be confused with the problem of their readiness for service," Marshall told Simson.

"All, it is believed, will admit that the time factor has been of dominant importance in the march of events since September, 1939, in the availability of material, in the effect of the complete readiness of huge, highly trained units for employment in chosen theatres."

The chief of staff also strongly urged immediate congressional action on legislation already before congress designed to vitalize the army leadership. He said the purpose was removal from active duty of "a few officers who slow down the development of our emergency army through lack of qualities of vigor and intelligent aggressive leadership."

Sprague Reappoints Mrs. Theodore Case
Mrs. Theodore D. Case was reappointed to the Klamath county welfare commission Thursday by Governor Charles A. Sprague.

Mrs. Case has served one previous term on the
