

GERMANS SAY FINN SECTOR GAINS MADE

the frontier of the U. S. S. R. to seize Ostrov.

At some undisclosed points, a German spokesman said, Adolf Hitler's legions have driven almost 250 miles into Russian territory.

MOSCOW, July 9 (AP)—The red army reported today it had routed German troops and wiped out two motorized regiments in northern White Russia and stalled Nazi drives at most points on the huge battlefield.

It acknowledged, however, that German panzer spearheads were striking at new points in an attempt to find soft spots. "Large enemy tank and motorized units" attempted to break through in new fighting at Sebezh, near the Latvian frontier, the communique said, adding: "Fighting is in progress."

Centers of fighting, in which the soviet troops were supported by red air-fleet bombing attacks, were listed as Polotsk, in the northern tip of White Russia; Lepel, 40 miles south, and Novograd Volynski in the sun-scorched western Ukraine.

What frightened him was the knowledge that France would turn against him as soon as he began to lose—as it did.

HITLER probably knows that as long as he WINS Germany will follow him through blood and death. But he must fear the moment when he begins to lose.

History leaves no doubt that for conquerors this is a DANGEROUS moment.

press conference that American occupation of Iceland "is in my judgment, but the first of similar steps that should be taken."

Vital Lanes

In response to question, Willkie declared that it was vital "to keep the sea lanes open."

He added that British shipping losses were running far ahead of new construction.

"We can do one of two things," he continued. "We either can give Great Britain effective aid or we can render her only lip service."

"It would be better not to try to give any aid at all than to follow the latter course."
