

# CLASSES OPEN IN RECREATION CENTERS HERE

During the first three weeks of the summer recreation program being conducted at Roosevelt school, Mills, Pelican, Conger, and Moore park, the average daily attendance has been 85 boys and girls, reports David Bridge, city recreation officer. Inasmuch as this program furnishes recreation for the boys and girls of Klamath Falls and gives them something to do in their spare time the recreation officer and the recreation committee is pleased with the attendance.

Bridge and the recreation committee urge parents to visit the centers and urge their children to take part in the activities. Classes in arts and crafts, dancing, twirling, shop and games are being held daily Monday through Friday. Two softball leagues have been organized, one for the boys between the ages of 10 and 13, and another league for boys over 13. The softball games alone will occupy the leisure time of approximately 100 boys for the rest of the summer program which ends August 16.

Because of WPA reduction quotas, two persons have been taken off the summer program. Mrs. Marie Cone, art instructor, is one of the instructors to leave. Interest in Mrs. Cone's classes has been high, shown by an average daily attendance of 50 children. Louise Steinson has been designated to handle arts and crafts all day on Monday, and Wednesday and Friday mornings at Roosevelt school. Mrs. Steinson will hold classes at Mills all day Tuesday, and on Thursday and Friday afternoons.

Two sisters, Gloria and Doris Sladin, are donating their services free for the summer. Doris is supervising Conger school and Gloria is traveling from center to center teaching dancing and twirling.

Each year during the summer program one day is set aside for special activities at Moore park. This year August 1 has been designated. Boys and girls from all the recreation centers will gather at the park. Competitive games will be the rule for the day and treats will be in order.

Inasmuch as there are still nearly six weeks of the recreation program left, boys and girls of Klamath Falls are urged to attend with no expense involved.

## 350 Troops Footsore After Paying for Girl-Hooting

CAMP ROBINSON, Ark., July 10 (AP)—Yoo Hoo-o-o-o—exclamation mark—might be a friendly greeting in some quarters but they came dangerously close to being a fighting phrase Wednesday in the presence of any of the 350-odd footsore, blistered-nosed troopers of the 35th

division "doghouse" battalion. A few ill-considered, untimely Yoo Hoos and other greetings brought a provisional battalion of the 110th quartermaster regiment into the bad graces of a general and resulted in a 150-mile disciplinary march, 15 miles of it by foot in 97-degree

heat, from Memphis, Tenn., to the camp. Too exhausted to acknowledge the friendly calls of civilian and soldier spectators as the convoy rolled through north Little Rock, the battalion arrived at camp at dusk Tuesday night. The soldiers, sweat soaked, had paid their penalty—at least in part—for committing what Lt. Gen. Ben Lear, second army commander, considered a serious breach of military discipline. General Lear ordered the march for conduct he said was a disgrace to the army when the battalion made its first homeward trip through Memphis Sunday from the Tennessee war girls. The sight of shorts-clad girls at a Memphis golf course evoked an outburst of calls and whistles. The general, in civilian clothes, happened to be playing on the course and an exuberant soldier shouted "Hey Buddy, don't you want a caddy?"

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—Rep. Kilday (D-Tex.), called Wednesday on Lieut. Gen. Ben Lear, commander of the second army, to explain his "mass punishment" of 350 soldiers of the 35th division for whistling and calling to shorts-clad girls on a Memphis, Tenn., golf course last Sunday.

Kilday, a house military committee member, said he contemplated introducing a resolution to investigate Lear's "severe punishment" of the soldiers who were ordered by the general to repeat their trek, partly on foot, from Memphis to Camp Robinson, Ark., 150 miles away.

Asking for an immediate reply, Kilday wired Lear that newspaper accounts "all give the very definite impression that action taken by you in the name of discipline was actually to assuage personal resentment because of remarks directed at you

LOS ANGELES, July 10 (AP)—Because a superior court judge objected to paying \$6 for three beers, Hollywood's well known Pirate's Den is having difficulties getting its license renewed. The judge, anonymously represented by a friend, reported he took two guests to the Pirate's Den, owned by Rudy Vallee, Bob Hope, Tony Martin, Bing Crosby, Johnny Weismuller and five other Hollywood biggies whose names were not mentioned at a hearing before the police commission.

The judge's story was that when he protested against the charge, he was thrown out by a bouncer. Joseph Braig, manager of the night spot, told the commission minimum charges at tables were \$2 Sunday nights and beer was 50 cents at the bar—but the bar was crowded. The commission reserved decision on the license application.

## ARMY SEEKS NEW OREGON RECRUITS

Lt. Col. B. H. Hensley, district recruiting officer of the U. S. army for the state of Oregon, announced Thursday that a new requisition had been received for enlistments in the regular army to be filled at once by the Oregon district.

One hundred and twenty-five men are needed at once for the air corps. They may choose any of the following air fields: Jefferson Barracks, Mo., Ellington field, Tex., Moffett field, Calif., and the advanced flying school at Stockton, Calif. Sixty men to be enlisted for the aviation ordnance department at the following fields: Portland, Pendleton, Boise, and McChord field in Washington, and forty-three vacancies are available in the Philippine and Hawaiian islands for the infantry, field artillery, coast artillery, quartermaster and medical departments.

Requirements for enlistment in any of the above branches are as follows: Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 35, single, of good character, have at least an eighth grade education, and be able to pass the physical and mental examination.

Men are urged to apply now to Sergeant Frank J. Huhin, local recruiting officer, in the post-office building. Immediate enlistment may be expected.
