BOEING PLANS BIG FLYING BOAT JOB

SEATTLE, July 3 (P) — The Boeing company, builders of big four-motored army bombers, has launched out into new national defense work with plans for another big plant to build flying boats, in large quantities, for the navy.

The government will build immediately a big new airplane assembly plant on Lake Washington, at nearby Renton, for use by Boeing for "quantity production" of such craft, Boeing and the navy department at Washington announced.

The plant will rank as one of the largest flying boat factories in the country. Parts of it are expected to be ready for occupancy by the end of the year and the remainder in the spring of 1942. A contract will be awarded shortly to the Austin company, for the government defense plant corporation, which will own the factory.

Although the type or size of planes to be built was not disclosed, Boeing has been reported to be working on an experimental type of flying boat for some time. The plant's cost was also not announced.

The plant would cover 1,617,000 square feet of floor space, an area nearly as large as the company's main plant No. 2 here. Activities would be confined mainly to sub-assembly and final assembly operations. Fabrication of detail would be handled by plant No. 2 here, the Stearnman Aircraft division's plant No. 2, at Wichita, Kas., and by Pacific northwest sub-contractors.

With the plant's completion, Boeing will have expanded its capacity here, at Wichita and Vancouver, B. C., in terms of floor space — 10 times since the war, a Boeing spokesman said.

TOWNSEND PROGRAM HELD DEFENSE AID

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 3 (P) — Rep. Martin F. Smith (D-Wash.) told the sixth national Townsend convention today this nation's defense must be bolstered "by increasing the 'stake' which our people have in the preservation of democracy."

Maintaining that "a short sighted policy of indifference to social welfare" contributed to "the downfall of France," Smith said in a prepared address, "we are not going to repeat the mistakes and defeatism of France, we are going to insure victory by practicing the virtues of the true American democracy."

That means, he declared, "the Townsend plan, cost of production for our farmers, a square deal for labor and unemployment relief," which, he continued, "are just as essential to our national defense — if not more so — than planes, battleships, tanks, guns and munitions."

Smith explained "under our present Townsend bill" about \$50 a month would be paid to citizens 60 years old or over "based upon our present gross national income" but that the pensions would rise with increasing prosperity.

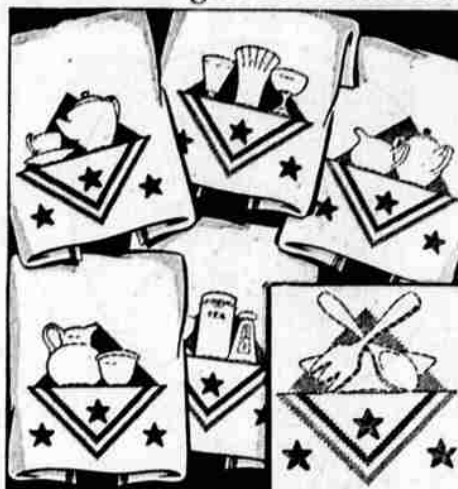
BERTRUM WILLIAM GOOCH

Comptroller Issues June 30 Bank Call

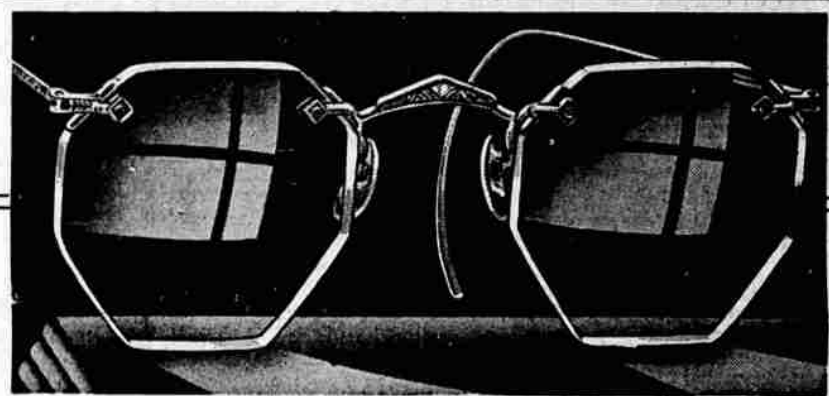
WASHINGTON, July 3 (P) — The comptroller of the currency today issued a call for a statement of the condition of all national banks at the close of business Monday, June 30. As is customary in mid-year, the federal reserve board and the federal deposit insurance corporation issued simultaneous calls. This made a total of 13,422 commercial and 53 mutual savings banks covered by today's request for condition reports. The commercial banks included 5130 national banks, 1412 state bank members of the federal reserve system and 6880 other state banks.

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
