STOCK MARKET GETS ANOTHER FORWARD PUSH

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Buyers came in from all directions at the start and, despite an assortment of profit realizing on yesterday's bulge, leading industrial added fractions to more than 2 points. Gains were well maintained at the close.

The run-up was accomplished on one of the largest volumes since last November, transfers for the full proceedings approximating 1,400,000 shares.

Spurring the extension of Monday's drive was heavy buying in major commodities such as cotton, wheat, silk, sugar and cottonseed oil, some futures of which established new seasonal highs.

Stocks getting into new high ground for the year or longer included Savage Arms, Standard Oil (N.J.), Texas Corp., Western Union and J. I. Case.

Well in front of the greater part of the time were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Douglas Aircraft, Westinghouse, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, American Smelting, Phelps Dodge, Du Pont, Allied Chemical, General Electric, Union Carbide, Goodrich and Montgomery Ward.

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BARGAIN TOUR RATE CONTINUED BY W. P.

Joseph G. Wheeler, Western Pacific railroad general agent, announced Tuesday that the \$90 "grand circle tour" fares now in effect and which were to expire on October 31, would be continued by the Western Pacific indefinitely.

"These low rate fares, which were put into effect in connection with the San Francisco and New York world fairs," said Wheeler, "have proved very popular and hence the decision to continue them."

"The plan makes it possible for persons to complete a round trip by rail from their homes to both the Atlantic and the Pacific coasts and thence to their original starting point, over a distance of from 6300 to 8000 miles, depending upon the route selected, at a substantial saving from standard round-trip fares."

The traveler will have the choice of many attractive routes in connection with the Western Pacific, with stopover privileges at any points desired on either the going or the returning trip within the two months' limit allowed by the ticket.

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Potato Agreement Wins Support at Washington Hearing

ELLENBURG, Wash., July 8 (AP)—Support for a proposed potato marketing agreement came from 60 growers and dealers from eight counties at a hearing yesterday. The only change which found wide support was a suggestion to make the fiscal year end May 31 instead of June 30 as proposed. Major A. D. Hadley of San Francisco, representative of the U. S. solicitor's office and J. W. Gannaway, associate marketing specialist of the surplus marketing administration, who conducted the hearing, said the proposal would be referred back to the growers for approval. Counties affected by the agreement are Yakima, Kittitas, Benton, Grant, Skagit, Snohomish, Whatcom and Clark.
