PAST WINNERS COMING AGAIN FOR REGATTA

The Upper Klamath lake regatta will see some of last year's sportsmen out again to bring back the glory they gained in 1940. Among those who will be hard to catch in Sunday's water festival will be Merton Sauers of Bend, who won the free-for-all and class "A" division in the sailboat race; Raymond Howard, class "B" winner in the sailboat; Billy Timney of Bend, high money man in the speed boat events; Marvin Ragsdale of Big Lakes Box company, winner of the single log bucking contest, who cut through a 32 inch log in 2 minutes and 23.2 seconds; Orval Taylor of Weyerhaeuser Timber company, winner of the log chopping contest who went through a 16-inch log in 2 minutes 2.8 seconds; George Knoll and S. Pearson, winners of the double log bucking event from Long Bell Lumber company at Dorris, who made a fine mark of 54.5 seconds through a 32-inch log.

A long list of entries in all events has already been received, with additional ones coming in daily. These men are coming from the four western states with as many as five and six boats from each section. Marshfield and Coos Bay are bringing in sailboats and Eureka, Calif., is also adding many boats this year. All mills in the southern and central Oregon pine belt have placed entries in either the log bucking or log chopping contest and the competition looks like it will be the keenest in years in these events. The Klamath Bus company will run buses out to the upper lake for the convenience of those who do not care to drive. Buses will leave the intersection of Fourth and Main streets, starting at 12 noon on Sunday and will run at half-hour intervals.

Jim Kerns, regatta chairman, wishes to announce that tickets are now on sale and may be obtained either at the Elk hotel or the chamber of commerce offices. As an added courtesy feature, Kerns says that anyone who wishes to call 5810 before 5 o'clock may have tickets delivered at no extra charge.

Three guests of the class are Mrs. Joe Lee, Mrs. Helen Wagner and Mrs. J. H. Williams.

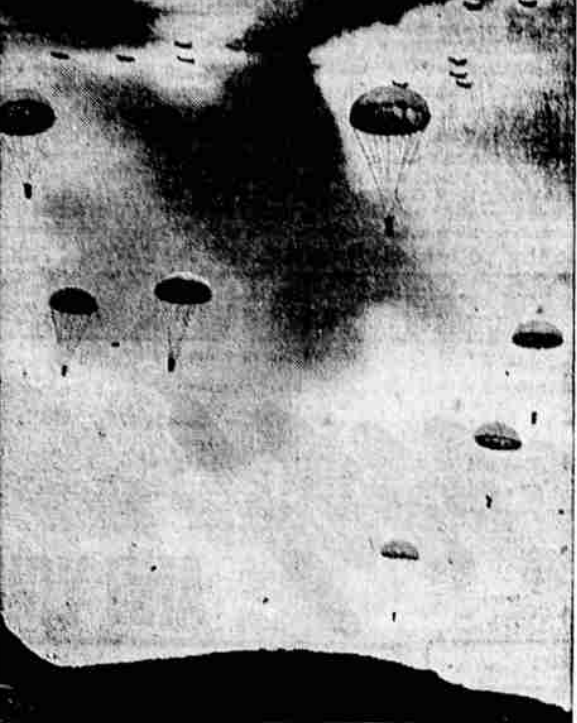

Interesting Stories About Klamath Animals and Efforts in Their Behalf

Gus belongs to Innis Roberts. When Innis leaves for the store in the morning Gus calmly waits until the car is out of sight, then hits the pavement after it, and when his master is ready to go home he finds Gus serenely waiting for transportation.

Time was when Gus went gaily into the store hunting Innis, but his joy was so unbounded when he arrived that pans, tubs and dishes marked his trail down the aisle. This could not be long endured, so Gus was relegated to the basement which was not his idea of a perfect time. Then he evolved the plan of finding the car, which he has followed ever since.

If the weather is hot, or rainy, Gus finds shelter under the car. If the day is pleasant there are many alleys to explore, places that need investigating, news of the dog world to ferret out—all in plain sight of the car and all which make the day pass most interestingly.

Sometimes Gus finds himself torn between desires. Other members of the Roberts family may come down town and bring a car he feels a proprietary interest in. Then Gus lies under the first one of the cars, then the other, but usually he decides he will make his bid for a ride home with Innis, for after all Innis belongs to him.

A verse by Eleanor Alletta Chaffee is well worth re-reading, entitled "Little Dog Lost": All up and down God's heaven he'll be chasing Immortal rabbits through immortal fields; With drooping tail and pleading eyes he facing The justice that so simply mercy yields.

He'll not forget to guard the gates; to wonder Why those who love him are so long delayed; He'll tremble at the sound of ancient thunder, His ears along his head compactly laid.

And when I reach the last long stretch, and whistle, I'll see him panting, eager and alert, His scruffy coat rough with familiar thistle His scruffy paws stiff with immortal dirt.

Yet anxious as of old to show the hole Where buried bone and ball appease his soul.

DRAFT CALLS 59 KLAMATH MEN, 15 LAKE

SALEM, July 10 (AP) — State selective service headquarters called on eight of Oregon's 57 local draft boards today to supply 178 men for the August 4-6 call, while there will be another call of about the same size August 18-20.

The men in the August 4-6 call will report as follows: To report at the Portland induction station August 4—25 men each from Clackamas board No. 2 and from Clatsop county; 10 from Multnomah board No. 12 (Gresham).

August 5—14 from Klamath board No. 1, and 45 from Klamath board No. 2.

August 6—30 from Lane board No. 3, 21 from Malheur county, and 8 from Grant county.

LAKEVIEW, July 10 (AP) — Fifteen men have been called to military service by the Lake county selective service board for July 14. They will report at 1 p. m. on that day and leave for Portland for induction.

Lake county's quota for the balance of 1941 will be 109 men, Board Chairman C. R. Graham said.
