

SCHOOL UNIT ELECTION SET FOR JULY 18

Date of the Klamath county school unit election has been changed to July 18.

On that date, polling places will be open from 2 to 7 p. m. at all schoolhouses to give voters an opportunity to express themselves on a proposal to exceed the 6 per cent limitation in order to finance a construction program.

If the proposal passes, a \$49,500 building program at 10 locations will be carried out.

The election was originally slated for July 15, but was changed due to technicalities in connection with publication of legal notices.

Death Toll for Mine Blast Mounts To 11 in Alabama

ACMAR, Ala., July 11 (AP)—The death toll in an explosion-wrecked wing of Acmar Coal Mine No. 6 mounted to 11 today and weary rescue crews struggled through tons of debris.

Volunteers working all night by lamplight succeeded in extracting nine bodies before day-break. Two were still buried.

The dead miners, nine negroes and two white men, were trapped in the mine's eighth entry, more than a mile underground, sometime yesterday afternoon by what company Chief Deputy Herbert Ginright described as "a local gas explosion."

The explosion was not heard on the surface and the accident was not known until J. L. Poe, a miner, discovered a dead power wire leading into the chamber where the men died.

day for Nazi slain and prisoners. Russian casualties, it was said, compared only with the slaughter in the greatest battles of the World war.

Road Clearing

DNB, the Nazi agency, attributed the halt to the necessity of clearing roads littered with the wreckage of red army machines.

According to previous reports from Vichy military circles, the German juggernaut has been virtually stalled for more than a week now, in sharp contrast to its hurricane sweep through the lowlands of Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg into France last summer.

DNB asserted that the halt was a brief one, and declared that roads impeding the German advance were clogged with "a mass of abandoned, shot-to-pieces and burned out tanks and vehicles."

"Part of immense amounts of war materials had to be shoved aside to blaze a trail for the German troops," DNB said.

For the fourth straight day, Hitler's high command made no claims to new gains on the 200-mile front stretching from the Arctic shores to the Black sea. The Russians indicated that the sting had been taken out of the Nazi blitz and that German legions were no longer attacking.

"Nothing particular occurred on the fronts during last night," a Soviet war bulletin said.

Red warplanes were declared to have shot 88 German planes out of the sky, or destroyed them on the ground, compared with a loss of nine Soviet aircraft.

Silent on present operations, Hitler's field headquarters went back to the bloody struggle in the forests of Bialystok, reporting the conclusion of that conflict with the capture of 323,888 red army troops, 3332 tanks, 1809 guns and an enormous quantity of supplies.

ment or under the lease-lend act.

LONDON, July 11 (AP)—The foreign office said today "some technicians and laborers from the United States are engaged in connection with certain works that are proceeding in northern Ireland."

"All these, however, are direct employes of the British government," the statement added.

"They had entered into employment in exercise of their perfectly legal right to accept such occupation, and it is equally open to any other United States citizens who may desire to aid the British cause to engage themselves in Britain."

Crews Rushed to Fire Lines in Central Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., July 11 (AP) More than 500 men rushed to fire lines today to battle a 14,000-acre blaze in brush and grass land on and near the Warm Springs Indian reservation in central Oregon.

Some 10 lightning-started fires raged there. The largest has jumped the Metolius river and threatens green timber.

Oregon's newly trained Red Hats were moved from their schooling camp at Corvallis and sent against the spearhead of flame menacing the virgin pine. The 50 men carried complete fire-fighting equipment.

The Oregon Forest Fire Patrol association reported yesterday that a 50-acre fire near Scappoose in Columbia county had been brought under control after it had destroyed 200,000 feet of cold-decked logs in the Newman logging operations.

Naples Bombed by British for Second Night in Succession

ROME, July 11 (AP)—British planes bombed Naples last night, the second night in a row, the Italian high command announced and caused "much damage to civilian dwellings."

Five persons were reported killed and 20 injured in the raid, which lasted nearly three hours. Shortly after the bombardment Crown Princess Marie Jose visited those injured in the raid. She paid a similar visit to the hospitals yesterday morning.

Italian planes, on the other hand, bombed refineries at Baifa, in Palestine, causing large fires which were still blazing many hours after the raid was over, the communique said.
